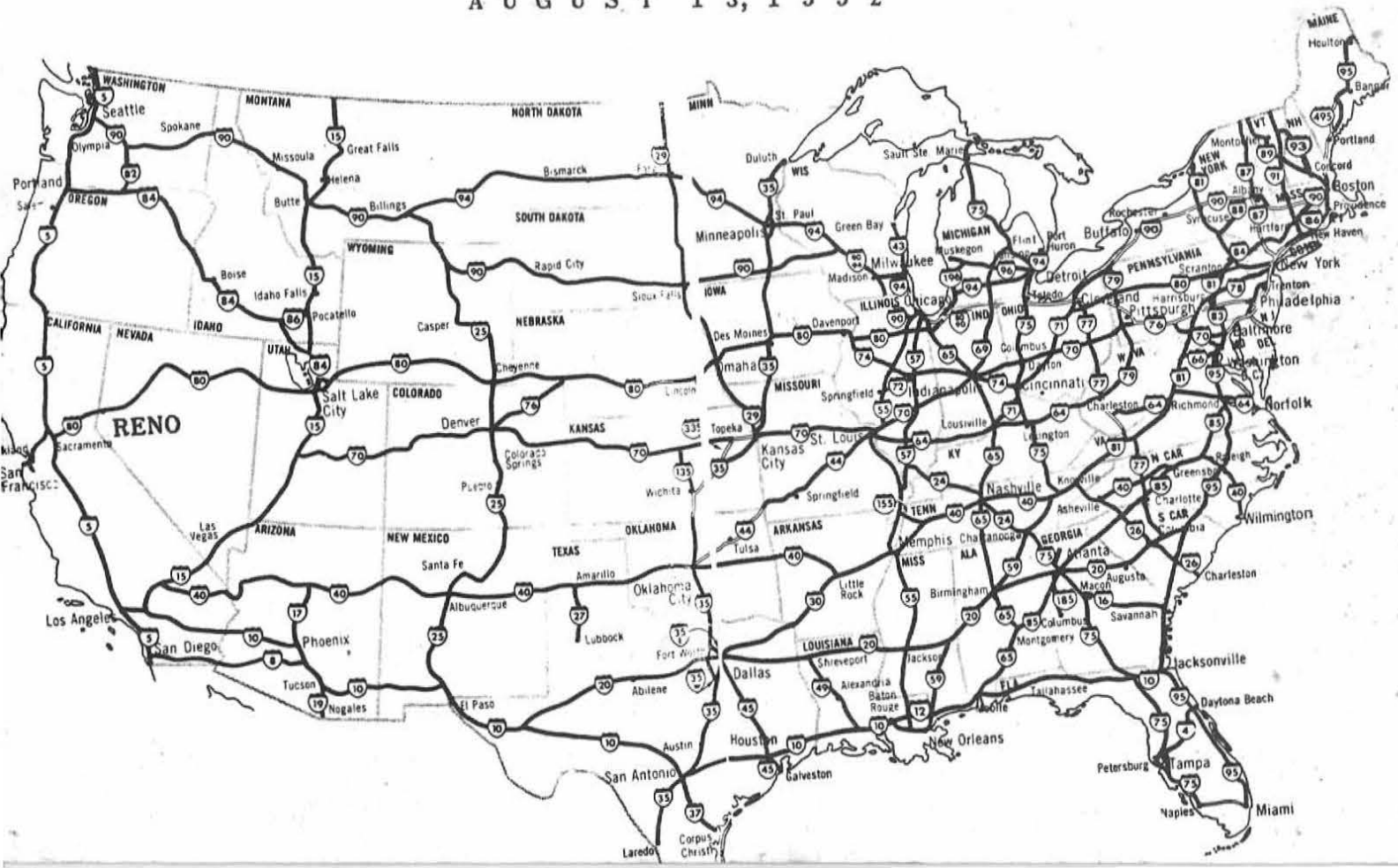

I want to deeply thank you for cards, letters and calls which I have received and the prayers of so many. I thank God for hearing and being close to me every hour of every new day.

"Kodiak, Alaska, Advent, and Joy"

On Thursday I returned from a week's trip to Alaska. I went with Jim Soule, a member of this church to whom Alaska -- particularly Kodiak, Alaska -- means an awful lot.

You see, Jim's brother, Bill, and his wife, Marion, lived there for many years. They discovered Kodiak, while they were both in the Navy. It had a magic for them that they couldn't resist. After the Navy they returned with their two daughters, Pam and Pat, to live out their years in Kodiak.

Jim first went to Kodiak in 1972 to attend the funeral of his brother, Bill, who had died unexpectedly at 49 years of age. Although it was a sad trip for Jim, the magic of the Island captured him, just as it had his brother before him.

Many an August since, Jim returned to Kodiak to fish, to gather his thoughts, and to visit his sister-in-law and two nieces, for whom he had become a second father.

Now that Jim has cancer, he wanted to return one last time. He was afraid he might not be well enough, if he waited for another August. Besides, he had never seen Kodiak in the winter.

To tell you the truth, I wasn't enthusiastic at first about going to Alaska in December. I had all kinds of excuses. Advent is a busy time of the year, you know, and similar rationalizations. But how could I say no? I couldn't, nor could the church. So, off to Alaska, whose motto is "The Last frontier," Jim and I went.

Am I ever glad we did. It was the experience of a lifetime. Flying over the Harding Icefields between Anchorage and Kodiak was a sight to behold, as was flying above the clouds and seeing the peak of Mt. McKinley rising above the clouds. I can't begin to tell you how breath-taking it was to drive through the snow covered mountains of Kodiak and to look down upon the stupendous views of bay after bay in the Gulf of Alaska.

What made the trip truly memorable for me, however, was not all the sights, but sharing the experience with Jim. We spoke often about life and death. It's one thing to talk about death in a detached, almost philosophical manner. It's quite another, when you don't expect to see Thanksgiving again or ever return to your idea of paradise on earth, where if you were healthy -- you would have built an A-frame retirement home for yourself.

As you might expect, a few tears were shed. Some of the most beautiful were shed in the Seattle airport on our way to Alaska. Jim's two nieces, who now live in Seaside, Oregon, traveled three and a half hours to see him between planes for forty minutes, most likely the last forty minutes they'd spend with their beloved uncle.

There were, of course, light moments as well. There was the time, for example, Jim pointed out the ad in the Kodiak Daily Mirror for something I might like to buy. It was an ad for "Rotten Irish Pups," that is, for pups who were part Irish Wolfhound and part German Rottweiler.

There was also our unforgettable visit to the Russian Orthodox Church. It had snowed the night before in Kodiak. When we approached the church, an old Russian Orthodox priest with a scraggly, white beard met us at the front door with a broom in his hands. Before we could enter, he made us sweep off the snow from each other's boots. Once inside, where the strong scent of incense from the morning's Mass was

still in the air, and after we told him who we were, the old priest chuckled, "Wait till my people hear I made a Methodist pastor from Minnesota sweep off his boots before coming into church."

Of course, no matter how far away from home you go, you're never really that far. On Tuesday I attended the Kodiak Rotary Club meeting. After I registered as a visiting Rotarian from Minnesota, the woman beside me introduced herself as the Executive Director of Kodiak Island's Convention and Visitors Bureau. She (Lois Hansen) used to teach in Orono, and one of her sons (Chan Payton) lives near Lake Minnetonka (with his uncle, Ray Zetzloff). The parents of another club member were guests at the meeting. They're from Mankato, Minnesota. Another visiting Rotarian, who is now from the State of Virginia, grew up in Minneapolis and graduated from South High School. It truly is a small world.

Nonetheless, the whole experience was for me humbling. It was humbling to be with a man, not yet 62 years of age, for whom this would have been -- had he had good health -- the first of many such retirement experiences.

It was humbling for me to be with a man of faith, who -- when I came to Excelsior five years ago -- was going through the same thing with his wife, Nan. Yet, now that it was his fate as well, there was no rancor in him. There was not even regret, when we left his dreamland for the last time. There was only a sense of grateful satisfaction for the opportunity to experience Kodiak one more time, this time in the winter of the year and in the winter of his life. Strangely, there was a sense of joy in Jim, despite the natural sadness of not having one's full quota of the three score and ten years allotted to us in the Bible.

I was humbled, because my friend, Jim, was teaching me, his pastor, the meaning of Advent, the meaning of living in-between the "already" of Christ's birth and the "not yet" of his Second Coming, the meaning of living life as a pilgrim, as one who is not fully at home here. He was teaching me the joy of living, even amidst the pain of illness and the pain of unfulfilled dreams. More than teaching, Jim was showing me by personal example the joy about which we have already sung this morning and will sing again.

Never again will I hear or sing these hymns and think of joy, superficially, as that giddy feeling that God is in the heavens and all is right with the world. Henceforth, I will understand that joy is the inner peace that comes from knowing that by the grace of God one has attempted to live according to the Will of God, that one has attempted to live by faith and love.

In one of our talks in Kodiak Jim told me of a recurring memory he has. In it he's 10 or 11 years old, still living in Mound. He's on a school bus, going to one or another activity. The window next to him is open. The wind blowing by is playing over and over again "America, the Beautiful." Jim repeated for me the line, "O beautiful for pilgrim feet, Whose stern impassion'd stress, a thoro'ghfare for freedom beat, across the wilderness." When Jim -- whose ancestors came here on the Mayflower -- finished, he turned to me and said, "It's been quite a trip for this pilgrim's feet. Quite a good and beautiful one."

So it has. So it has. May this special Advent teach us all to live as pilgrims on earth, whose joy is to live at peace with oneself, with one's fellows, and with the Creator of the Harding Icefields.

That we may be so blessed, let us now pray in silence -

FAMILY HISTORIAN'S REPORT

GOOD NEWS for descendants of William/Bildad⁶ Soule who lived in Vigo County, IN. You will be glad to know that Joe Cox phoned me with the information that his lineage is being accepted by the General Society of Mayflower Descendants. The Historian General, after receiving copies of correspondence from Col. John Soule written in 1970, and re-submission of material that was apparently lost from some files, has decided that William and Bildad were the same individual. This was a Kindred effort, with help from Fred Soules of Lorena TX and Glenn Whitecotten of Los Alamos NM.

I have been working for the last few months preparing the supplement to Milton Terry's Soule Kindred Index. It should be appearing in this issue, along with corrections. If you already have the original index, you could clip these pages and file them with the Terry index. I was hoping to complete an index of Soule descendants with other surnames in time for the reunion, but data entry is slow and proofreading time-consuming. I am through the "F"s-- a little less than half!

We are still trying to find a father for William Sowle the Loyalist who went from Spencertown NY to Alburgh VT soon after he participated in the Battle of Saratoga. I am asking for help in looking for some records. I'd like to have someone check land records in the Albany County (NY) court house. The New York State Library, Manuscripts and Special Collections, at the Empire State Plaza (also in Albany) has a major collection on Loyalists. There are also Loyalist records in Canada at the Public Archives in Ottawa, Ontario. If anyone is available to do research in these areas, please write me and I'll tell you what to look for. Kindred member George Soule of Northfield, MN, will be spending some time in England this fall, and has offered to do some searching in British sources.

Regarding my musings about the given name "Sardine" in the Summer 1991 Newsletter, Mrs. K.R. (Marie) Renstrom of Spring Valley CA wrote me: *"...You wondered about the name of my great-grandfather, Sardine Soule. Well, so have I. In the Webster's New World Dictionary, 1964 edition I found the following-- 'Sard-- of Sardis, Sardinian stone. 1. A very hard deep orange-red variety of chalcedony. 2. a piece of this, also sardine.'* Since his middle name was Stone I've often wondered if perhaps his parents made a little word play of his name. Perhaps he was red haired when born (I have red haired relatives) or possibly he was quite red skinned at birth."

Any other comments about odd given names, such as "Almond" or "Salmon"?

RECORDING OF FAMILY DATA

One of the objectives of Soule Kindred is the gathering of information pertaining to the descendants of Pilgrim George Soule. Mayflower Families 3 covers the first 5 generations, to about 1800. Our families did a lot of moving around in the 19th century, and you can help locate migration patterns for family groups. That is why the Family Data Chart is printed in each issue of the Newsletter. Our historian may be able to help you with that "missing link". So please keep the information coming.

We would like to suggest that you begin with your sixth generation ancestor from George Soule (or your earliest Soule ancestor, if you haven't made the connection to George¹). Fill out a form for that ancestor, and then submit forms for each of your ancestors down to yourself. This is especially important if you descend through a female line; Soule women who marry tend to become lost Soules.

We'll give a short explanation of how to fill out the form. Samples were printed in V. 20, #2 and #3-- April and July, if you'd like to refer to those.

(1) The "Generation" space in the upper left corner shows the generation from the immigrant ancestor. Please leave it blank unless you are certain.

(2) In the far upper space on the right for "FAMILY", leave it blank if the surname of "Soule Descendant" is SOULE, SOWLE, or variants, because we'll assign a code number for closely related family groups. If the "Soule Descendant" has a different surname, insert the name in the right upper space.

(3) The next two lines show the ancestors of the "Soule Descendant" back to George Soule¹. Unless you have an approved Mayflower Lineage or other positive proof, we suggest this be left blank.

(4) When writing dates, follow the genealogical style-- first the day in numbers, then the month in letters, and the full year, such as 6 Feb 1833.

(5) When listing children on the reverse side, put in as much information as you can-- such as spouse's parents, if known.

(6) List your name and address as compiler unless someone else gathers the information. We may need to contact the compiler.

(7) It is VERY important to list sources of data; if the information comes from a family Bible or other record, a photocopy of the information should be included. Other sources, such as Vital Records from towns or states, and census should be indicated.

(8) Leave "Verification" blank for our purposes.

(9) Please give as many clues as possible to facilitate further research. If you are uncertain about a date, enter it, but add "circa" or "ca". For questionable place names, add "possibly" or "probably".

Dear Soulé Family Member:

This letter is being sent to Soulés across the United States and concerns the published work of a distinguished member of the Soulé family: **Colonel George Soulé**.

In 1856 Colonel Soulé (1834-1926) founded Soulé College in New Orleans, Louisiana. During the 128 years of its operation, Soulé College graduated tens of thousands of men and women from all parts of America. Although a "Yankee" by birth (and a descendant of Pilgrim George Soulé of Mayflower fame), Colonel Soulé adopted New Orleans as his new home in 1856 and felt obligated to fight on the side of the South in the Civil War. Having fought in the famous Battle of Shiloh, George Soulé eventually rose to the rank of Lt. Colonel.

George Soulé was the first business educator in the South (if not the country) to open his college to women in 1883. Col. Soulé was ridiculed by male members of the New Orleans business community who believed that women simply did not belong in the commercial business workplace. As a result, Soulé College became the first co-educational school of its kind in North America and was thus a pioneer in destroying the narrow prejudice which denied to women the opportunity of earning a livelihood.

Col. George Soulé lectured at meetings throughout the United States, was REX (King of Mardi Gras) in 1887, and Soulé College was represented at the Paris Exposition of 1900. George Soulé authored over a dozen books, including his most important work which was used by Soulé College students until the institution's close in 1984:

PHILOSOPHIC PRACTICAL MATHEMATICS


It is historically interesting to note that Col. Soulé offered to pay \$5,000 (in gold-backed dollars!!) to anyone who could prove that his books on mathematics were not the most practical and best-ever published on the subject. No one ever came forth with a challenge. Moreover, the practical manner in which this book is written will prove invaluable to your children and grandchildren in their understanding of mathematics.

It is my hope that this last remaining collection of Colonel George Soulé's important book — **PHILOSOPHIC PRACTICAL MATHEMATICS** — will be purchased by those individuals who value the book, not only for the information contained within, but also as a historical memento reflecting the life of its distinguished author. Thus I am offering this book for sale in the hope that its historic value will best be preserved and appreciated by other members of the extended Soulé Family. 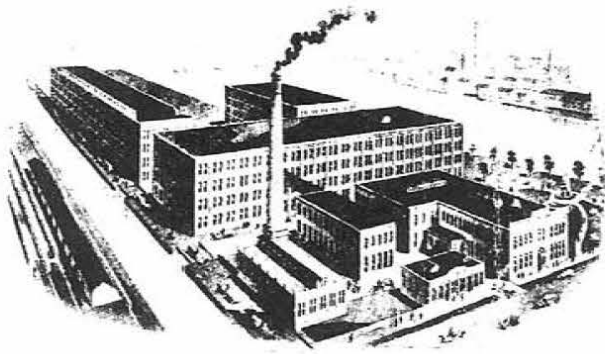

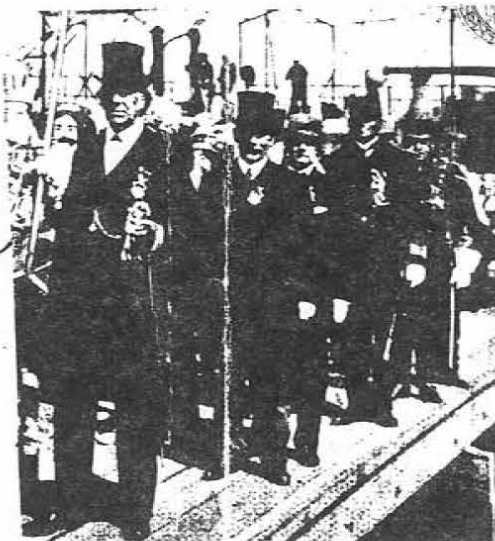

"To this gentleman, New Orleans, Louisiana"

The gentleman in question is the well-known New Orleans Educator-Lecturer COL. GEORGE SOULE' (1834-1926) (Rex in 1887) and presiding in the photograph as the Duke of Education for the Krewe of Rex while the King and his entourage alight from a steamboat at the foot of Canal Street in New Orleans on Carnival Day.

COL. GEORGE SOULE' was so well known in New Orleans that a proper street address was unnecessary!

My line is in the MF3* book (page 302) to Nathan WEST, son of Francis WEST (William West, Susanna Soule, George). Nathan is listed as a fifth generation person (number at top is 4 since it starts with 0) and was married to Sarah (Sally/Susan) SCRIVENS (SCRIBBONS?) in 1801. Their son, Francis (born 24 May 1803 Hoosic, Rensselaer Co. NY, died 9 June 1864 Burr Oak, Winneshelk Co. IA.) married Lydia Mariah AMSDEN on 17 Nov. 1834 at Hoosic.

John says, " I'd like to have us build a computer database of descendants of George that members and non-members (perhaps for a fee for non-members) can request a search of. The end report should be able to tell the queried of any "hits" that are found, how the "hit relates to George, and the names and addresses of other researchers working on those same lines. Something similar to this is available now from the Cody Family Association and it is a great service. The main problems are database design and data entry. The Codys paid a professional developer to work on theirs - perhaps we could buy the database structure and reports from them for a part of the development costs, and add our own data.

Why don't we print something in each newsletter that would help researchers get together with others working on the same line? If we were all to send a list of our line to the editor, or perhaps someone else should do the work on this, that person could formulate lists of those who are working on various lines. The MR3 book could be used to start the list of the original 5th generation descendants and others added as found."

"I have been in the Hospital for eye surgery. Had a bad fall and injured my head, but I'm much better now. Had a birthday on February 24th, am now 90 years young.

From Alberta Soule of Middleboro, MA.,

"I was a Soule before marriage, and grew up in that part of East Middleboro known as the "Soule Neighborhood". I joined the Mayflower Society through the Bradford lineage. My son Charles joined through the Soule Lineage on his father's side. My husband and myself have the first four generations the same. Between us, we have fifteen lines but three of them - Soule - Fuller - Cooke are the same passengers coming down through different lines. Our families lived within 13 miles from Plymouth all these years so it isn't too strange that our ancestry goes back to several Mayflower Families.

I have a copy of the Soules buried in the Cemetery at the Green, the second oldest cemetery in town sold by James Soule in 1717 to a large number of proprietors. If it would be some help to any cousins, I will have it printer again (all four pages)

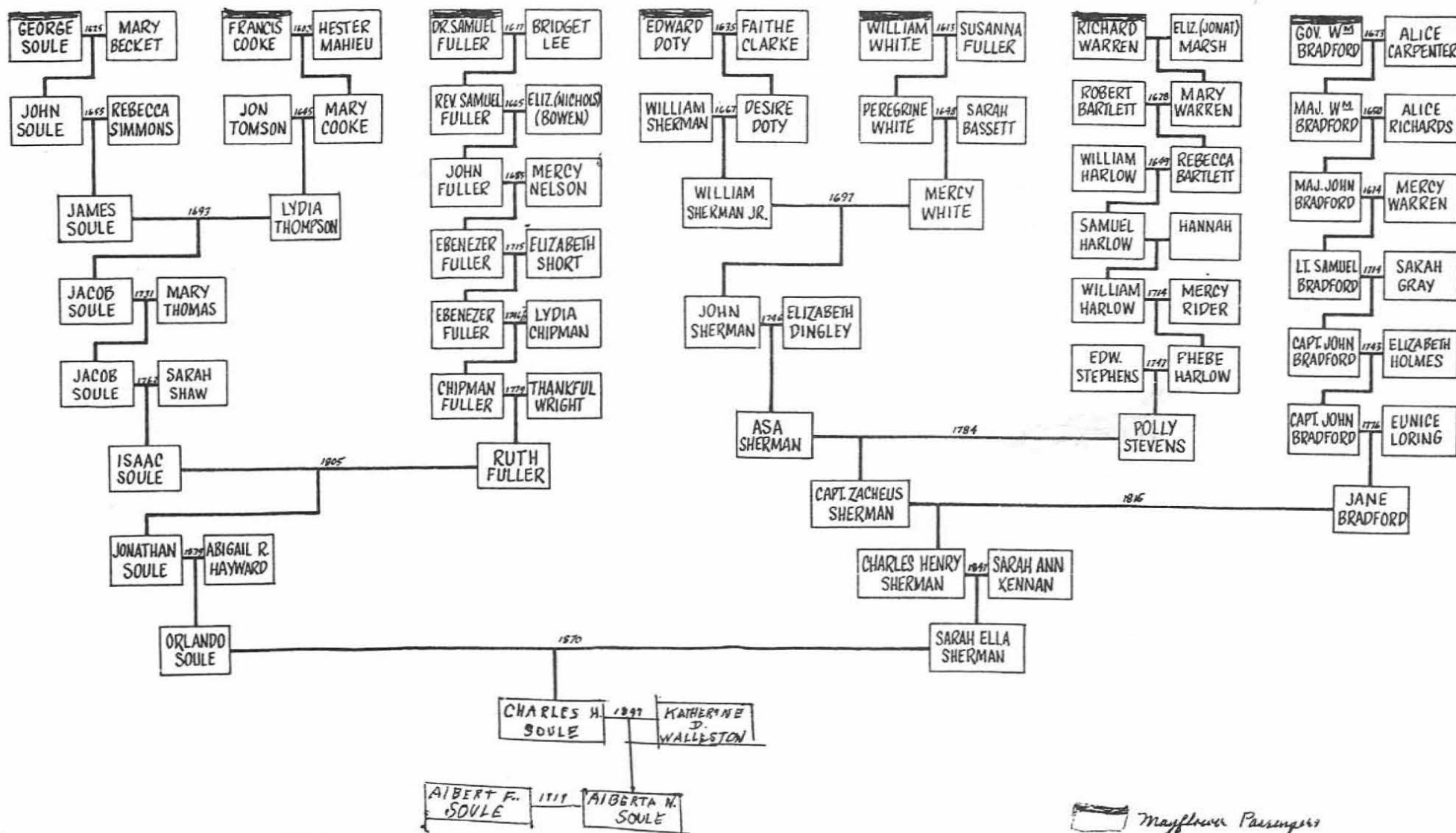

THOMAS OTTEN PAINE, 1921-1992

a genealogical memoir by Robert M. Gerrity.

A delight of genealogy is coming across people you never considered were relations. Through a genealogy journal ad, I made contact with Mrs. Barbara (Paine) Mason who opened up for me several lines of descent from Ralph Paine of which I had had no knowledge. She also shared with me a family manuscript entitled Paine Family of Warwick RI (1965) by a cousin of hers, Thomas O. Paine.

I just knew I had seen that name before! When Mrs. Mason wrote me about what his role had been at NASA, I remembered my very aged grandmother, Emily (Paine) Rebmann, asking me in the late summer of 1969 if he could be a relation by any chance, and I said, its unlikely. And that was after I had been asking about her childhood memories of Rhode Island relations (Thomas' ancestors)! Being related to people prominent in the news, because of their surnames, is certainly unlikely, just not improbable.

Mr. Paine's own family research forms the basis for my sections on the descendants of Silas Paine through his son Thomas Jefferson. The following is drawn from my work-in-progress "Ralph Paine and his Descendants through Ten Generations." I regret not having the chance of meeting or corresponding with Mr. Paine about our particular common past. I do know I shared with him a strong belief in our common future: the stars our destination.

9. THOMAS OTTEN PAINE, (George T., Frank E., Thomas J., Thomas J., Silas, Job, Thomas, Ralph), was born in Berkeley CA on 9 November 1921. He died at home in Brentwood CA of cancer on 4 May 1992. He married at Long Beach CA on 1 October 1946 BARBARA HELEN TAUNTON PEARSE, who was born in Geraldton, Australia on 19 September 1923, the seventh child of Henry Taunton and Marguerite (Jones) Pearse.

Thomas, who wrote a family history entitled Paine Family of Warwick RI (1965), was graduated from Brown University in 1942 and took his Ph.D. in physical metallurgy from Stanford in 1947. He served in the Navy in the submarine U.S.S. Pompon during World War II, patrolling the western Pacific, living "with the tang of danger when you were cruising on the surface.... We were part of the tooth and claw simplicity of the sea." [New York Times Magazine, 8 June 1969 cited in Current Biography 1970.]

His wife Barbara's Pearse family were English clergy before arriving in Australia; her other ancestors were among the first colonists on the Swan River in 1829. During W.W.II she had served as a ground controller with the Royal Australian Air Force.

Thomas joined the G.E. Research Laboratory in Schenectady in 1949 and then was assigned to the G.E. plant in West Lynn, Massachusetts to oversee development of materials used in measuring devices. He was named plant manager in 1955. He was back at the research lab by 1958 as a research associate involved with developing business applications.

In 1963 Thomas was named manager of G.E.'s long range think tank, TEMPO, eventually returning that unit to profitability. In 1968 he was appointed an Assistant Administrator for NASA in Washington D.C. under its founding director, James Webb. In March, 1969 President Nixon made him NASA administrator, in which capacity he was serving at the time of the First Moon Landing in July 1969. After dealing with the first significant downsizing in NASA's history, Thomas returned to G.E. in 1970. He then went to the Northrop Company in 1976 as CEO, retiring as president and COO in 1982. Thomas later served as chairman of the National Commission on Space, appointed by President Reagan in 1985, and then served on the Advisory Commission on the Future of the Space Program and Space Policy Advisory Board under President Bush. [Paine Fam. Warwick, 27 and Ruth Paine update 1968; Obituary, Associated Press, Boston Globe, Wed. 6 May 1992.]

The 1985 Space Commission recommended the development of a new generation of space vehicles, a return to the moon by 2005 with colonization by small groups of about 20 people each, focusing on science first than mining and manufacturing, and with a Mars colonization effort by 2035, featuring regular "space ferry" runs. Thomas' last public statements on the U. S. Space program were related to the departure of Admiral Richard Truly as NASA Administrator in March 1992, a change he personally regretted but thought necessary for the refocusing of NASA's mission. [Boston Globe, March 1992.]

Current Biography [p. 335-6] described him in 1970 as follows: "Often characterized as personable and charming, Paine stands six feet one inch tall, weighs about 180 pounds and has blue eyes and brown hair. According to associates, he can use forceful language when the occasion calls for it, and he has mastered the fine art of listening to the ideas broached by his colleagues. He is a Democrat and a Unitarian. His recreations include sailing, beachcombing, book collecting, reading books on space and science fiction, puttering around the house, oil painting, and photography."

The Rev. Dr. Guy Soule Jr. and the Rev. Jim Reed can easily exchange notes about their former pastorates. The two ministers switched churches in September, with Soule being named pastor of Grace United Methodist Church and Reed moving to Columbus County to pastor Hallsboro UMC.

Soule, who grew up in Charlotte, served the Hallsboro church for four years prior to coming to Roxboro. A lifelong Methodist, he has been a pastor since 1978, entering the ministry as a second career.

A graduate of Lees-McCrae Junior College, he served a stint in the U.S. Marine Corps and returned to complete his education at Lenoir Rhyne College, receiving a B.A. degree in economics in 1961.

He worked in the field of industrial safety for three major corporations until 1975 when he answered his call to the ministry. At that time, Soule moved his family to Wake Forest and entered Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary. While a student, he pastored Youngsville UMC.

Soule received a master of divinity degree in May 1978 and was ordained to the ministry in June 1978.

"I think those who come into the ministry as a second career probably understand the everyday issues of life better than someone who goes directly from college to seminary," he said. "Having struggled and worked leads to an understanding of the life problems we have beyond the world of academia."

"In fact, that's where I first learned about Roxboro," Soule said.

Soule served three years at Edenton Street before going to Ocracoke UMC for a two-year appointment. He also served Gardner's UMC in Fayetteville for a year and Fair Bluff UMC in Columbus County for three years before going to Hallsboro.

While at Hallsboro, Soule worked towards his doctorate degree in theology through an extension program of Trinity Theological Seminary of Newburgh, Ind. He received that degree in May of this year.

Soule's wife Frances is a former elementary teacher who is currently working on a degree in teaching foreign language at the elementary level. Soule said she was involved in writing the elementary Spanish curriculum for the Columbus County schools, where she taught prior to moving to Roxboro.

Music played part in history of Yarmouth, old cello reveals

● The Yarmouth Historical Society has bought a cello labeled: 'Manufactured by Samuel Soule, North Yarmouth.'

YARMOUTH - The bidding reached \$825 before the auctioneer finally declared, "Sold!" It was music to the ears of the winner, the Yarmouth Historical Society.

The object of the society's desire was a cello made in Yarmouth or its environs nearly 200 years ago. Now in place at the Yarmouth Historical Society Museum, the cello has uncovered a previously unknown aspect of the town's history.

Until it surfaced, local historians had no idea that instruments were made in Yarmouth during the late 1700s and early 1800s, said Marilyn Hinkley, the society's executive director.

"It is the physical evidence of instrument-making in Yarmouth that no one even knew about," said Hinkley. "It is documented as made

in Yarmouth and that alone makes it an outstanding piece for us."

The documentation is a small label inside the cello. It says, "Manufactured by Samuel Soule, North Yarmouth."

North Yarmouth was the colonial settlement that comprised several modern communities, including Yarmouth, Cumberland, Freeport, North Yarmouth and Pownal. Yarmouth split from old North Yarmouth in 1849.

The cello is in good shape. The body of the instrument appears to

have been made of maple and fir, perhaps spruce. Its neck and finger board are made of maple.

Hinkley described the cello as a well-made "rural piece," obviously manufactured by someone trained in the craft. But it is far below the quality of the high-style instruments made in Europe during that period, she said.

The society learned of the cello last month, when the owner, a Norway man, contacted Hinkley. He described the instrument and its label and told her it was to be sold at Morrill's auction in Gray.

On March 14, the cello became part of the historical society's permanent collection.

But the appearance of the cello is raising far more questions than answers. It has sent local historians on a research trail that promises to be long and winding.

The first task is to pinpoint the period in which the cello was made. Hinkley said preliminary research indicates it was manufactured in one of two periods: about 1790 to 1800 or 1820 to 1830.

The second task is to identify the manufacturer. Researchers have found at least seven Samuel Soules who lived during those times. Prior research has never uncovered any reference to an instrument maker in town, Hinkley said.

Two leading candidates, however, have emerged. The first is a Samuel Soule born in 1792, who is described in a property deed as a house carpenter.

The second is this Sam's father, Samuel Soule, who was born in 1752. He is described in colonial records as a "yeoman and a gentleman."

Hinkley said her next step is to nail down when the cello was made. She said she will contact instrument experts at major museums, send them detailed photos of the cello and ask them to date it.

With that date, the society can narrow down the list of Samuel Soules, she said. It also would yield other clues.

While only 20 years apart, 1800 and 1820 mark distinct periods in musical history, according to Hinkley's research.

If the cello was made around 1800, Samuel Soule would have been a hip instrument maker indeed. The cello and other instruments from the violin family were just becoming popular, replacing their precursors, known as viols.

Violin-type instruments have rounded backs and four strings. The earlier viols had square backs and six strings. The cello is a direct descendant of an instrument called a bass viol.

In this period, the cello would have been manufactured for a church, to provide music for services. Shortly after 1800, however, musical instruments fell into disrepute among clerics.

In 1805, local ministers met in Freeport and agreed to ban instruments from their services, according to historical accounts. They particularly disliked the bass viol, which was also known as the "devil's fiddle."

If made in the later period, the cello would have been commissioned by an individual, Hinkley said. By 1820, people were beginning to play music for personal pleasure, often in amateur chamber groups. In 1819, for example, the Beethoven Musical Society of Portland was formed.

Answering these questions will require local researchers to pore over old tax records, genealogies, property deeds, account books and other documents. Some questions may never be answered.

But that's all right, Hinkley said. "For us," she said, "just its existence is perfect."

"My father Richard Charles Soules was born in Chicago on March 18, 1891, according to his social security records, however, the 1900 census gives his birth date as Oct. 1891. He lived most of his life in San Diego, and died there in Jan 1979. He married my mother, Josephine Marie Thomas, on Nov. 16, 1915 in Riverside., Ca. The 1900 census shows his father, Arthur H. Soules, age 30 and his wife, Nellie Draper Soules, age 30 living in Chicago with a Jacob Wilson and his wife, Melissa, both 48 years old. What is strange is that Jacob Wilson, who supplied the census information, lists Arthur Soules as his son and Nellie Draper Soules as his daughter-in-law. Probably this was because he was a step-father. The census shows the Wilsons to have been married for only five years and Arthur his son to be 30 years old. Arthur Soules' fathers' birth place is listed as Canada, and incidentally so is Jacob Wilson. Jacob Wilson's wife, Melissa, who was probably Arthur Soule's real mother was born in Indiana, as were her parents. My father. Richard Soules, had a sister Rachel, who was also living with the Wilsons according to the 1900 census and was 5 years old the same year my father was 6. They all lived at 375 Washington Blvd. Chicago, Ill. Here the trail ends.

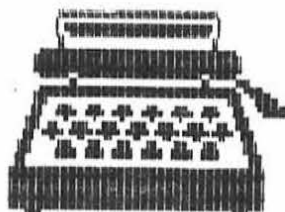

I am a descendant of George Soule through the Sisson line, with records indicating the descendants as follows: George¹, George², William³, Sarah⁴, Hannah Howland⁵, David Sisson⁶, David Sisson⁷, Emily Sisson⁸, John L Martin⁹, Theodore Martin¹⁰, and myself David Martin¹¹.

The problem area is David⁶, in which a discrepancy exists in the Mayflower Families Volume 3 on the Soule descendants, which lists only some but not all of the children of David's father Jonathan Sisson, and which gives a birth date of 1757 for David when other records including an original document of David's father Jonathan indicates the birth date was 1779 and lists all the children. ("Book of Ages and Deaths")

I further have a copy of Jonathan Sisson's will, which lists David among the other children and also lists all the children as are listed in the "Book of Ages and Deaths"--- thus providing a second source that indicates a possible error in the Mayflower Families Book 3

The Sisson lineage of David is: Richard¹, James², Jonathan³, and David⁵. One somewhat puzzling element here as well as the above. A copy of a quitclaim deed of David's refers to land he got from his "father Jonathan which in turn came from his father James" when actually James was his great-grandfather. I am not about to let this puzzle deter the focus from the main problem, however, since such deeds were, as we all know, frequently written by clerks who only wrote what they thought they heard and a confusion would be easy to imagine in such a case.

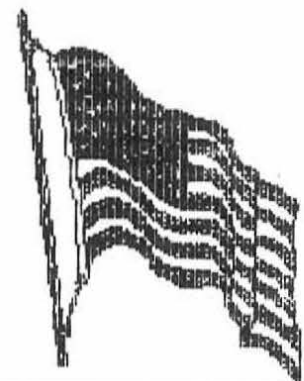

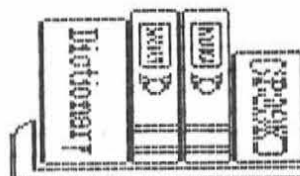
