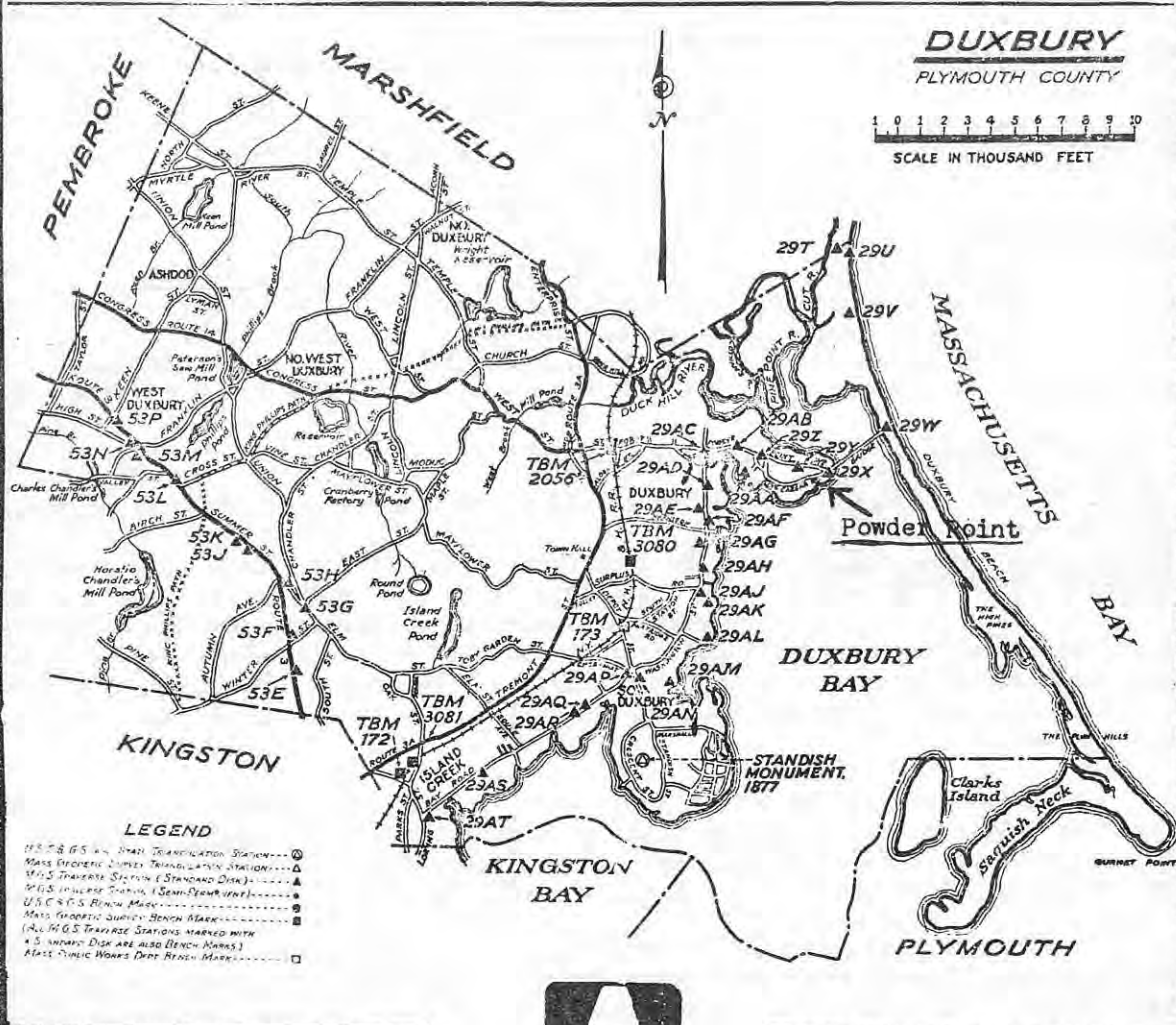


# SOULE NEWSLETTER

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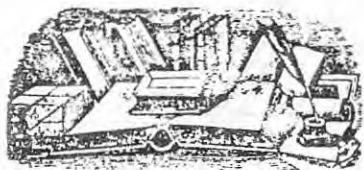

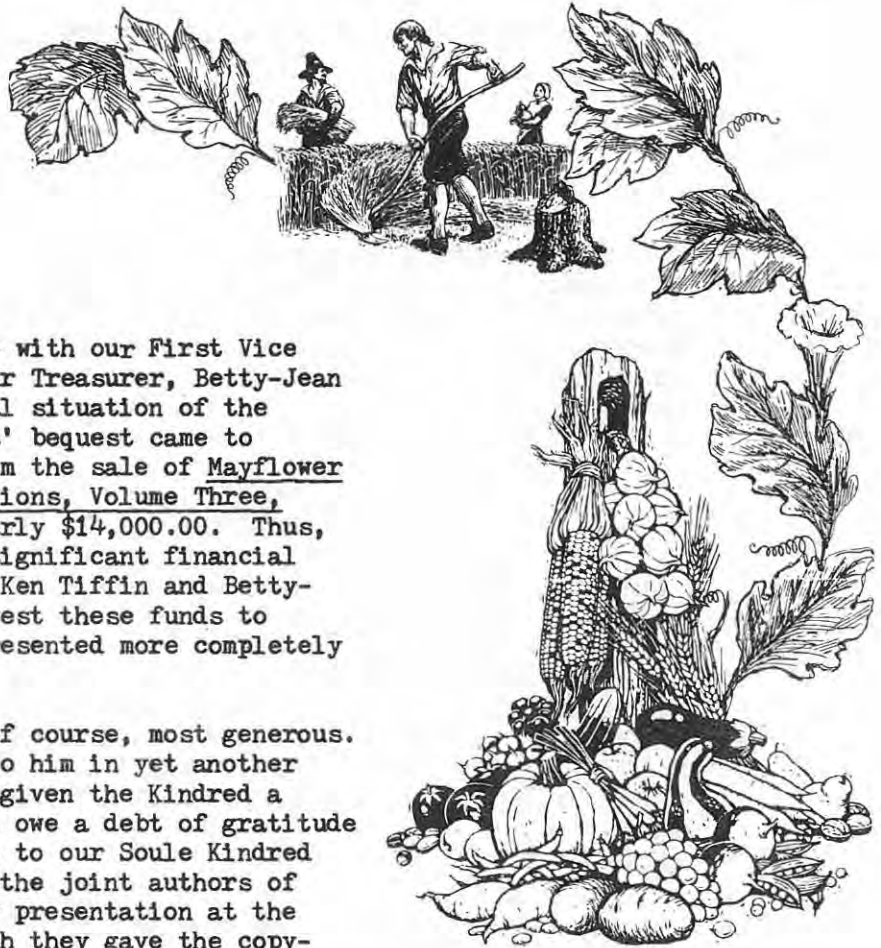

I have been in correspondence with our First Vice President, Ken Tiffin, and our Treasurer, Betty-Jean Haner, regarding the financial situation of the Kindred. Colonel John Soules' bequest came to \$10,210.00. The receipts from the sale of Mayflower Families Through Five Generations, Volume Three, George Soule, has come to nearly \$14,000.00. Thus, the Kindred has witnessed a significant financial leap in the last two years. Ken Tiffin and Betty-Jean Haner are working to invest these funds to advantage and this will be presented more completely in a subsequent Newsletter.

Colonel John's bequest was, of course, most generous. We, therefore, are indebted to him in yet another way. His thoughtfulness has given the Kindred a sizeable financial boost. We owe a debt of gratitude not only to Colonel John, but to our Soule Kindred Historian, Dr. Milton Terry, the joint authors of Volume Three. I recall their presentation at the 1978 Plymouth Reunion at which they gave the copyright to Volume Three to Soule Kindred in America, Inc. and to the General Society of Mayflower Descendants. Their foresight has added immeasurably to the continuance of this organization, not only in the realm of genealogical information, but in terms of financial well-being.

For many years, one of our goals has been to present a scholarship. We have a scholarship fund, and thanks to the above named gentlemen, it is growing. The presentation of a scholarship is costly; in addition, the procedures for making awards is a very complicated and delicate process. It is to be hoped that the methodology for awarding scholarships will be developed in time to be presented to the members of the Kindred who will be present at the 1982 reunion.

The Cincinnati Reunion - 29 July - 1 August 1982. I encourage all of you to come! Linda Soule Preston has volunteered to be our host, and I have no doubt that this will be one of the best reunions that the Kindred has ever had -- and there have been some grand reunions in the past. SOME TIDBITS ON THE NEW JERSEY AYERS FAMILY

A cousin's query about Hannah Ayers, caused a search in Trenton. It was found that the Minisink Dutch Reformed church for a brief period had a church in Wantage Sussex County, New Jersey and that several of the Ayers families of that region joined. The Drake Collection of the Genealogical Society of New Jersey is once again in its possession. In notebook "Drake Gen II", is a study of Joseph Drake, b. 23 Oct. 1761 who married Desire Brown, b. 19 August 1766. Desire was the daughter of Timothy Brown and Desire Freeman. In Mayflower Families, Vol. 3 we had found the marriage of Desire and Timothy but had been unable to find them in later records. They had migrated from Tewksbury, Hunterdon County to Hardwick Sussex County, NJ. Timothy Brown, b. 21 Nov. 1739; d. Hardwick 30 Dec. 1799, son of Patrick Brown married 23 Feb. 1763 Desire Freeman, d. Hardwick NJ 8 Feb. 1790. Timothy is buried in the Yellow Frame Presbyterian Churchyard on the road between Newton and Blairstown NJ. He died intestate and letters of administration were granted James and Patrick Brown and Alexander Freeman [son-in-law]. Sons James and Patrick both married an Elizabeth Freeman, the first the daughter of James and Elizabeth (Payne) Freeman and the second the daughter of Jacob and Mary (Stiles) Freeman.

SOULE

The name is early spelt Sole, Soal, Soul; and Soule seems to be of late adoption.

1. GEORGE, arrived 1620; 1623 had a grant of one acre, and next a lot "at the watering place," which he sold to R. Hicks 1639; lived north of Eel River bridge 1638, relinquished his land there to Constant and Thomas Southworth, and removed to Dux., and settled at Powder point; prop. of Bridgew. 1645; sold his right to Nicholas Byram; m. Mary Becket, or Bucket who d. 1677; he d. 1680, very aged; had John, 1632 (2); George, inherited half of his father's lands at Dartmouth; Benjamin, killed at Pawtucket March 26, 1676; Zachariah, b. before 1627, ad. 1653, m. Margaret, lived at Powder point, d. a. 1663; Nathaniel, Dux., inherited land in Dartmouth; Elizabeth, m. Francis Walker of Middleboro'; Susanna; Mary, placed to Jno. Winslow 1652 for 7 years, married before 1672 John Peterson.

2. JOHN, (s. of 1,) Dux., m. Esther, who d. Sept 12, 1733, aet. 95; de d. 1707 aet 75; he was made the chief heir of his father, viz. "And for as much as my eldest son John Soule and his family hath in my extreme old age and weakness bin tender and careful of mee and very healpfull to mee; and is likely for to be while it shall please God to continew my life heer, therefore I give and bequeath unto my said son John Sould all the remainder of my housing and lands whatsoever," &c.- Geo Soule's Will. He had John, perhaps the one who d. at Dux 1734; Joseph, July 31, 1679 (3); Joshua, Oct 12, 1681 (4); Josiah, 1682, (5); Benjamin, m. Sarah Standish, one of the first of Plympton, had Hannah, who m. Geo. Sampson; a da. m. Edmund Weston; a da m. Adam Wright.

3. JOSEPH, (s. of 2) Dux., m. Mary; he d. July 11, 1763; had Mary, Dec. 18, 1711; Alethea, Jan 9, 1714, m. Allerton Cushman of Plympton Jan. 30, 1735; Lydia, March 9, 1715; Hannah, March 6, 1717; Rebecca, May 3, 1722

4. JOSHUA, (s. of 2) Dux., m. Joanna Studley; he d. May 29, 1767, aet. 85; had Zeruah, Nov. 2, 1705, m. Ebenezer Sampson 1728; John, March 4, 1709 (9); Ezekiel, Feb. 17, 1711, m. Hannah Delano Jan. 4, 1733; Joshua, May 30, 1713 (10); Abigail, April 30, 1716, m. Perez Drew of K., Sept 3, 1730; Joanna, April 18, 1719; Sarah, July 25, 1728, m. Aaron Bisbee, Nov. 26, 1747; Joseph, March 15, 1722 (11); Nathan, July 12, 1725 (12); and prob. Lydia, who m. a Simmons
5. JOSIAH, (s of 2) Dux., m. Lydia Delano May 25, 1704, who d. Nov 24, 1763, aet 83; he d. June 25, 1764, aet 82; and Jonathan, June 23, 1705, d. April 4, 1776; Mary, Dec. 5, 1706, m. Joshua Cushman of Lebanon, Ct., Jan 2, 1733; Abisha, Nov 25, 1708(13); Micah, April 12, 1711 (14); Nathaniel, Nov 4, 1714 (15); Lydia, Oct 2, 1719
6. ZACHARIAH, (perhaps of Sachariah, s. of 1) Dux., d. in the Canada Expedition, 1690; had early a large grant in Dux., which was confirmed to his brother John in 1690.
7. MOSES, (son of \_\_,) Dux., a householder, and had, 1707, an addition to his land granted. Moses, probably his son, m. Sarah Chandler Jan 15, 1729.
8. AARON, (son of \_\_,) Dux.,; had a grant 1693, and in 1699 "a small tract of land ate ye South end off his lott iff he had they (appointed to lay it out) can agree," and having paid 40 Shillings, 15 acres were accordinly laid out. Aaron (perhaps his son; though styled of Pembroke,) m. Alice Peterson, May 5, 1727. An Aaron d. at Pembroke, 1783, had John, Leonice, who m. a Brewster, Huldah, who m. Thomas Church, and three other das. Hist Bridgewater.
9. JOHN, (s. of 4) Dus.; m. Mehetable Partridge, Aug. 5, 1730; he had Lydia, May 6, 1733; Samuel, July 6, 1734 (16).
10. JOSHUA, (s. of 4) Dux.; m. Mary Cushman, Feb. 14, 1765; had Luther, Dec. 21, 1765, d. May 21, 1771; Alethea, 1769, d. 1771, May 20; and Joseph.
11. JOSEPH, (s. of 4,) Dux.; m. Mercy Fullerton,\* 1742; had Sarah, m. Benj. Prior, Jan., 1765; Olive, bap. Sep. 2, 1750, m. Nathaneil Winson; Ezekiel (17); Silvina, 1754, d. May 16, 1771; Joanna m. Lot Stetson, May 8, 1777; William (18); Ruby m. Eden Wadsworth; Joseph (19); James 1746 (20).
- \* She was the da. of John Fullerton of M., who m. Ruth Sampson in 1720, and whose chd. were Mercy, Nov. 11, 1721, m. as above, Mary, 10 Sep.- 1723, William, 24 Dec, 1726, Ann, 26 July, 1728, Alethea, 1732, m. Ebenezer Joyce in 1754. A John Fullerton m. Rebecca Delano of Dux., 1746. -- Marshfield Records.
- 12 NATHAN, (s. of 4,) Dux.; inherited the W. part of his father's farm; m. Sarah; had Thomas, July 8, and d. Sept 24, 1748; Levi, Sep. 9, 1749; Levi, Sep. 9, 1749; Simeon, Dec. 16, 1751 (21); William, May 15, 1754, d. Jan. 15, 1755; Anna, Oct. 11, 1762; Sarah.
13. ABISHA, (s. of 5,) Dux.; m. Abigail Delano, May 14, 1741; he d. Jan. 4, 1778, aet 70; had Aletha bap. 1743; m. Capt. Daniel Hall, m. 2d, Levi Loring; Esther d. young; John bap. 1747, went to Maine; Esther bap. 1750; Lydia bap. 1752; Abigail; Dewsbury bap. 1761, m. Seneca Wadsworth; Mary bap. 1763, d. unm.; Nathaniel bap. 1767 (22); Abisha bap. 1770
14. MICAH, (s. of 5,) Dux.; m. Mercy Southworth, May 30, 1740, she d. 1797; he d. Nov. 4, 1778, aet. 67; had Apheta a. 1740; Josiah a. 1742 (23); Constant S. a 1744, "insane, drowned in a brook, July 10, 1790;" Rebecca a. 1750, d. Oct 14, 1778; Asa a. 1752, m. Olive Southworth, Apr. 15, 1773; Esther a. 1753; Lydia a. 1756, d. Oct Oct. 19, 1778



15. NATHANIEL, (s. of 5,) Dux.; m. (when 60 years old) Abigail Tolman of Scituate, Apr. 27, 1775; she d. July 9, 1834; had Nathaniel, July 28, 1777, m. Polly Partridge, and had Nathaniel, Calvin P., Jane, and Polly; Lydia m. Andrew Sampson; Mary; Alethea.
16. SAMUEL, (s. of 9,) Dux.; m. Mehetabel White, Oct. 1, 1756; he d. Jan. 19, 1768, at Carolina; (a widow Mehetabel m. Ichabod Weston, 1769;) had Abigail, May 20, 1757; Silvia, May 20, 1759, m. Joshua Peterson, Feb., 1780; Alice, May 3, 1763, m. Josiah Soule, 1782; Lydia, July 23, 1766
17. EZEKIEL, (s. of 11,) Dux.; m. Clynthia Wadsworth, 1777; he d. Nov. 3, 1843, aet. 92; had Marshall, Apr. 24, 1778, unm.; Capt George, Dec. 4, 1779, m. Ruth Sprague, who d. Mar. 25, 1836; and he d. at St. Thomas, W. I., Feb. 11, 1820, and had George, 1807, d. 1812, Laura, 1811, d. 1813, George Marshall, 1813 (m. Lucy Ford), Laura Ann, 2816 (m. Paul Wing 2d, of Sandwich), James 1818, Nicholas Brown 1820, d. 1842; Capt. Charles, Apr. 22- 1782, m. Mercy Sprague, who d. Dec. 17, 1840, and had Isabella 1811, (m. George Sampson,) Caroline 1811, (m. George Holmes,) Harvy 1812, (m. Lydia Peirce,) Elizabeth 1814, d. 1837, Charles 1819, (of Boston, m. Prudence Soule, and has a da. Isabella,) Otis 1823, Edwin A. 1825, Susan A. 1825, m. Walter Bartlett, Marcellus 1827, Peleg S. 1831, d. 1832, Mercy S. 1835; Harvey, May 29, 1785; Capt. Otis, Feb. 11, 1787, m. 18. WILLIAM, (s. of 11,) Dux.; m. Priscilla, da. of Elijah Sampson, 1784; had Lucy; Elijah; William; Samuel m. Nancy Bates; Stephen m. a Peirce, had Lydia, who m. Eden Sampson.
19. JOSEPH, (s. of 11,) Dux.; he was the father of Bishop Joseph Soule.
20. JAMES, (s. of 11,) Dux.; m. Abigail, widow of B. Bosworth (see under Bosworth,) Jan. 17, 1773. He d. Aug. 29, 1794, aet. 48. Their chd. Sally, July 7, 1774, d. Sep. 12, 1775; Joseph, Dec. 27, 1775, D. Aug 27, 1778; Joshua, Dec. 19, 1777, d. Sep. 17, 1803; Joseph, Jan. 2, 1780, D. Jan. 5, 1806; Abigail, Sep. 20, 1784, m. Asa Hunt; James, Sep. 20 1784, m. Sep. 14. 1800; Nathan, Jan. 18, 1781, m. Bethiah Freeman, and had Zerniah, Lot (m. Elizabeth Brooks) and George; Silvina, June 21, 1784; Thomas, July 24, 1786; Susanna, Sep. 1, 1788, d. Sep. 13, 1790; Simeon, Oct. 2, 1790; Jane, Sep. 23, 1794, d. Oct. 21, 1796; Alethea, July 4, 1797; Henry, Mar. 2, 1800; Charles, May 18, 1806.
22. NATHANIEL, (s. of 13,) Dux., m. Lydia Freeman; had Daniel, Oct. 14, 1796; Lydia F., 1798, m. Capt. Martin Waterman; Hannah, Abigail, Nathaniel, Mary, Capt. Freeman, John, and Enoch.



23. JOSIAH, (s. of 14,) m. Alice Soule 1782, de d. Aug 12, 1806; had Micah, who m. Lucy Alden, had Micah, m. Sarah Wadsworth, Sarah and Lucy; Asa; Samuel, May, 11, 1786.

24. DEA. EZEKIEL, (s. of 4) Dux., m Hannah Delano Jan. 4, 1733; she d. Sep. 25, 1768, aet. 50; removed to Woolwich; had William a. 1738; Lucy a. 1740; Lydia, Amasa, Hannah, John, Deborah.

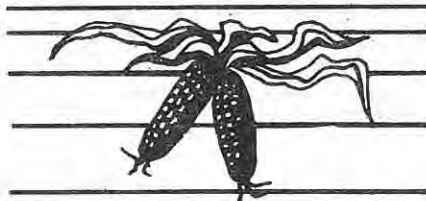

NOTE The progenitor of this family, George, was a member of Gov. Winslow's family, and it is not known whence he came. The name of SOLE is an ancient English name, (and we find the name so spelled in the Col. and town records,) and Guillim gives this armorial bearing of the family. -- "He beareth argent, a chevron gules between three sole fishes hauriant proper in a bordue engrailed sable" -- and adds, "This coat belongs to the family of Soles in Brabanne in the county of Cambridge, according to the bearer's name, and it is very common for persons having their names from any kind of animals or vegetables to bear the like in their coat armour. Such sort o- bearings the French call arms parlant, speaking coats; because they plainly declare the name of their owner." -- Guillim's Banner displayed. Burke (General Armory) gives the same, except "gules" for "sable" and adds that they are borne by the Soles of Bobing place, Kent. Arms by the Soles of London (granted 1591) -- "Gules a tower or. Crest, out of a mural coronet or, a demi lion sable, langue'd and armed or." Another -- "Sole. Sable an inescutcheon within an orle of owls argent." Burke's Armory.

1. CONSTANT, (s. of Constant.) b. 1615, came to New England in 1628\* an early settler of Duxbury; m. Elizabeth Collier Nov 2, 1637, and d. March 10, 1679; leaving an estate of £ 360 -- among the items was an Indian boy £10; had Edward, b. at Plymouth (2); Lt. Nathaniel, b. at plymouth 1648, m. Desire, da. of Edward Gray, Jan. 10 1672, who was b. Nov. 6, 1651, -- he d. Jan. 14, 1711, and she d. Dec. 4, 1690; their chd. were, Constant of Tiverton, b. Aug. 12, 1674, and d. before 1706; Mary, April 3, 1676, m. Joseph Rider 1707; Capt. Ichabod, March 1678, of Middleboro, m. Esther, and d. Sept. 20, 1757; Elizabeth, m. James Sproat; Capt. Nathaniel, May, 1681, m. Jael Howland, and he d. April 8, 1757, and she d. Nov. 1743, or 1745; Edward, of Middleboro' 1788, m. Bridget Bosworth at Hull, June 25, 1711, and d. April 26, 1749, aet. 60 years; Mercy, m. Samuel Freeman May 12, 1658;

Alice, 1646, d. March 5, 1719, aet. 72, m. Col. Benj. Church 1667; Mary, m. David Alden; Elizabeth, m. William Fobes. The following is from her father's will: "Item, I will and bequeath unto my daughter E. S. my next best bed and furniture, with my wife's best bed, provided shee doe not marry William Fobbes; but if shee doe then to have five shillings;" Priscilla; William (3).

2. EDWARD, (s. of 1,) Dux., a deputy; often employed by the town in running ranges and settling hounds; had grants of land 1674, 1685 at Mill bk., and in 1689. He inherited the homestead and mill. He m. Nov. 16, 1669, Mary Pabodie; had Elizabeth, Nov. 1672, m. Saml. Weston March 4, 1716; Thomas, 1676 (4); Benjamin, 1680, m. Rebecca Delano Aug. 4, 1715, he d. May 12, 1756, aet 75; she d. The following account was taken from the family records of...

Dorothea Wilhelm  
Centerville, Massachusetts

In 1678, John Soule married a second wife, another Duxbury neighbor. She was born Esther Nash, daughter of Lt. Samuel Nash, and she was the widow of Samuel Sampson of Duxbury. She had two young sons, (and two daughters perhaps already married - ?). Samuel Sampson had been killed in King Philip's War. Esther, born in 1640 was just 36 years old.

John and Esther had three sons, Joseph, Joshua, and Josiah, born in 1679, 1681, and 1682 respectively. Baby Josiah was our ancestor. Before he came along, Pilgrim George and his good wife, Mary, had both died. He and his own little brothers never remembered their grandfather as their older brothers did, and they must often have asked for the tales he had told of the hard first years, and the long voyage of the Mayflower.

I have found no authoritative list of John Soule's children in the two sources I have at hand... Winsor's History of Duxbury, 1849, and Ridlon's "Soule Family", 1926. Winsor's list is obviously incomplete and inaccurate as is much of his genealogical material. Ridlon has gathered a great deal of data, without critical analysis, or reconciling divergent statements. Thus he says on p. 215, that Joshua was the only child of John and Esther Soule, and on p. 214, he assigns Josiah, b. 1682, to Rebecca who died before 1678. Then on p. 974, he gives another list of John's children, including some not mentioned in the first list. On p. 201 he quotes from town records, deeds proving John had sons Aaron, Benjamin, James, and John.

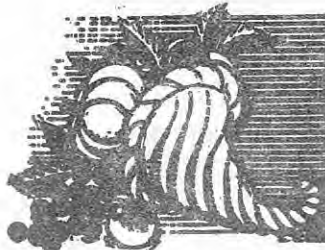
In these confusing statements certain dates stand out as proved by definite records: marriage of John Soule and Esther Sampson in 1678, births of Joseph, Joshua, and Josiah; and some dates of the older children. On this basis, I have made the following list -- to which I shall hold until I find documented corrections.

Rachel, b. (bef. 1670) m. John Cobb of Middleboro, who d. 1729; she d. Sept. 18, 1727  
Benjamin, b. 1665, m. Sarah Standish, d. 1729, in 64th yr. Rem. to Plympton.  
John, b. 1674, d. 1743. Rem. to Middleboro, m. Martha Tinkham.  
Zachariah -- possibly a son of Sachary, and nephew of John, who may have brought him up in his own household after Sachary's death in 1663.  
Or this may have been John's own son, b. in 1660's and d. 1690 in Canada Expedition.

John and Esther Soule were married in 1678, and settled in the old house in Duxbury. Indeed, it is likely that John had already been living there some time. Mary Beckett Soule, the Worcestershire lass who had crossed the ocean more than fifty years before to marry her childhood sweetheart, had died the year before. Pilgrim George Soule, nearing 80, and calling himself "very aged", was still no doubt head of the household, enjoying again his precious books, and taking interest in the doings of his grandchildren. That his son and daughter-in-law gave him loving care, he wrote in his will, for all to see, and know his appreciativeness.

George Soule died in 1680 -- almost the last of the Mayflower company. He was laid to rest among his old friends and neighbors, but the site of that earliest burying ground we do not know for sure.

The house was overflowing with children, especially if the new wife brought her Sampson boys along with her, as is likely. They began to set out for themselves -- John Soule gave his boys land -- the girls married. John himself was busy with his own farm, and with the civic duties he was given from time to time. He may have carried on his trade of tailor, if the one reference I have found to this is correct.

In 1690, young Zachariah joined in the expedition to Canada led by Sir William Phipps, and died there -- repeating the story of the older Zachary, his father (or uncle) who had perished in the earlier Canada expedition. Only young Zachary was unmarried, and left no one to follow in his footsteps.

When the new century began, in 1700, John and Esther Soule must have counted themselves fortunate indeed. He was 70 that year, and she was 62. Their three sons -- now 18, 19, and 21 years old -- lived at home and helped with all the farm work, hunting, fishing, clearing new land. Best of all they loved boats, and were most often to be found at the shore or out on the water.

The older children were scattered by now, married, and in homes of their own. Rachel had moved to Middleboro, but the other girls, Rebecca and Sarah, lived in Duxbury and could bring their children to see the grandparents fairly often. Aaron and his wife, Mary, were living in Marshfield, James and John had removed to Middleboro, and both had married Middleboro girls, Benjamin had gone to Plympton. His wife, Sarah Standish, was a granddaughter both of the old Captain of Plymouth and of John Alden.

Only Moses was not yet married, though he was courting Mercy Southworth, and was to marry her the next year. Moses was one of the quiet, industrious sort -- perhaps like his grandfather Simmons for whom he was named. He became a wealthy man and an extensive land owner, with holdings in other towns, even in the far off district of Maine. This land passed to his sons, who settled there, and founded one Maine branch of the Soule family.

John Soule at 70 was a vigorous man, still carrying his share of the husbandman's daily hard work. He would have been of medium height, stockily built, with straight eyebrows, deepset blue eyes, and a shock of shining white hair. He was outgoing and friendly, fond of children, and full of fun. Perhaps he'd been a good deal of a tease when he was younger. He had a cultivated mind, and probably enjoyed as much as anything a good live argument with his sons, or with his thoughtful neighbors.

He was respected by his fellow citizens for his integrity, and fairness, so that he became an arbitrator in disputes, executor of wills, guardian of minor children.

Esther, his good wife and companion, would have been the serene kind, with smooth hair, smiling eyes, and a firm chin. She was a knowledgeable housewife, and a wise mother. She was intelligent enough to share in her husband's love of reading -- perhaps she could read herself though I think she would have preferred his reading aloud. They knew how to share their prosperity, and kept their home the true center for all the children and grandchildren.

John Soule died in 1707. He had already given his sons their portions of the estate during his lifetime. The daughters now petitioned for their share and were awarded equal division of five lots of land situated in Middleboro, which was appraised at £ 17-5-0. His personal property was valued at £ 24-12-12. This included his precious library, which he had inherited from his father, and possibly added to himself.

Esther Soule survived her husband twenty-six years. She died in 1735, in her 96th year. She is buried in the old cemetery between Duxbury and Plymouth, so near the fence that one has to go outside the cemetery to read the inscription.

Josiah Soule  
1682 - 1764

The three youngest sons of John and Esther Soule must be considered as a unit. To all intents and purposes they were triplets. They came into the world within three years, and they went out of it, eighty-odd years later, within three years and a fraction more. For both parents they constituted a sort of second family. This was a second marriage for both of them, and each had a set of nearly grown, or indeed quite grown up, children.

Joseph Soule, b. July 31, 1679, d. July 11, 1763, m. Mary \_\_\_\_, abt. 1710.

Joshua Soule, b. Oct 12, 1681, d. May 29, 1767, m. Joanna Studley, abt. 1704.

Josiah Soule, b. 1682, d. June 25, 1764, m. Lydia Delano, May 25, 1704.

Colonial childhoods seem to have varied little between settlements or generations. Besides going to school, the boys would have helped their father on his farm -- broad and fertile acres now, not the back-breaking work of clearing virgin forest or rock-strewn fields. They would have found plenty of comrades among the youth growing up in Duxbury, and plenty of interests in the surrounding woods, in visits to neighboring towns, and most of all, in and on the water.

Love of the sea was strong in these three boys. In manhood, they built up a business in ship building, navigation, and merchandizing. They built the "Soule Fleet", including two staunch ships the "Seaflower" and the "Dolphin", in which they went bank fishing, and whale hunting in the North. They were dealers in furs, making purchases from the Indians in the backwoods of Maine. "My records prove this", Ridlon says.

"The Soule shipyard", he continues, "was on the west shore of the 'Nook', and was one of the first, if not the first, in New England... While running a common store, as nearly all early merchants did, he (Joshua Soule) sold ardent spirits and kept it in stock for his ship carpenters. Perhaps took a sniff himself to strengthen his loins and stimulate his buckram withal. As Parson Smith wrote, 'a good man, errors excepted.'" This was written of Joshua, but might have stood for any one of the three brothers. "When he died", Ridlon concludes, "he was buried near the shore where the wild waves roar."

Joshua seems to have been the most prominent of the three men, perhaps he was the most aggressive. Lacking the distinction of being either the eldest or the youngest of the "triplets", he had to assert himself somehow, and became their leader. At least his name appears in Winsor's History in several connections, his younger and older brothers scarcely at all. Joshua was a selectman in 1721 and again in 1728. But clearly all three were in the shipping business together, and all three remained life-time citizens of Duxbury.

Joseph seems to have been the quiet one, perhaps a little overwhelmed by the boisterous brothers who so soon pushed him out of his cradle. He may have been the studious one, sharing the bookish leanings of his father and grandfather. He was the only one of the three whom that Pilgrim grandfather ever saw, and even he would not have remembered the old man.

Josiah, I think of as one of the extrovert Soules -- not the least overawed by studious Joseph or by obstreperous Joshua, he would have held his own with both.

In 1701, when the boys were 19, 20, and 22 years old, their father, John, deeded to them all his lands in Duxbury, and more in other towns. None of the boys were married then, and the deed provided that if either of them died the other two should inherit his share. John Soule had already given lands to his older sons, who were by this time scattered to other towns of the Old Colony.

Aaron, the oldest, was in Marshfield. He had married Mary Wadsworth of Duxbury, and already (1701) had several small children. James and John had moved to Middleboro, and married there. Benjamin, after a short period in Middleboro, had settled in Plympton. He had married Sarah Standish, granddaughter of both Miles Standish and John Alden. Benjamin and Sarah founded what Ridlon calls the Plympton branch of the family.

Only Moses of this older batch of John Soule's children was still in Duxbury. He married in 1701, Mercy Southworth, daughter of Edward. They were both a year or two past 30 -- a late age for a colonial marriage. One wonders about their courtship -- long drawn out? Late blooming? Was she busy at home? Was he slow-moving like his Walloon grandfather Simmons, for whom he was named? Little is known about Moses, but he was a sailor and trader, and eventually moved to Maine, where his sons had preceded him. This was after Mercy's death, and he had married a second wife.

The Soule sisters had also married and gone, but not so far. On their father's death, intestate, in 1707, they put in a petition for some of his property and got it.

Josiah and Joshua married in 1704 -- Joseph a little later about 1710. Characteristically for quiet Joseph, we know only the first name of his wife, Mary, no surname, no dates. They had a family of five daughters.

Joshua's wife was Joanna Studley, of whose forbears I know nothing, but her name sounds like the vigorous, handsome executive sort of woman Joshua should have married. They had a family of nine, five boys and four girls, and Ridlon is full of prowess of their descendants.

Josiah, on May 24, 1704, married Lydia Delano of the prominent and aristocratic Delano family. She had dark hair and eyes, a slim graceful figure, and an air of distinction and a mind of her own. She brought a strain of French blood into the Soule family -- one wonders where it came out in her descendants. She and Josiah had six children, four boys and two girls. There were, according to Winsor:

Jonathan, b. 23 June 1705, d. 4 Apr 1776

Mary, b. 5 Dec 1706

Abisha, b. 25 Nov 1708, d. 4 Nov 1778

Micah, b. 12 Apr 1711, d. 4 Nov 1778

Nathaniel, b. 4 Nov 1714

Lydia, b. 2 Oct 1719

Only the first two were born before the death of their grandfather, John Soule, but all were grown up before grandmother Esther's death in 1735. They had all attained middle age before either Josiah or Lydia died. They died within a year of each other, Lydia on November 24, 1763, at the age of 83, and Josiah on June 25, 1764 at the age of 82.

The Duxbury of the "triplets" day, was peaceful and prosperous. It was a thriving town, and a port of some consequence. The disappointment of being joined to Massachusetts instead of continuing as Plymouth Colony with a charter of their own had long since been forgotten. Except for mention of companies of militia maintained, Winsor's History give practically no data for this whole half century. The first rumblings of trouble with England did not begin till the "triplets" were old men, and would have affected them not at all. It was the next two generations who would bear the brunt of that.

Their lifetime was devoted to peaceful progress, to extending Duxbury's maritime industries, and to trading for furs and timber in the District of Maine. In this period, many Duxbury men, including some of the Soule sons, cousins, and neighbors removed to Maine and founded towns and families there.

It is pleasant to think of the three old brothers rounding out their lives together. The yellow haired babies had become, after the mid-century, three white haired old men. Their blue eyes were if anything bluer from their sea faring. They were still hale and vigorous, still strong in will and in opinions, still arguing among themselves over the business, and with all and sundry on matters of general interest. They were known for integrity, and respected for uprightness.

Joseph died first, on 11 July 1863, lacking barely three weeks of being 84 years old. Josiah died about a year later, 25 June 1764, at the age of 82. Then Joshua, very much the patriarch at 85 and a half, died 29 May 1767. We hope his brothers were buried near him by the shore.

Joseph Soule's will is given by Ridlon (p. 398), but is wrongly ascribed to his nephew, Joseph, son of Joshua. The will, written Jan 1755, mentioned legacies to children of both Mary and Alatheia, who were now deceased, and makes Hannah and Rebecca executors. There is no mention of Lydia.

## FAMILY of JOSHUA SOULE AND JOANNA STUDLEY

1. Zuriiah, (daughter) b. 2 Nov 1705; m. 1728, Ebenezer Sampson; rec'd in father's will, "a small piece of salt meadow he (Ebenezer) used to cut, lying on the skirt," and "ten pounds to be paid in cash in two years of my decease."
2. John, b. 4 March 1708; married 1730 Mehitable (called Mable) Partridge; d. 1734, aet. 26, leaving two children, Lydia, b. 1733, and Samuel, b. 1734. The widow, Mabel, and John's brother (or father? - more likely) Joshua Soule were administrators of the estate. Mabel m. twice again. The children are mentioned in Joshua Soule's will. Lydia was given "the other part of my farm that I now live on or that layeth to the Eastward of the old wall fence, with all the buildings that are now upon it." Samuel was also made residuary legatee and sole executor. However, Samuel died in 1768, aet. 33, less than a year after his grandfather -- "in Carolina" according to Winsor, so he too may have been in the sefaring business. Samuel had presented his grandfather's will for probate, but there was some dispute among the heirs, and the court appointed persons "to give advice." They (names not given in Ridlon, p. 397) report that "having met at the house that Joseph and Samuel Soule now dwell in, and heard the parties and after consideration thereon do advise in order for an amicable agreement among said heirs, viz.: that all the lands and meadows that are given to Joshua and Samuel be equally divided between them." Does this mean Joshua, who is not mentioned in the will (Ridlon, p. 396), or Joseph? Evidently the Soule quick temper and some sense of slight was at work here. Anyway, Samuel died before the estate was settled, leaving four little children, and a widow who remarried a year later.
3. Ezekiel, b. Feb 17, 1711; m. 1733 Hannah Delano; do. in Woolwich, Maine, Sept. 25, 1768 (Ridlon, p. 396) or Dec 8, 1799 (Ridlon, p. 330). He was left, "a small piece of salt meadow" in his father's will. Ezekiel was elected deacon of the church in Duxbury in 1749, and was afterwards called "Deacon Soule" more out of respect for his Christian character than for the influence of the title. He was highly esteemed for his uprightness. He was a farmer and fisherman, and like so many of his kindred, a seaman, soon in command of his own ship. Probably was in business with his father and uncles. In the course of trading his fishing visits to the District of Maine, he purchased a large tract of wild land, in Woolwich, which he began to cultivate, and built a house and barns in preparation for removal there. In 1766, (Ridlon, ;. 328) with his live stock, his household furnishings, and his family, upon his own ship, he sailed for Woolwich in Maine. "He had assisted in the Soule shipyard in Duxbury where so many craft had been "keel-founded", and being born a mariner by his inheritance from a race of

Norsemen, he took to the sea as instinctively as the proverbial duck to water." He continued his seafaring employment after his settlement in Maine.

Ezekiel and Hannah Delano Soule had seven children, all born in Duxbury, and all moved to Maine with their parents. Their descendants are the "Wollrich branch".

4. Joshua, b. May 30, 1713. What happened to him? He is not mentioned in his father's will -- may have died young. Ridlon, p. 396, gives no data.
5. Abigail, b. April 30, 1716, m. 1730 Percy Drew. She is mentioned in her father's will, and received, "the house and farm whereon they now live with the building yard (ship yard), also £ 10 in two years after my decease." Ony may judge that Percy was employed in the Soule ship yard.
6. Joanna, b. 1719. She is not mentioned in her father's will. No further data.
7. Joseph, b. March 15, 1722, m. 1742 to Mercy Fullerton. He received lands in Maine and at Pine-point as mentioned in his father's will. From the will and the dispute about it, it appears that Joseph and his nephew, Samuel (see above), lived in the same house in Duxbury. He, too, was both farmer and fisherman, and spent much of his active life on the sea with his brothers. He was a prominent man in Duxbury where he seems to have resided all his life. Joseph and Mercy Soule had nine children (Ridlon, p. 399-400). The oldest of them, Joshua, moved to Maine about 1769, and founded the Avon, ME, branch of the family. His son, Joshua, became a Bishop in the Methodist Church, and was very famous in his day (Ridlon, p. 404-411). Another son of Joseph and Mercy Soule, Ezekiel, remained all his life in Duxbury, in the traditional seafaring employ, and died there at the age of 94, having "retained his faculties; was serene and happy sitting under snowy locks, and was visited by many of his kindred and old friends, all of whom delighted to honor him." (Ridlon, p. 400)
8. Nathan, b. July 12, 1725; m. bef. 1763 to Sarah \_\_; d. 1783. From his father's will, he received "the westerly part of the farm I now live on," and other land. Removed to Waldoboro, ME, bef. 1773, where he was a fence viewer. Data scant due to destruction of public records by fire.
9. Sarah, b. July 25, 1728; m. 1747, Aaron Bisbee. She was left £ 18 in her father's will. She had four children (Winsor, p. 228).

## FAMILY OF JOSIAH AND LYDIA DELANO SOULE

1. Jonathan, b. 1705; d. 1776, aet. 71. apparently unmarried. No data.
2. Mary, b. Dec. 6, 1706; m. Jan 2, 1773, Josiah Cushman, b. Oct 14, 1708, d. Marshfield, 1764. He was the son of Robert Cushman. Mary d. bef. 1752, when Josiah m. 2d Deborah Ford. Ridlon, p. 1069, is the only source so far. Josiah's daughter, Mary, is said (Ridlon) to have married Joshua Cushman, but this is refuted by Joseph's will, therefore, this is likely to be correct. Ridlon, 1069 gives list of her children.
3. Abisha, b. 1708; m. May 14, 1741, Abigail Delano; d. Jan 4, 1778, aet. 70. Their children were: Abigail, 96 yrs. in 1850, b. 1754; John, went to ME and died there bef. 1851; Nathaniel, 83 yrs., in 1850, b. 1767; Abisha, d. at sea, bef. 1850. Nathaniel, b. in the "Gurnet" stood watch there

With his father, Abisha, at the Gurnet on the night the British left Marshfield and while three British vessels lay off the harbor. Nathaniel, Capt., b. 12 Aug, 1767, son of Abisha and Abigail Delano Soule; m. Jan 1794, Lydia Freeman (1771-1827); d. Oct 13, 1862. "One of the old-style master mariners among the Soules." (Ridlon, p. 960)

4. Micah, b. 1711; m. May 25, 1740, Mercy Southworth; d. 1778.

5. Nathaniel, b. 1714.

6. Lydia, b. 1719; m. Ichabod Simmon; d. bef. 1771. She had 6 children. Ichabod Simon m. 2d Mercy Sprague. See Ridlon, 0. 989 and Winsor, p. 308.

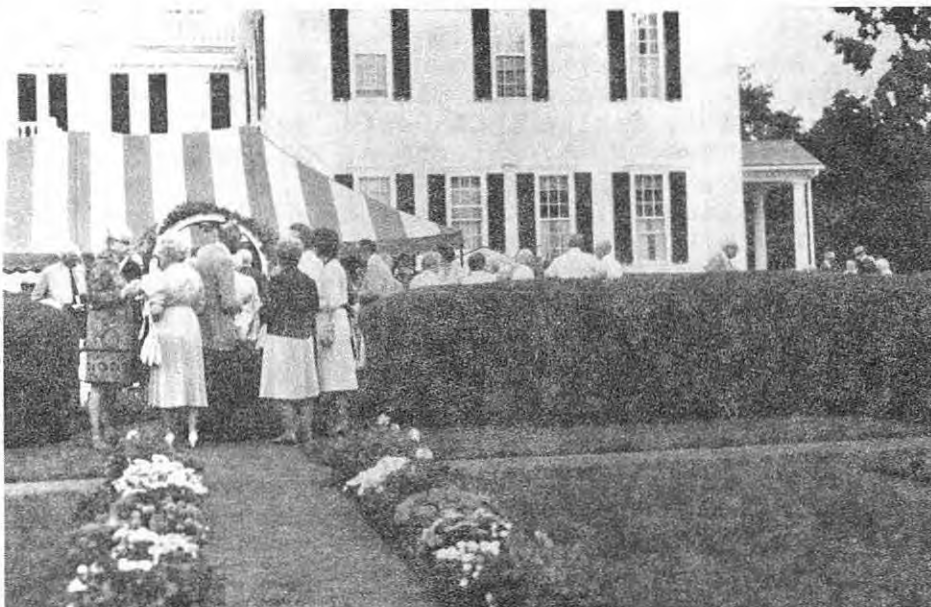

There aren't many other goals left. His first race, and his first victory, came at age 5 after neighborhood pressure and an Impression Five Museum bicycle history exhibit helped kindle his interest. His father said he could go to one more race that summer, so Soule picked the state championship. His second-place finish sealed his dedication to the sport and convinced his parents they might have stumbled onto something.

"I didn't know anything about BMX," his mother said. "I thought of motorcycling right away, which I'd always been brought up to be afraid of."

Schwinn of East Lansing, was found to provide the missing know-how, and mechanical whiz Lee Payne soon had Soule's equipment built up to a national level.

After two world titles, he acquired national sponsorship with the four-rider Hutch BMX team, a top goal for any rider. "The Little Hoieshot," as Soule is known for his explosive start, teams with 10-, 15- and 16-year-old riders in Richard Hutchins' stable.

From there, it has been one National Bicycle League or American Bicycle Association title after another. Traveling across the country, with tremendous cooperation from his Bath Middle School teachers, the boy's total grew to 50, 75, 100, 125.

Then came the Special Olympics idea . . . and now the count begins again.

## Gifts from a champion

Call it a soulful gesture by a special young man.

Andrew Soule doesn't have physical cares, just a lot of trophies. Special Olympics participants seldom have the hardware, only a surplus of heart.

Today, that equation will change a bit.

Athletes running, jumping and hugging in future Special Olympics soon will have Soule's 125-plus-bicycle motocross (BMX) trophies to cherish. The two-time world champion's treasures are bound for Mount Pleasant, where their glow won't match the smiles.

IN A TIME of public skepticism with sports, of athletic arrogance and selfishness, Soule's gift grows to giant proportions. The 4-foot-5 Lansing 8-year-old is about to make other youngsters feel 10 feet tall.

"I saw the Special Olympics on TV," he said. "I decided that I had so many trophies I ought to give them some. I talked it over with my mom, and dad, and they thought it was a good idea, too. So, that's what I decided to do."

Though his parents, Tom and Joyce Soule, were there to steer him along, it's clear the course chosen was Andrew's.

Even the rarest child with the

most compassionate upbringing would normally need a push to part with his prizes. Soule's motivation came from at least four indelible incidents.

"WE WENT to a 'Race for Life' put on by the Crippled Children's Hospital in Buffalo," his mother, a teacher at Bath Middle School, said. "Andrew was 6 at the time. He looked around and the difference in kids' abilities made quite an impression. He saw how really lucky he was."

"Then, he became upset. 'Mama,' he asked me, 'won't these kids ever get to ride a bike like I can? Is that fair?'"

It wasn't any fairer when he learned that a friend and fellow BMX racer from Jackson has leukemia. Another "Race for Life" will be held for the boy's benefit, with Soule an eager participant.

THE STORIES that touched him aren't all sad, however. In fact, the gap between others' disabilities and his natural ability narrowed recently. Thanks to a system of visual signals, replacing traditional audio cues, another friend conquered the competitive disadvantage of deafness. Now, he can handle the same BMX jumps and turns as his peers.

But everyone isn't equal, in competition or in life. A friend's funeral accentuated the difference.

"One of his racing buddies from Mulliken was killed in a freak accident in a dune buggy," Soule's mother said. "He had never really won anything, and he looked up to Andrew. At the funeral the few trophies he had were placed out in front of the casket. That showed Andrew how much things like that can mean to some people."

TO SOULE, who had one trophy that stood 19 inches taller than he did, the contrast was striking. There had to be a better place for the loot overflowing his home.

"We were sort of running out of room," his father said, laughing. "After seeing the crippled children on TV, he knew he'd found a worthwhile purpose for them. He's still racing, so it's not like he won't have a chance to win more."

A lot more. He has 16 national event titles this year alone, with the International BMX Championship in the Pontiac Silverdome on Oct. 10-11 — perhaps the sport's most prestigious race ever — and the Jag World Championship in Indianapolis over Christmas the biggest tests remaining in 1981.

"I MIGHT GET to go to Japan if I win in the Silverdome," Soule said. "But I guess my biggest goal is just another world championship."

## Colonel F. T. Parker

Graveside services for Col. Frederic T. Parker, 83, of Arlington, Va., were held this morning (Wednesday) in the Riverview cemetery in Rock Rapids with Rev. Don Niederfrank officiating. Arrangements are under the direction of Jongewaard-Roste Funeral Home of Rock Rapids.

He died Saturday, October 10, at an Arlington hospital.

Parker was born in Rock Rapids November 5, 1897, the son of Lilly Thompson and Frederic B. Parker. He graduated from Grinnell college in 1920 and attended Harvard university graduate school of business administration. He also attended and

graduated from the army's industrial college.

During World War I he enlisted in the student army training corps, was commissioned a second lieutenant of field artillery and was discharged on December 14, 1918.

In 1924 he was commissioned second lieutenant field artillery organized reserve corps; he maintained his reserve or active duty status until he retired as colonel in December 1957.

Active duty included command of civilian conservation corps camps in Mississippi and Tennessee. In 1940 he was recalled to active duty in the corps of engineers and he subsequently served as post engineer at many locations including a 15 months' stay (1945-1946) with the royal air force as post engineer at Nassau, Bahamas, British West Indies and two years in the Territory of Hawaii. He was relieved from active duty in 1950.

Col. Parker then returned to the Washington, D.C. area where he was employed in the office of the chief of engineers, military district of Washington, as construction management engineer for three years before going with the National Security agency in the same capacity. He retired from the civil service in 1958.

He was a perpetual member of the Military Order of World Wars, Northern Virginia Chapter; life member of the National Association for Uniformed Services; Veterans of World War I; and Reserve Officers association; a member of the Harvard business school club of D.C.; a charter member of the Harvard Masonic lodge (AF & AM) at that

university and other Masonic orders in Iowa.

# Outlook Is Bleak For Camp Soule

LARGO — Until centrally located Camp Soule is sold, business leaders say they will not help raise the estimated \$1.2-million to \$1.6-million Boy Scout leaders need to develop a new wilderness camp, a recently completed survey found.

And that leaves scouting leaders in a bind, says Bruce Belnap, president of the Pinellas Area Council. They can hang onto Soule and not have money to build a camp on almost 1,200 acres of secluded land north of Pinellas, or lose Soule and have a jump on building the new camp.

It doesn't look good for Camp Soule, he admits. Belnap says the 100 acres of Camp Soule, located just north of Dunedin, long has been a favorite weekend and summer retreat. Its central location to Pinellas cities provides ready access for scouts headed to the woods for merit badge training.

But at the same time, urban sprawl is closing in on the camp, he says. Houses already dot the far side of the lake and the sounds of city life can be heard throughout the camp.

"Nobody wants to lose Camp Soule, particularly because it is convenient for evening and weekend training," Belnap says. "But it is no longer a wilderness camp."

A study the council conducted found business leaders in different communities unwilling to help raise the at least \$1.2-million needed for building the new camp until after Camp Soule is sold.

While no exact figure on the value of the Camp Soule land is available, Belnap estimates the land would be worth between \$15,000 and \$30,000 an acre. That would mean the tract could bring in between \$1.5-million and \$3-million — enough to pay for improvements on the new camp.

It also would mean no nearby camp for evening activities. One alternative being considered is selling all but a sliver of Camp Soule so enough money is raised, but so part of the scouting retreat is kept, Belnap says.

The selling of Camp Soule is a highly "emotional" issue, Belnap says. When scouting leaders first announced last year they were considering selling Camp Soule, public pressure forced them to back off. But things have not gotten any better and "it might be short-sighted, possibly, to hang onto it (Soule)," he says.

Only after Camp Soule is sold, and the council still is short of the money it needs to put a long-term camp on the DiePolder property it owns, would business leaders be willing to help raise additional cash, the report says.

"It is becoming clearer that our alternatives are being limited," Belnap says. A final decision on what is to be done with Camp Soule will be made in coming months.

The DiePolder property sits in the Weeki Wachee Springs area — 55 miles removed from Pinellas scouts. But it offers scouts the opportunity of developing perhaps one-fourth of the 1,200 acres into campsites and activity areas for crafts and skills, leaving the rest natural, Belnap says.

Before the DiePolder property could be used on a large scale, water wells and a sewage treatment plant must be built, scouting leaders say. The lake must be draglined and swimming, boating and camping facilities constructed.

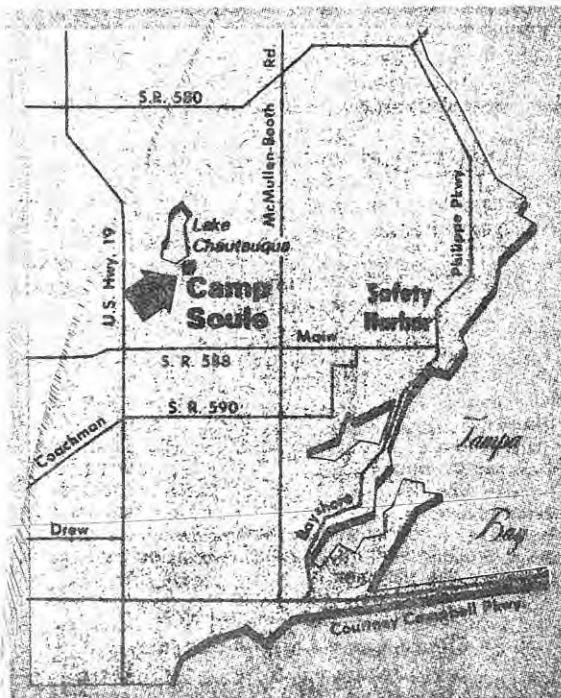
At the root of the problem, Belnap says, is financial difficulty — and he says the community is responsible for that. For the past several years, contributions to scouting programs — most made through the United Way — have been dwindling.

"We're not giving the kids in this county a fair shake," Belnap says. "This is a very difficult time for us, financially."

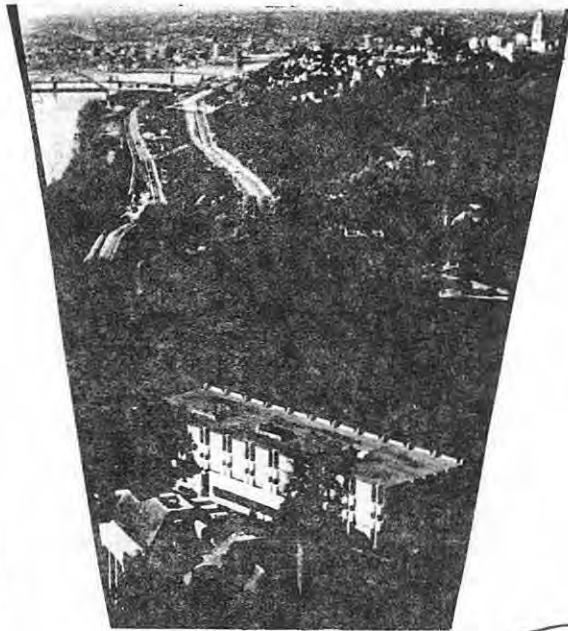

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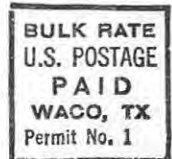
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
