FAMILY HISTORIAN'S REPORT by Geraldine Sowle Schlosser

Much as been happening in the Historian's Department in the last few months. First of all, I travelled to New Jersey in November to meet Pres. Jim Soule and Treas. Betty-Jean Haner at the Terry home. We sorted the material there. The name index cards and Col. John Soule's "red notebooks" will be sent to Albany for later transfer to New England Historic Genealogical Society. The rest of the material which includes reference books and periodicals, plus filing cabinets and a bookcase will come to me. When it arrives, I hope to be able to catalog the library in order to make it more usable. The moving companies will take only a small load when there is room on a larger load going the same direction—so we don't know when this transfer will take place. I hope that I'll be able to report in the next Newsletter that the move is finished.

The other exciting development development is the purchase of a microfilm/microfiche reader/printer for the historian's use. Those of you who were at the Des Moines reunion realize how time-consuming it was to hand-crank my portable reader. This enables me to find things much more quickly, because the drive is motorized. When I locate the desired material, I can make a print of it, without having to copy by hand or typewriter. This should enable me to respond to questions more quickly. (There has been sort of a hiatus from Thanksgiving to the New Year, but we should be back on schedule soon. Please bear with me, those of you who have written and haven't had a response.)

Watch for your November Mayflower Quarterly. There should be an article in it by Jane Schotland, SK member, telling how she solved the lineage of Sylve Sturtevant, who was the daughter of Hannah Soule 5 1732-1795 (Zachariah 4, Benjamin 3, John 2, George 1) and Church Sturtevant. Jane now lives in Arizona, but makes frequent trips back to New England where she grew up. While there last summer she was able to prove the lineage by using vital records. This lineage does not appear in Mayflower Families 3.

Are you a member of the Society of Mayflower Descendants? We would like to encourage you to join so that many lines to George Soule are on record in Plymouth. As historian, I would be willing to help you in any problem areas. The problems seem to arise in linking the 6th to the 7th generations. This is the time period when families were moving West, and vital records are scarce. Searching land and probate records often provides the needed information. Is there a member living in or near Schoharie County, New

My husband Jim has been at work creating a "Spouse Index" to the Soule Kindred Index prepared by Milton Terry. The work is rather tedious, so don't expect an early completion.

Assistant Historian Jack Sowles has been noting additions and corrections to the original index. We will try to get these in a form for printing soon. The format will be the same as the original index.



In November of 1620, after a. voyage of more than two months across the Atlantic, the little ship Mayflower, carrying one hundred and two weary passengers, arrived off the shore of Cape Cod.

Before landing the men of the party signed a solemn compact, agreeing to be governed by law enacted by elected officials.

Among those who signed was George Soule.

Although he was listed as a bonded servant of Edward Winslow, he is believed to have been an educated man of an old Worcestershire family; this was the same part of England from which came the Winslow. family.

The SOULE family, which had settled in Worcestershire during the 14th century, was a branch of an older Kentish family whose name at various times has been written SOULE, SOLE, SOLES and 'SOLLY.

The family is believed to have settled in the vicinity of the once important seaport of Sandwich, on the eastern coast of Kent, at the time of the Norman Conquest of England in

Its original home was near the city of Coustances in northwest France, where the main branch of the family has remained until modern times.

Of the French family was Pierre Soule, the final "e" is accented, who was exiled from France in 1824 for political reasons.

He settled in Louisiana, which he later represented in the United States Senate.

The Scottish branch of the family was founded during the reign of David I (1124-1153) who encouraged many landless knights to settle in his kingdom; Ranulph de Soule obtained lands in Liddesdale.

His descendant, Sir John de Soulis was one of the patriots who fought at the side of Robert Bruce to free Scotland from English dominion.

In that country the name became written as SOULIS or SOULES.

In the west of England it was written as SOLLEY, SOWLEY and SOLERS.

RECORDING OF FAMILY DATA By Geraldine Sowle Schlosser, Associate Historian

One of the objectives of Soule Kindred is the gathering of information pertaining to the descendants of Pilgrim George Soule. Mayflower Families 3 covers the first 5 generations, to about 1800. Our families did a lot of moving around in the 19th century, and you can help locate migration patterns for family groups. That is why the Family Data Chart is printed in each issue of the Newsletter. Our historian may be able to help you with that "missing link". So please keep the information coming.

We would like to suggest that you begin with your sixth generation ancestor from George Soule (or your earliest Soule ancestor, if you haven't made the connection to George!). Fill out a form for that ancestor, and then submit forms for each of your ancestors down to yourself. This is especially important if you descend through a female line; Soule women who marry tend to become lost Soules.

We'll give a short explanation of how to fill out the form. Samples were printed in V. 20, #2 and #3-- April and July, if you'd like to refer to those.

- (1) The "Generation" space in the upper left corner shows the generation from the immigrant ancestor. Please leave it blank unless you are certain.
- (2) In the far upper space on the right for "FAMILY", leave it blank if the surname of "Soule Descendant" is SOULE, SOWLE, or variants, because we'll assign a code number for closely related family groups. If the "Soule Descendant" has a different surname, insert the name in the right upper space.
- (3) The next two lines show the ancestors of the "Soule Descendant" back to George Soule¹. Unless you have an approved Mayflower Lineage or other positive proof, we suggest this be left blank.
- (4) When writing dates, follow the genealogical style-- first the day in numbers, then the month in letters, and the full year, such as 6 Feb 1833.
- (5) When listing children on the reverse side, put in as much information as you can-- such as spouse's parents, if known.
- (6) List your name and address as compiler unless someone else gathers the information. We may need to contact the compiler.
- (7) It is VERY important to list sources of data; if the information comes from a family Bible or other record, a photocopy of the information should be included. Other sources, such as Vital Records from towns or states, and census should be indicated.
 - (8) Leave "Verification" blank for our purposes.
- (9) Please give as many clues as possible to facilitate further research. If you are uncertain about a date, enter it, but add "circa" or "ca". For questionable place names, add "possibly" or "probably".

KELDGORD, HETTY SOULE a Mayflower de-scendant and pioneer Fresno educator died November 20, 1989 in Sacramento, where she had lived since 1979. She was 100 years of age.

Mrs. Keldgord was porn in Michigan on September 23, 1889, and was a descendant of George Soule, who came to America on the Mayflower. She taught in Michigan for five years before moving to Fresno in 1915. She was graduated from Western Michigan Normal School (now Western Michigan University) in 1910, and also from Fresno State University in 1916 and 1941. She retired in 1954 as the Principal of Fig Garden Elementary School District, a position she had held since 1926. Between 1915 and 1926, she was on the faculties of the Riverbend School in Kingsburg, Round Mountain School, West Park School and Herndon School. In recognition of her con-tributions to the Fig Garden District, alumni installed an on-site plaque in her honor in 1964.

She was a 50 year member of Raisina Chapter, Order of Eastern Star, and was the senior Past Matron of San Joaquin Val-

ley Court, Order of Amaranth. Sne was a member of the First Congregational Church of Fresno and the Fresno Retired Teachers Association. Teachers Association.

She was the widow of Clarence Keldgord, a Fresno accountant, to whom she was married in 1917 and who died in 1943. She is survived by a son, Robert E. Keldgord, who is the Chief Probation Officer of Sacramento County; by a grandson, Robert Jr. of Lake Isabella; by a granddaughter, Karen Lanfranki of Walnut Creek; and by three great grandchildren.

Services will be held on Monday, November 27, 1989, 11am, John N. Lisle Chapel, under joint auspice of the First Congregational Church and Raisina Chapter, OES.

GENEALOGICAL PITFALLS - OLD MEANINGS OF WORDS

It is difficult to persuade those who have not used original documents that spelling was a rather casual affair from 1620-1820. Words and even names were spelled the way they sounded to each writer. In a single deed, a man's surname may be spelled several different ways. Indeed, not until about the Civil War did there suddenly appear to be a "right" and a "wrong" way to spell words, and relatives started feuding over the "correct" way to spell their family names.

Even the terminology expressing family relationships was not as precise as today and the genealogist who applies only modern meanings to the terms cousin, in-law, junior, and spinster can draw some very wrong conclusions.

Here are a few examples of the use of these terms, taken from the Colonial period:

Cousin—although we usually apply the term rather strictly today to the children of our aunts and uncles, in the early days of our country, cousin often meant nephew, niece, or an even more distant relative. Perhaps this sort of meaning survives today among nersons who share the same remote immi-grant ancestor, or merely descend from fellow passengers on the Mayflower and yet address each other as "cousin.

In-law—a relationship produced by law, rather than by nature. Thus a man's father-in-law was either his wife's father or his own mother's new husband. It is rather plain when a 14 year old boy chooses as guardian his "father-in-law", that step-father is meant. The terms son-in-law, etc., had the same dual

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Junior-one of the most misleading of all terms, for although we limit its use today to the man whose father bears the same name, 200 years ago it meant merely the younger man in town bearing that name, be he cousin, nephew, grandson of senior, or even no relation at all. As middle names were virtually unknown until the 1800s, and towns often had several families of the same name, those who also carried the same first name were bound to become difficult to distinguish. They lessened the confusion for themselves (but not for us) by labelling the elder man Sr, and the younger, Jr. When Sr, died or moved from town, Jr. stopped using the title. When a third of the same name appeared in town, this again altered the order. Visualize, if you can, the town of Wallingford, Conn., where five men, all bearing the name John Hall, lived at the same time. They were called, from eldest to youngest, Sr., Jr., 3rd, 4th, and 5th with-out regard to their family relationship. If 3rd died or moved from town, 4th and 5th then became 3rd and 4th and so on. One may even find deeds where a man refers to him-self as "Jr., formerly 3rd." Could there be a more confusing situation?

The author has seen a will in Plymouth, Mass, where a man named Samuel referred to his sons Benjamin, Jr., Samuel, Jr., and David. Samuel Sr. may well have had a brother in town also named Benjamin, thus Samuel's son must be called Jr. to avoid legal confusion.

Spinster-even more experienced genealogists say this meaning has not faced them, so perhaps it is a Massachusetts phenomenon, however, the author has found enough examples using the term to mean "a woman who spins" rather than the popular "an old maid" (both are Webster definitions) to prove that is not an error. We had spent some time checking wills and deeds searching for various female Mayflower descendants who had married, and found documents describing women of those very names as spinsters. At first we passed them up, but finally found proof that these were the women we sought. Here are two examples we have collected:

Plymouth (Mass.) Co. deeds 36:144. "Adam Hall and Sarah Hall, wife to the said Adam and we Mary Sherman and Abigail Sherman ... the above said Adam yeoman and Sarah, Mary and Abigail spinsters," sell land to Cornelius White, Jr. of Marshfield, 28 March 1744.

Plymouth (Mass.) Co. probate 40:234. "I Deborah Reed of Weymouth in the County of Norfolk, spinster . . . give to my sons
Seth Reed, Noah Reed . . . five daughters
. . . 11 April 1804 . . . presented as last will
and testament of Deborah Reed late of
Abington, widow, decessed. 3 June 1805."

Brother-may mean brother-in-law, church brother, or step-brother, etc.

Unmarried—this term may only mean that the person's spouse is dead, that he is presently unmarried. This usage continues today in land records and even occurs in the deeds conveying the Winslow House in Plymouth to the General Society.

A final word to sum up, don't draw conclusions about ancestors without knowing the facts. You may climb the wrong family tree!

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
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
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
