The 1627 Pilgrim Village:

1 STANDISH:

Veteran soldier Myles Standish arrived on Mayflower and was chosen as Captain (military commander) of New Plymouth. You can examine the armor and weapons of his calling in his house located nearest the Fort/Meetinghouse. He lives here with his second wife Barbara and their family.

2 ALDEN:

John Alden was hired as the cooper or barrelmaker aboard Mayflower. He chose to remain in New Plymouth rather than return with the ship, where he became a "husbandman" (farmer) as well as a cooper. He married Priscilla Mullins, who also came on Mayflower.

3 BRADFORD:

William Bradford, Governor of the Colony of New Plymouth, was one of the English Separatists - religious non-conformists exiled to Leiden, Holland in 1608. He emigrated to New England on Mayflower in 1620 and succeeded

John Carver as Governor in the summer of 1621. He occupies this house at the cross-street with his second wife, Alice.

4 HOPKINS:

Stephen Hopkins, a Non-Separatist from Gloucester shire, arrived with his family on Mayflower. He is the only one among the Plymouth settlers who had been in America before, having travelled to Virginia in housing found in rural England. 1609. He is now a New England resident, with his wife Elizabeth and their family.

5 HOWLAND:

John Howland came on Mayflower as a servant (employee) of Governor John Carver. After the death of the Carver family in the spring of 1621, Howland became a full member of the community. He married Mayflower passenger Elizabeth Tilley.



Samuel Fuller, a deacon in the Separatist church in Leiden and New Plimoth was surgeon to the colony and came on the Mayflower. In 1623, he was joined by his wife Bridget, a skilled midwife. Their garden is notable for a wide variety of herbs useful for physic or medical preparation.

7 ANNABLE:

6 FULLER:

Anthony and Jane Annable, Non-Separating Puritans from Cambridge, England, arrived with their two daughters in 1623. This simple dwelling represents a type of

8 WARREN:

Richard Warren, a London merchant, came on Mayflower and was joined by his wife and children in 1623. While all the colonists are obliged to make farming or "husbandry" their major occupation, the adjustment for urban residents such as the Warrens is greater than for immigrants from rural areas.

9 SOULE:

George Soule came to New Plymouth on Mayflower as a servant to Edward Winslow. By 1627, Soule has left the service of Master Winslow and set up his own household. He lives here with his wife Mary and his son, Zachariah.

10 WINSLOW:

Edward Winslow is a leading citizen of New Plymouth. Coming from a prosperous background in Worcestershire, he joined the Leiden Separatists and emigrated aboard

Mayflower with his brother Gilbert. After his first wife

died during the first winter, he married Susannah, widow of William White.

11 COOKE:

Francis Cooke came on Mayflower with hi son, John. His wife, Hester, who is a Walloon (Belgian or French) Protestant, followed in 1623 with the rest of the fami Their house has a dairy at the back.

12 ALLERTON:

Mayflower passenger Isaac Allerton marrie Elder William Brewster's daughter Fear. I 1627 Allerton travels to England as agent the Plymouth colonists in their negotiations with the Merchant Adventurers (financial backers) there.

13 BILLINGTON:

John Billington, his wife Elinor and their two sons were one of the few Mayflower families to survive the terrible first winter unscathed. John was embroiled in the factionalism of the early years, and is ofter at odds with the colony leaders.

14 BREWSTER:

William Brewster, although religious leader of New Plymouth, is not an ordained minister. Brewster served as Postmaster at Scrooby, Nottinghamshire, before he became a leading member of the Separatist congregation. Brewster and his family accompanied the portion of the community that emigrated to the New World, while pastor John Robinson remained with the majority in Leiden. Educated at Peterhouse College, Cambridge, he brought a significant library to New England.

15 BROWNE:

Peter Browne was one of the unmarried men who came to seek his fortune on Mayflower. He married Martha, the widow of William Ford, who arrived aboard Fortune in November, 1621.

THE FIRST DECLARATION OF THE PRINCIPLES OF AMERICAN FREEDOM

THE COMPACT

In the Name of God, Amen. We whose names are underwritten, the loyal subjects of our dread sovereign Lord, King James, by the grace of God, of Great Britain, France and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, etc.

Having undertaken, for the glory of God, and advancement of the Christian faith and honor of our King and Country, a voyage to plant the first colony in the northern parts of Virginia, do by these presents solemnly and mutually in the presence of God, and one of another, covenant and combine ourselves together into a civil body politic, for our better ordering and preservation and furtherance of the ends aforesaid: and by virtue hereof to enact, constitute and frame such just and equal laws, ordinances, acts, constitutions and offices, from time to time, as shall be though most meet and convenient for the general good of the Colony: unto which we promise all due submission and obedience. In witness whereof we have hereunder subscribed our names at Cape Cod the 11 of November, in the year of the reign of our sovereign Lord, King James of England, France and Ireland the eighteenth, and of Scotland the Fifty-fourth. Elizabeth Parkin has written about the life of Asa⁵ and his wife Olive Southworth. With her permission, we are printing it in this issue. It certainly expands on the small amount of information that appears in Mayflower Families-3, and is a good example of what we all should do! Please note that she used vital records, censuses, wills and military records as well as histories of the area in Maine where Asa and Olive lived. This sort of family history makes our ancestors come alive in a way that "bare bones" statistics don't.

RECORDING OF FAMILY DATA By Geraldine Sowle Schlosser, Soule Kindred Historian

One of the objectives of Soule Kindred is the gathering of information pertaining to the descendants of Pilgrim George Soule. Mayflower Families 3 covers the first 5 generations, to about 1800. Our families did a lot of moving around in the 19th century, and you can help locate migration patterns for family groups. That is why the Family Data Chart is printed in each issue of the Newsletter. Our historian may be able to help you with that "missing link" So please keep the information coming.

We would like to suggest that you begin with your sixth generation ancestor from George Soule (or your earliest Soule ancestor, if you haven't made the connection to George¹). Fill out a form for that ancestor, and then submit forms for each of your ancestors down to yourself. This is especially important if you descend through a female line; Soule women who marry tend to become lost Soules.

We'll give a short explanation of how to fill out the form. Samples were printed in V. 20, #2 and #3-- April and July, if you'd like to refer to those.

- (1) The "Generation" space in the upper left corner shows the generation from the immigrant ancestor. Please leave it blank unless you are certain.
- (2) In the far upper space on the right for "FAMILY", leave it blank if the surname of "Soule Descendant" is SOULE, SOWLE, or variants, because we'll assign a code number for closely related family groups. If the "Soule Descendant" has a different surname, insert the name in the right upper space.
- (3) The next two lines show the ancestors of the "Soule Descendant" back to George Soule. Unless you have an approved Mayflower Lineage or other positive proof, we suggest this be left blank.
- (4) When writing dates, follow the genealogical style-- first the day in numbers, then the month in letters, and the full year, such as 6 Feb 1833.
- (5) When listing children on the reverse side, put in as much information as you can-- such as spouse's parents, if known.
- (6) List your name and address as compiler unless someone else gathers the information. We may need to contact the compiler.
- (7) It is VERY important to list sources of data; if the information comes from a family Bible or other record, a photocopy of the information should be included. Other sources, such as Vital Records from towns or states, and census should be indicated.
 - (8) Leave "Verification" blank for our purposes.

Continuation of Frank Beach Soule' Family History

John Soule, son of George Soule, was born in 1632, and in the will of his father (History of Duxbury, p.310) is called "eldest son who hath, in my extreme old age, been tender and careful to me and very helpful to me." John appears to have been less peaceable than his father. On the 8th of June, 1654, he was fined ten pounds and costs in a suit brought against him for two hundred pounds. During the excitement against the Quakers, he was fined, Oct. 2, 1660, for attending their meetings. In 1672, he was Surveyor of Highways. In 1675-8, he was arbitrator between Marshfield and Duxbury, and Plymouth and Duxbury, involving land disputes. In December 1686, he joined in a remonstrance against increasing the salary of Rev. Ichabod Wiswell. He was administrator of the estate of Samuel Chandler and guardian of John Simmons and Samuel Sampson, minors. He married Hester, Daughter of Phillip and Hester de la Noye, the French Protestants who joined the pilgrims in Holland. John Soule died in 1707, aged 75 years. Among the Items of property, we find a library mentioned in his will, a rare thing in those times, and it shows him to have been a man of literary taste and cultivated mind.

Moses Soule, son of John, resided in Duxbury, near Island Creek, a little stream taking its rise in a pond of the same name. He married Mercy Southworth, the great grand-daughter of John and Priscilla Alden. He died in 1751, quite wealthy for that period. He was a large landed proprietor in several towns.

Barnabus Soule, son of Moses, was born in 1705, and went to North Yarmouth about 1742. He married, about 1737 Jane, the youngest daughter of Jacob and Elizabeth Stockman Bradbury, of Salisbury, Ma. She was the great grand-daughter of the noted divine Rev John Wheelwright. Barnabus and his wife were received into the First Church August 30,1742 by public profession, and on September 5, following he brought his two sons to baptism. He died April 8, 1780, and is buried in the old burying ground that overlooks the town.

Moses Soule, son of Barnabus was born Feb.19,1738. He married Nancy Hewes. Was for many years a deacon with the Freeport church.

Charles Soule, son of Moses, was born September 1768. He married Anne, daughter of William Kendell, of Dresden, Maine. He died August 15, 1796.

Benjamin Franklin Soule, son of Charles, was born January 17,1810. He married Mary Pierson Hand, daughter of Jan and Elizabeth (Halsey) Hand, of Bridgehampton, New York, who died September 4, 1848..He married, for his second wife, Eunice, daughter of William Soule of Bangor, Maine.

He was graduated in 1838 from Wesleyan College, Middletown, Ct. After graduation, on which occasion he was poet of the class, he taught school in Mississippi. After several years, he purchased a weekly journal, and commenced the life and calling of an editor. Losing the wife of his youth in 1848, after he had become one of the editors and proprietors of the New Orleans Mercury, he started for California. He entered California May 29,1849. The following year he assumed temporary charge of the Alta California newspaper. In the following year, 1851, he was elected to the state senate by a majority of about two to one over his opponent and was the only Whig in the state elected to the senate in 1851, the Democrats in the Legislature standing twenty-six to two Whigs. In 1853, he, with others, established the California Chronicle, a daily journal which prospered until the Vigilance Committee, it its blind rage, destroyed the Journal, which had stood more determined than any other in the city or state for the rights of the people and against all dishonesty in city and state legislature. Subsequently Mr. Soule was attached to the San Francisco Times, doing all its editorial work during the months preceding the Presidential election. He held for a time a position in the the U.S. Custom House, being at the same time editorial writer on the Morning Call. In 1865, just before the assassination of President Lincoln, the President appointed Mr. Soule collector of the Internal Revenue for the San Francisco district, including also the county of San Mateo. At the end of eight years of faithful service to the Federal Government , Mr> Soule had lost every dollar he possessed in the world a striking example of the prosperity of honest men who hold Federal offices) From 1872 to 1881, Mr. Soule was editor of the "Old Alta." During his life, he wrote many poems of great merit, and was the author, with others, of a work entitled "Annals of California" (Should be Annals of San Francisco), published in early days, when authoritative works of this kind were scarce in the state.



SHE MADE EVERY EFFORT TO SHOW HER CONCERN AND REMEMBRANCE OF EVERY FRIEND, CHILD, GRANDCHILD, STEP-GRANDCHILD, AND GREAT-GRANDCHILD.

Accomplishments listed

Editor's note: Bernice Soule Meamber was honored as 1993 Yreka Citizen of the Year Saturday at a chamber of commercesponsored banquet at the Yreka Community Center, joining her husband Fred, who was the 1974 Yreka Citizen of the Year. They are the second couple to have been so honored. (George and frances Wacker were Yreka citizens of the year in 1965 and 1983, respectively.) Here is a biographical sketch of the Meambers, provided by the chamber.

YREKA CHAMBER

Bernice and Fred Meamber are both noted historians of Siskiyou County, and work at it as a team, constantly collecting local historical information. Fred is the researcher. Bernice is the writer and organizer.

They were instrumental in helping establish the Siskiyou County Historical Society, the Siskiyou County Museum in 1945, and the yearly publication, the "Siskiyou Pioneer and Yearbook" in 1946. Other efforts included the campaign to have Yreka listed as No. 901 on the National Register of Historic Places.

As the newly-elected president of the Historical Society, following political procrastinations and delays by others, Fred immediately opened the newly-built Siskiyou County Museum. He served on the board of the Historical Society, and with Bernice has co-editored at least three issues of the Historical Society's yearbook.

They have organized and presented numerous narrated slide programs, regarding all phases of county history, from their collection of some 3,000 slides, mostly of Siskiyou County. For years they have presented these before service clubs, schools, churches, and historical organizations throughout northern California.

They have also written many articles and so far, one book, "Houses That Talk," about historic Yreka, which is a monumental recording of Yreka's history and genealogy. They are in constant demand to give lectures and historic advice.

Fred has served on the Yreka Elementary School and Chamber of Commerce boards, and was a charter member of the Yreka Rotary Club, For years he has served in the choft and been a leader on the church council of Mt. Zion Lutheran Church of Yreka.

They have been associated with the Symposium Group of Historical Societies of Northern California and Southem Oregon, the Conference of California Historical Societies and the California Historical Society. Fred has also been a member of the Friends of the Bancroft Library, UC Berkeley, and a member of the Genealogy Society of Siskiyou County.

Among the many honors the Meambers have received are the Coke Wood award, named for a noted California historian; a Conference of California Historical Societies award (they are charter members of that organization); and an award of merit from the American Association for State and Local History, Bernice was also the B.P.W.C. Woman of the Veer, in 1973

64. and 65. Asa and Olive Southworth Soule

Asa was baptized at Duxbury, Plymouth County, Massachusetts. 01 May 1753. He was the son of Micah and Mercy Southworth Soule.

Olive Southworth, the daughter of Benjamin and Mary Hunt Southworth, was born 25 July 1754 in Duxbury. Although her birthdate is given in <u>Soule Families</u>, Volume III, as 1744 this is surely a mistake. It would not be unheard of for her to be nine years older than Asa, but if Lucetta's birthday of 1798 is correct then Olive would have been 54 at the time! The 1830 census also supports the 1754 birthdate. Olive was the sister of Honor Southworth who married Asa's brother Jonathan. Both girls were married to their cousins on their mother's side.

Asa and Olive married in Duxbury 15 April 1772/3 and they continued to live there several years. He was 20 and she was 19.

Asa's father died in November 1778. As the youngest of four sons. Asa did not fare well—His oldest brother Josiah received half the homestead, valued at 1200 pounds, as well as other properties and was to receive the other half of the homestead at this mother's death. His other two brothers received various bequests. Asa and his brother Jonathan received ten pounds apiece. They also shared with their older brother Constant half of the salt meadow which would not be theirs till their mother's death.

Asa enlisted as a soldier 05 June 1780 in the Revolutionary War for the town of Marshfield for a period of six months. He was 28 at the time, and he and Olive had three children by then. His stature was 5 foot 7 inches, dark complexioned. He was armed at Springfield 08 July 1780 and marched to camp 10 July 1780 under Captain Shays. He passed muster in the return dated Camp Totoway 25 October 1780. (Massachusetts Soldiers & Sailors of the Revolution 14:633 and 14:649) His military records from the National Archives reveal only that he was a private in Captain Zebulon King's Company 7th Massachusetts Regiment, commanded by Lieut. Colonel John Brooks (Was this a different Asa?--esp)

Asa's brother Jonathan and his family were in Maine Territory by 1780. Asa must have gone with them or followed shortly after. They were there by June 1783 when Asa's son Jehiel was born. No doubt they took a ship up the coast from Massachusetts, then up the Kennebec River to Winslow. Many people were pouring into the area at this time, including Revolutionary War veterans, even though much of this land was claimed by the Kennebec Proprietors, a group of wealthy land speculators who had bought up the old Plymouth Colony patent.

People found the land they wanted and occupied it, later dickering with the company for clear title which was obtained by clearing five acres within three years, building a dwelling house with dimensions at least eighteen by twenty feet, and living on the land for seven years.

However, when the residents of Maine began to grow dissatisfied with their long distance government in Boston, the leaders instituted new measures to satisfy them. One of those measures stated that every permanent resident settled before 1784 was to be given a deed of one hundred acres on payment of \$5.00. At any rate Asa acquired 100 acres listed in his inventory at the time of his death, perhaps more.

Most of the Indians of this area had been killed during the French and Indian Wars or had gone to Canada. Though there were only two tribes remaining, the Passamaquoddies and the Penobscots, they were probably not an uncommon sight.

Their sister Esther who married Darius Brewster, was apparently their only other sibling who removed to Maine. Esther and her family settled in Rockland, Knox County, on the coast.

Asa and Olive had at least five more children after they moved to Maine. The last child, Lucetta, was born when Olive was probably about 44. She probably thought she was never going to be through with childbearing.

In 1790 the family was living in Winslow in Lincoln County. Their near neighbors were John Coal and Benjamin Chace. Probably this Benjamin Chace who was the brother of James and Hannah Chase. James was the father of Moses Chase who married Asa and Olive's daughter Betsey. Hannah Chase Kimball was the mother of Mary (Polly) Kimball who married Asa and Olive's son Almond.

Their brother and sister Jonathan and Honor Southworth Soule were also there but some distance away. Altogether there some 168 families living in Winslow that year. The census return states that there was one male over 16, three males under 16, and one female living in the home at the time. That would leave Micah, Jehiel, and Philander under 16 still at home. The numbers in the household suggest that, even though this was the census for 1790, that it may have taken before the twins were born in May 1789.

Almond was living alone in Wellsburgh, Clinton County, (now Willsboro, Essex County) New York at this time. This was located near the lower part of Lake Champlain and across the lake from Vermont. There were a number of single men living in the area. Benjamin, at fourteen, may have been living with someone else as an apprentice in some type of job training.

Perhaps the townspeople were so busy prospering at this time that they forgot, as people sometimes do, to look to their spiritual needs. Several times action was brought against the town under the general statute for not having a "Gospel Teacher." In 1794 100 pounds were raised by taxing the polls and estates for building a meeting house. Asa's brother Jonathan and Nathaniel Low were among those appointed to put this into effect.

On 20 February 1799 Lincoln County became Kennebec County.

Marion Smith, in her history of Maine, relates some of the descriptions of home life in 1797 detailed by a Mr. Eaton in his Annals of Warren: Most of the older settlers had framed houses. A few were painted. There were no carpets, rugs, or sofas. Floors were board, covered with sand, and were often decorated with figures drawn by a broom handle. In the kitchen was usually a dresser or set of shelves in one corner, with closets beneath containing pewter dishes and spoons. Forks had been only recently brought to Maine and few of the settlers owned any. Long benches were used at the table. Children often stood to eat. Candles were being replaced by whale oil in lamps of tin or brass.

Mr. Eaton goes on: Ox-wagons were just coming into use. Whether they were going to church or a social gathering, a couple rode double on the family horse which was the usual method of transportation.

The men continued to wear their hair in queues; powdering it went out of fashion after 1794. Families depended on clothing made from wool and flax woven at home.

The centennial history for Waterville states that the town began to prosper after the Revolutionary War. The farms were producing, and lumber was a major factor in the economy, especially with the river as a means of transport, and there was plenty of fishing for both food and trade.

By 1800 Asa and Olive still had six children at home plus another woman over 45, perhaps Olive's mother since Asa's mother, Mercy Southworth Soule died in 1797 in Duxbury. Their son Benjamin was newly married and living nearby. Almond, listed as Olmon on the census, had married about 1797 and was living nearby with wife Polly and their two young sons.

Thomas Jefferson was elected president in 1801, and Waterville was incorporated as a separate entity on 23 June 1802. As Soule was one of the first selectmen named for the new town, along with Elnathan Sherwin and Ebenezer Bacon. (A selectman, according to Webster, was one of a board of officials elected in New England towns to serve as the chief administrative authority of the town-esp).

District 10 was known as Asa Soule's district and comprised all the land in Waterville south of District 9 and Snow Pond. He was also an assessor and served on the School Committee. His farm seems to have been in that section of Waterville since incorporated as the town of Oakland.

On the tax list of 1809 Asa Soule was one of a small group who paid over \$10.00, paying \$10.69.

Ten years later, in 1810, the second older woman of the household was still living with the family. As and Olive had only three children remaining at home, possibly the twins and Philander. Almond and Micah were living near their uncle Jonathan and his son Peletial. Nearby were Jehiel and his family.

During the War of 1812 the British occupied the northern portion of the Maine coast from Penobscot Bay to Pasamaquoddy Bay near New Brunswick. Even though the townspeople at Waterville were not invaded they must have been affected by the blockade set up by the British all along the coast. Food and other articles became scarce. People began to enlarge their gardens. Businesses were created to manufacture cotton, woolen, glass, and metal articles.

Immediately after the war goods continued to be scarce. Beef and pork prices were very high. Farmers could have earned a profit on crops of wheat and rye but were wiped out by taxes. As soon as American markets reopened, the British flooded them with cheap goods. The home industries were at a loss to compete. Many people were out of work. To add to this, the weather during 1815 and 1816 was very severe. Farmers lost their crops and their livestock. Wild animals became more troublesome.

About this time men came to Maine selling the virtues of Ohio where, to quote Marion Smith, "the climate was pleasant, the soil deep and rich, and the food cheap and abundant." She goes on to say that as many as fifteen thousand left the District at this time. Two of this great migration were Asa and Olive's sons, Almond and Jehiel and their families.

Some sources say Asa applied for and received a pension commencing 30 April 1819. His annual allowance was \$96.00 However, the National Archives has no record of this. The person in question may be the Asa Soule who lived at Rome, Kennebec County.

On 15 March 1820 President Monroe signed a bill creating Maine as the twenty-third state. As a and Olive were still to be found in Waterville in 1830. Their near near neighbors were Menoah Crowell and Samuel Batchelder. Nearby were their son Jehiel and family who had apparently returned from Washington County, Ohio.

Asa's will was dated 31 May 1827 and went to probate 24 December 1831. He left everything to Olive and, at the event of her death, the remainder of his estate went to his seven children: Almond, Benjamin, Micah, Jehiel, Philander, Betsey M. Chase, and Lucetta Lucetta Parker. He named as executor David Wheeler, possibly related to Philander's wife, Hadassah.

While Asa may not have been a rich man, he and Olive seem to have lived in relative comfort on their farm of 100 acres, and Asa enjoyed enough respect by his peers to be addressed as Esquire, a title not taken lightly in those days.

The appraisers who took the inventory on 24 January 1832 were Elisha Hallett, Jr, Alvan Blackwell, and Perley? Low. Their handwriting is not always legible. Asa's livestock included 16 sheep, 1 pair oxen, 3 cows, 3 year-old heifers, 2 calves, 2 swine. Other items included 1 cart and wheels with two drafts, 1 grind stone crank, 1 set of trace chains, 1 brass kettle, 1 iron kettle, 3 beds and bedding, 24 yards of carpeting, 17 sheets, and 9 table cloths. There were also 6 silver spoons, 1 silver salt spoon, 5 brittany spoons, 1 pair silver buckles, and what looks like one pair of gold ear rings.

As one would expect of a Revolutionary veteran, there were a gun and bayonet and powder horn.

Household items listed like the churn, linen wheel, and loom are reminders of how Olive must have spent a good part of her time.

Household supplies included 6 grain chests, 1 vinegar barrel, "Lots of old clay casks," 3 meal bags, 10 cider barrels, 1 park barrel, and "2 Great Bibbles."

Total value of the estate came to \$1165.75.

The date of Olive's death is not known. Presumably she and Asa are buried in Waterville.

Children of Asa and Olive Southworth Soule

First three born at Marshfield, Massachusetts, last five at Winslow, Maine.

1. ALMOND, born 27 October 1773. Married Mary (Polly) Kimball about July 1797 in Winslow, Kennebec County, Maine. Died 16 February 1859, Washington County, Ohio.

- 2. Benjamin, born 28 May 1776. Married Margaret Gerald 27 November 1800, after which they settled on a place near his parents. In 1810 was living in Temple, Kennebec County. By 1830 may have been in Cumberland or Oxford County.
- 3. Micah, born 04 October 1779. Married Ruth Kimball, sister of Polly Kimball, of Sidney. Ruth was born 10 November 1783. Vassalborough. They filed their intent to marry on 15 August 1799 in Winslow when Ruth was sixteen. They were living in Waterville, Kennebec County, in 1810 with one male and one female. In 1810 they were living in Waterville but had moved to Penobscot County by 1830. Micah died after 1840 and Ruth, 66, was listed as head of household on the 1850 census. Also in the home and helping with the family farm were Stacy, 45, and Micah, 34.
- 4. Jehiel, born 18 June 1783. Was married and living with his wife and daughter under ten in Waterville in 1810. May have gone west with his brother Almond where there was a Jehiel Sole living near Almon Sole in Fearing Township, Washington County, Ohio, in 1820 with two males under 10, one 10 to 16, and female under ten, and one female 10 to 16 besides his wife. He was gone by 1830, apparently having returned to Maine where there was a Jehiel Soule living near Asa and Olive in 1830.
- 5. Philander, born 12 December 1785. Married Hadasseh Wheeler, both of Waterville. Filed intent to marry 10 January 1812. Philander also served in the militia during the War of 1812 in Captain William Pullen's Company, although they apparently did no fighting.

He seems to have had a restless and entrepreneurial spirit. He built a tidemill in Bath, in Sagadahoc County near the coast but sold out and moved to Harmony, near Moose Pond in Somerset County, Maine where he and his family were living in 1830 and 1840. Later he moved west and died in Bloomington, McClean County, Illinois. 25 January 1857. Had 6 children.

6. Betsey Miller, born 19 May 1789, twin of Walter. Married Moses Chase of Sidney 03 July 1810. Moses was the son of James Chase and cousin of Mary (Polly) Kimball who married Betsey's brother Almond. Betsey is referred to in her father's will of 1827 as Betsey M. Chase and was 38 at the time. Betsey and Moses remained in Waterville and were living alone there in 1850. Both were sixty-one and Moses described his occupation as truckman? Perhaps this the same as truck farmer. Their near neighbors were their son and daughter-in-law, Almon and Clymena Chase. Also in the area were Betsey's aunt, Honor Soule, 93 and other members of her family.

- 7. Walter, born 19 May 1789, twin of Betsey. Was probably the younger son listed on the 1810 census.
- 8. Lucetta, born 16 December 1798. She married first a man named Low, but between the time Asa wrote his will in May 1827 and the time he added a codicil dated 1830 she had married a man named Alexander J. Parker, born 1803 in Maine. They are to be found on the 1850 census living in Waterville, where Alexander earned his living as a butcher. There were six young people in the home ranging in ages from twenty-two to two. Their near neighbor was a merchant by the name of Samuel Kimball. Sources:





SOULE KINDRED INDEXES AVAILABLE

A third index has been completed for about 1,000 persons who are descendants but do not have the name Soule or other spellings. This Surname Index was created primarily from lineages submitted recently by members of Soule Kindred. It should be used with our earlier indexes and the 1992 supplement published in the Soule Kindred Newsletter Summer edition 1992.

Also available are copies of the original index created by Dr. Milton Terry listing more than 7,000 individuals with the name Soule, including codes for the source of information and a numbering system for tracing lineage of many. That index includes the names of the spouse of about 5,000 of the individuals.

Those spouse names have been indexed in alphabetic order with the name and code number of the individual in the original Terry index. However, you must have the Terry index to use the spouse index.
