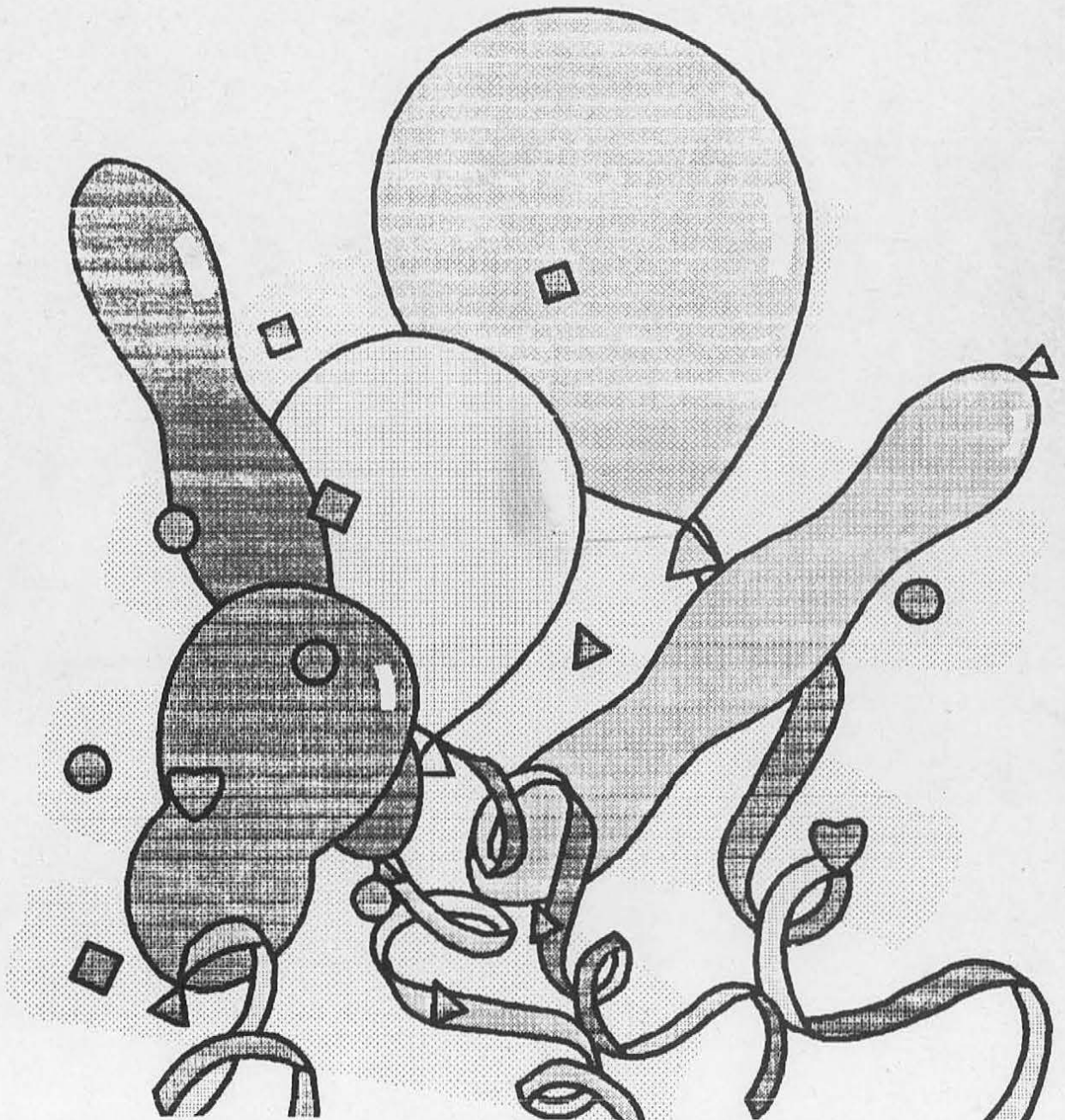

This chronological abstract covers all Soule family names listed in the first three volumes of a projected fifteen-volume series on this subject compiled by Louis J. Rasmussen and published by San Francisco Historic Records. We show the dates of arrival, name of vessel, port or ports of origin or other pertinent voyage information, names of Soule passengers and reference to volume and page on which the listed information was found.

MINUTES OF THE BOARD MEETING 8/27/94

The annual meeting of the Soule Kindred held at the Holiday Inn, Saint Augustine, Florida, at 10:00 AM was presided over by the President, Norman Soule. There were 22 in attendance.

In the absence of the secretary, Christine Schlosser, Carol Soule took the minutes. The minutes of the 1993 meeting were read by Carol Soule and approved by motion of Warren Soule, seconded by Eugene Johnson and the motion carried.

The treasurer's report, presented by B.J. Haner, showed a balance of \$58,918.96 and was approved by motion of Larry Woolcott, seconded by Eugene Johnson and carried. B.J. Haner presented the membership report which showed a net loss of one from the total membership of 433 for 1993.

Gerry Schlosser, family historian, gave her annual report which showed she had replied to 38 requests but still had a backlog of 26 unanswered queries. After much discussion, a committee of Willis Soule, Ben Soule and Gerry Schlosser was formed to look into purchasing a Data Base program to assist the family historian in the genealogical work of the Society.

Jim Schlosser, newsletter indexer, is working on inputting Dr. Milton Terry's index. Willis Soule is willing to assist.

Jeanette Taylor, Newsletter Editor, was unable to attend due to her husband's surgery.

The Scholarship Committee Report, presented by B.J. Haner, approved the awarding of:

- The Colonel John E. Soule Scholarship to Amy Elizabeth Soules. She will be attending Texas Technical University, Health Sciences Center, School of Nursing in Lubbock, Texas.
- The George Standish Soule Scholarship to Tami Joy Seaver who will be attending Azusa Pacific University in Los Angeles.

The Scholarship Committee is comprised of Betty Jean Haner, Hank Leland and Betty Soule Harris.

The Membership Chairman, Robert Soules, was not in attendance and no report on attracting new members was given.

Norm Soule' stated that he had had numerous queries about the Kindred after having placed a short item in the local newspaper and he suggested that an article be sent to all directors to place in their local papers. After further discussion, it was decided that Betty Jean Haner would write an article about the Kindred. Ben Soule suggested that we use the C.D:ROM Soule list as a mailing list. Willis Soule offered to try to get permission to use his



C.D:ROM. If not permissible, he was authorized to purchase C.D:ROM for the Soule Kindred. Willis will make the necessary mailing labels.

A letter was received from the Greater Society of Mayflower Descendants requesting that we put their order form for "Mayflower Families Genealogy Through Five Families" in our publication. Permission was approved by motion of Willis Soule, seconded by Gerry Schlosser, and carried. The Mayflower Society's request that we enter a float in the 1995 375th Anniversary Parade, was declined due to lack of people to prepare same in Plymouth. They also requested donations towards purchase of new costumes for Pilgrims Progress Parades, etc. Gerry Schlosser moved that we donate \$125.00 towards the costume campaign, seconded by B.J. Haner and carried.

Letters were read from the Governor of the State of Florida and the Mayor of Saint Augustine welcoming the Soule Kindred to their fair state and city.

Larry Woolcott, Orlando, on behalf of himself, his mother, Mrs. Severson, and his brother, Chuck Woolcott, presented the Soule Kindred (through its family historian Gerry Schlosser) a copy of their Soule Genealogy.

The following elections took place and were approved:

All were carried without contention.

Old Business

B.J. Haner explained that even though we had been named in Margaret Soule's will, from all the correspondence she has

received. it is very doubtful that we will receive any payment from this source.

Carol Soule reported that she and Stanley were very pleasantly surprised, when they went to mow the Soule Cemetery in Fairfield Vermont, to find it in very good state of repair. Much hard work had been done thanks to Allan Corliss of Saint Albans Vermont. Carol and Stan mowed the whole cemetery and would really like to have a chance next year to fill holes, etc. -- no problem with Immigration Official this year. The secretary was instructed to send a letter of thanks to Mr. Corliss.

Stan Soule invited the Kindred to meet in Burlington Vermont next year. Carol and Monica Soule (remember Montreal in 1990) will set a date as soon as hotel arrangements can be made. Carol stated that hosting the Kindred every five years is not going to become a habit.

The meeting was adjourned by motion of Ben Soule, second by Eugene Johnson and carried.

## FAMILY HISTORIAN'S REPORT

Greetings for 1995 to all Soule researchers. May we find more connections this year and expand our family records.

One way to do this is to have "mini-family" reunions. I'm sure that many of you already do this with your own immediate family. My suggestion is to expand this to include a wider segment of your collateral (not direct line) relatives. And when you have this get-together, have all fill out family group sheets.

I started doing this in 1980 when I began working on a genealogy of my 5th generation ancestor from George Soule. He was James Sowle who married Patience Macomber. They lived in Vermont and had six sons, four of whom married and had offspring. Two of the sons had families who migrated to Wisconsin, and it was fairly easy for me to find their descendants. My other searches took me to Western New York and Iowa. I discovered persons that I had never heard of who were probably my 2nd or 3rd cousins. And the search goes on, especially for the descendants of William who settled in Iowa.

Organizing a reunion of this scope takes a lot of time and energy, but getting to know your distant cousins is fun. At our first reunion in 1980, we had about 200 people. We plan a reunion every three years, and now we have around 100 in attendance. But the excitement is that they come from all over the country-- from California to Florida, New York, Washington, Montana, Illinois, and elsewhere. Our next reunion will be August 5, 1995 in Tomah, WI. (We always have the reunion in Tomah, and usually the first Saturday in August.)

When you have collected family sheets, please make a copy for Soule Kindred, and send to me. I can then incorporate them into our records. And perhaps some of them will join Soule Kindred, so we can expand our organization to include younger generation members.

This adding to our records is a really time-consuming operation, and I can't spend as much time on it as I'd like. Answering correspondence is my first priority, and I am behind in that, too. I still hope to have additions and corrections to our Soule Kindred index, and also the Other Surname index by our reunion in September. However, I do have other interests and responsibilities that take up my time. I don't seem to have the time and energy to devote solely to Soule Kindred, as I did ten years ago.

And that book that I mentioned earlier on the descendants of James and Patience? I don't have the time for that either. I've completed the 5th, 6th, and 7th generations, but we're now into the 12th, 13th, and 14th, with an ever-expanding number of people. I have almost 2000 names in my James-Patience database. This is just one fifth generation family. When you consider that there are 1,017 fifth generation descendants documented in Mayflower Families-3, there must be over a million Soule descendants by now-- and some do not even know it! So help us find them, and make them aware of their heritage.

RECORDING OF FAMILY DATA

One of the objectives of Soule Kindred is the gathering of information pertaining to the descendants of Pilgrim George Soule. Mayflower Families 3 covers the first 5 generations, to about 1800. Our families did a lot of moving around in the 19th century, and you can help locate migration patterns for family groups. That is why the Family Data Chart is printed in each issue of the Newsletter. Our historian may be able to help you with that "missing link". So please keep the information coming.

We would like to suggest that you begin with your sixth generation ancestor from George Soule (or your earliest Soule ancestor, if you haven't made the connection to George<sup>1</sup>). Fill out a form for that ancestor, and then submit forms for each of your ancestors down to yourself. This is especially important if you descend through a female line; Soule women who marry tend to become lost Soules.

We'll give a short explanation of how to fill out the form. Samples were printed in V. 20, #2 and #3-- April and July, if you'd like to refer to those.

(1) The "Generation" space in the upper left corner shows the generation from the immigrant ancestor. Please leave it blank unless you are certain.

(2) In the far upper space on the right for "FAMILY", leave it blank if the surname of "Soule Descendant" is SOULE, SOWLE, or variants, because we'll assign a code number for closely related family groups. If the "Soule Descendant" has a different surname, insert the name in the right upper space.

(3) The next two lines show the ancestors of the "Soule Descendant" back to George Soule<sup>1</sup>. Unless you have an approved Mayflower Lineage or other positive proof, we suggest this be left blank.

(4) When writing dates, follow the genealogical style-- first the day in numbers, then the month in letters, and the full year, such as 6 Feb 1833.

(5) When listing children on the reverse side, put in as much information as you can-- such as spouse's parents, if known.

(6) List your name and address as compiler unless someone else gathers the information. We may need to contact the compiler.

(7) It is VERY important to list sources of data; if the information comes from a family Bible or other record, a photocopy of the information should be included. Other sources, such as Vital Records from towns or states, and census should be indicated.

(8) Leave "Verification" blank for our purposes.

(9) Please give as many clues as possible to facilitate further research. If you are uncertain about a date, enter it, but add "circa" or "ca". For questionable place names, add "possibly" or "probably".

LEANDER<sup>7</sup> SOULE (James<sup>6</sup>, John<sup>5</sup>, James<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3-2</sup>, George<sup>1</sup>), son of Deacon James (1795-1877) and Leah (Bennett) Soule (1796-1865) was born at South Abington (Whitman since 3 May 1886), Plymouth County, Mass. on 12 Jan 1831 (Abington VR), was baptized 2 Sep 1832 (Abington VR) and died at Holbrook, Massachusetts on 22 Feb 1915 (Mass VR 7:84). He is buried in Mt. Pleasant Cemetery in Taunton, Massachusetts.

Leander Soule (he disliked his given name and always wrote it firmly "L. Soule") went to Taunton when he was 20 and made that his home city for most of his life although he lived in Brockton during his later years. In 1968 his grandchildren recall him as a tall man, rugged and powerful of frame, massive of head and chest, and a white moustache adding distinction.

Shortly after arriving in Taunton, young Soule became a superintendent for A. Field & Sons Tack Works which later merged into the Atlas Tack Company, the largest manufacturer in the United States of nails, tacks, and similar products. His versatile and ambitious mind devised many improvements in manufacturing methods. Five of these inventions were patented. He was a persistent promoter of products of the company and by his own estimate he brought over \$100,000 into the company treasury and increased the demand for nails and tacks by \$60,000 to \$100,000 per year.

Branching out into business ventures of his own, he founded "L.Soule & Co., Piano & Organ Dealers" with an office at 24 City Square, Taunton. He was also Manager in Taunton of the "Soule Piano & Organ Investment Company" in Taunton. The advertisements of these companies are strikingly original and trenchant. A little book called "Soule's Diagram for Facilitating the Selection of Pianos and Organs" shows that his inventiveness was constantly at work in practical ways. Forward looking beyond most men of his time, he became agent for the New England Wireless Telegraph Company in 1901 and expresses himself as "sanguine of the success of the manufacture of these instruments" and cited numerous examples of the satisfactory usage of wireless telegraphy. In letters to his children, he often apprised them enthusiastically of what he considered wonderful, though often speculative, opportunities for investment.

Although of necessity a conscientious businessman - and a progressive one - Leander Soule's real devotion was to music. His family recalls that he had a big baritone voice, loved to sing, and it was tradition that he could play any band instrument. He was only 24 when he was elected Chorister of the Winslow Church (Orthodox Congregational) choir in Taunton, a position he held for 25 years. He formed a chorus choir of fifty voices to assist in the services of Cedar Street Chapel and many of them followed when he was called to the Broadway Church (Trinitarian Congregational, Orthodox) to take charge of that choir. At the age of 27 he was induced to open a singing school. The choir of Grace M.E. Church, Taunton, was "under the direction of Mr. Leander Soule" in 1893. Someway, he found time to teach.

The Taunton National Band achieved high reputation under Leander Soule's leadership, which began about 1865. In 1869 he was chosen director of the Beethoven Society, which at that time had an average attendance of fifty but soon increased to 125 under his able management. "A vote of thanks to L. Soule" was recorded "for the able manner in which he conducted the arrangements and carried through to a successful issue the concert of the Beethoven Society in 1870." Always interested in individual people and always throwing himself with energy into whatever he undertook, Mr. Soule was highly successful in drilling the chorus for the Jubilees of 1869-1872, for which he received the compliments of the musical public. It was through his persistent efforts that the Music Festival Association was established in 1879. For this he was presented a \$500 testimonial.

The records of the United States Navy in the National Archives disclose that he enlisted 28 May 1884 as a "Singing Master" on board the U.S. Flag Ship "New Hampshire" while that vessel was in port at Newport, R.I. A muster roll dated 30 Jun 1884 correctly reflects his birth place and age and gives his occupation as music teacher. He was honorably discharged from this service 24 Jul 1884.

Many programs found crammed into a little trunk used as a file box reflected other notable musical performances by Mr. Soule. He was secretary of the Southeastern Massachusetts Music Association and conducted their annual concerts in 1888, 1889, and 1890; the New Bedford Choral Association at the Grand Opera House 26-27 Apr 1892 and the Old

Stoughton Musical Society. Perhaps his greatest pride was in the latter, which he conducted for six years and took "100 singers and 40 accompanying to the World's Fair in Chicago for ten days in 1893." He hastened from Chicago to conduct the great "Oratorio of Emmanuel" (written by J. Eliot Trowbridge of Newton) at an enormous camp meeting on Martha's Vineyard. Trowbridge's "Oratorio of Emmanuel" was first performed in 1887 and was the main work at the 250th Anniversary exercises commemorating the founding of Taunton at the Music Hall in June 1889 led by Leander Soule and, to quote from news reports of the time, "the very able chorus work" under his direction attested to "his abilities as a conductor and a disciplinarian." At the 100th anniversary of the founding of Bristol Academy, Taunton, on Jun 1892, the "Ode on Science" and "Strike the Cymbal" were sung by a choir "led by the veteran chorister, Mr. Leander Soule."

As if business, teaching and choir directing were not sufficient activity for one man, Mr. Soule also participated in civic activities. He is listed as a Common Councilman for Taunton in 1867 and an Alderman in 1868.

Leander Soule was married at East Bridgewater, Plymouth County, Massachusetts, on 3 Aug 1854 (given by some family records, 1855 by other family records and Massachusetts vital records) to Caroline Laninda Graham, who was born at Rumford, Oxford County, Maine, on 1 Feb 1836 and died at Taunton, Bristol County, Massachusetts, on 13 Sep 1897 (Mass. VR 472:383). She was the daughter of Asa and Lucinda (Farnum) Graham (Massachusetts VR 472:383) and was also buried in Mt. Pleasant Cemetery, Taunton, Massachusetts.

Leander Soule and his wife "Lu" were always deep in church work, particularly the Orthodox Congregational denomination. They experienced a deep sense of "conversion" in 1858; a joint letter from father Deacon James and mother Leah rejoices at the fact and congratulates them. Leander's letters state that he was Precentor at two State Sunday School conventions and a New England Chautauqua Convention. Letters to his children speak conviction that he was "on the Lord's work." His children and grandchildren remember him fondly as the loving head of a devoted family.

Children, all born at Taunton, Bristol County, Massachusetts (family records, Ridlon P.557 and Massachusetts VR):

Lewis (Frederic or Frederick Henry Lewis), born at Manchester, New Hampshire, 1856 and died in Woburn, Massachusetts, 9 Sep 1898 (Woburn VR). She and her husband were both talented graduates of the New England Conservatory of Music. After her husband's death, she taught piano for the rest of her life with brilliant ingenuity in teaching methods and recitals of considerable style. Her children:
  1. Frederick Percyval<sup>9</sup> ("F. Percyval") Lewis born 29 Jun 1879 in Woburn, Massachusetts. (Woburn VR)
  2. Anton H. Lewis, born Feb 1881

ii. Caroline Graham<sup>8</sup> Soule was born 7 May 1858 and died at Oberlin, Ohio on 15 Feb 1932. She was married at Taunton, Bristol County, Massachusetts on 4 Nov 1889 (Mass VR 397:189) to Wilmot V. Metcalf, born at ?  
 on 6 Sep 1860 and died at \_\_\_\_\_ on 21 Nov 1942. She was a member of the first graduating class at Wellesley College in 1880 which she attended at her father's insistence and sacrifice. After teaching in Clinton, Kentucky, she returned to her alma mater as an instructor in Greek. She accompanied her husband to Carleton College, Northfield, Minnesota where he was Professor of Chemistry; later to Fisk University, Nashville, Tennessee and then to Oberlin College at Oberlin, Ohio. Her children:  
 1. Rachel Victoria<sup>9</sup> Metcalf, born Nov 1896.  
 2. Norman Wilmot<sup>9</sup> Metcalf, born 6 Mar 1899.

iii. Harry Bennett<sup>8</sup> Soule was born 20 Jul 1864 (Mass.VR 168:129) and died at Providence, Rhode Island on 1 Apr 1930. He was married first at Taunton, Bristol County, Massachusetts on 5 Oct 1887 (Mass VR 379:194) to Hattie Wilber Benner, born at Taunton 1865, and divorced (decree nisi) at Taunton on 23 Mar 1897 (Bristol County divorce indexes). She remarried at Quincy, Massachusetts on 1 Jul 1905 to William Henry Powntney (Mass VR 556:92). Harry and Hattie had a daughter, Marie Jeannette<sup>9</sup> Soule, born at Providence, Rhode Island, on 2 Dec 1889 and married at Dorchester, Massachusetts on 18 Apr 1922 to Alfred Friedland. (Mass VR 1:115). He was married a second time. A son of this marriage died in infancy.

iv. Florence Evelyn Soule was born on 7 Apr 1866 (Mass VR 186:144) and died at Wellesley Hills, Massachusetts on 1 Feb 1961 (Mass VR 104:10). She was married at Taunton, Bristol County, Massachusetts on 30 June 1897 (Mass VR 469:281) to Henry Porter Smith, who was born at Marshfield, Plymouth County, Massachusetts on 29 Dec 1866 (Mass VR 187:378) and died at Wellesley Hills, Massachusetts on 7 Jan 1935 (Mass VR 87:217). He was the son of Ezra and Sarah Jane (Bessy) Smith.

She was graduated from Wellesley College in 1889 and in 1890 from the special course in music there; was Supervisor of Music in the public schools of Mankato, Minnesota and later at Barre, Vermont; also a church organist and pianist. Their home from 1901 was Wellesley Hills, Massachusetts. Her children: (1) Shirley Soule<sup>9</sup> Smith, born 18 May 1901.  
 (2) Sybil Graham<sup>9</sup> Smith, born 2 Apr 1905.

v. Carleton Leander Soule was born 6 Jul 1876 (Mass VR 277:151) and died at New Bedford, Massachusetts on 5 Aug 1943 (Mass VR 70:317). He was married at Sharon, Pennsylvania on 6 Sept 1928 to Louise Sestak, born at New Bedford, Massachusetts on 16 Sep 1891, who remarried at Assonet, Freetown, Massachusetts on 31 Mar 1945 to Louis Trafford Reynolds. Carleton Leander Soule (1876-1943) left no children.

### SOLE, SOOL OR SOO-LAY ?

BY GEORGE ERNEST BOWMAN \*

How did George Soule, the Mayflower Passenger, and his contemporaries, pronounce his name? Was it Sole, to rhyme with coal; or Sool, to rhyme with cool; or Soo-lay', with the accent on the last syllable?

In the fourth volume of this magazine, at page 98, will be found a photographic reproduction of the original will of John Barnes of Plymouth. This will was dated 6 March, 1667/8, and one of the witnesses was George Soule, "Senr". An examination of this reproduction, or of the original autograph signatures of the witnesses, will show that the surname was plainly spelled "Soule", and the addition of "Senr" proves that this witness was George<sup>1</sup> Soule of the Mayflower, not his son George<sup>2</sup>. There is not the slightest indication of any accent, to suggest that the word was French and pronounced Soo-lay', as claimed by a few descendants. The absence of an accent is merely negative evidence, but there is an abundance of positive evidence that the common pronunciation of this name, during the life-time of George<sup>1</sup> Soule of the Mayflower, and for many years after his death, made it rhyme with coal, hole, bowl, etc.

In studying old records we must constantly bear in mind that the recording officers frequently were men of little education, and that their spelling was often an expression of their idea of the sound of a name, rather than of their knowledge of its proper orthography. If, therefore, we find a name spelled in a number of different ways, each one of which can be pronounced to rhyme with coal, hole, bowl, etc., and, further, find that this pronunciation is the only one which can be used for one-third of the forms discovered, there can be no doubt about the common pronunciation of the name.

In sixteen years' study of the original records of Plymouth Colony and the counties and towns into which it was gradually subdivided, I have not found a single instance, prior to 1750, in which the spelling of the name Soule indicated any pronunciation which would not rhyme with coal. The date 1750, seventy years after the death of George<sup>1</sup> Soule of the Mayflower, is mentioned in order to be very conservative. The constantly widening territory in which male descendants of George<sup>1</sup> Soule were found made it impossible to examine every record and determine the date on which the pronunciation "Sool", to rhyme with cool, was adopted by some of the descendants.

An examination of the thousands of pages of original records which have already been literally printed in this magazine, and of a great many original records not to be found in print, has disclosed six ways of spelling this name: Soule, Soull, Soul, Sole, Soal, Sowle, all of which may be pronounced to rhyme with coal.

The earliest contemporary use of the name, in records relating to Plymouth Colony, is in the record of the Division of Cattle in 1623. It is there spelled Soule. [Ante, 1:228] Gov. Bradford, in his list of the Mayflower Passengers, written in 1651, uses the form Sowle, but in the same list writes: "aboute a hundred sowls came over in this first ship" [Ante, 1:9, 11, 12], showing that he pronounced the surname as if it rhymed with coal; and the frequent occurrence on the original records of the forms Soul, Sole and Soal, with the numerous autograph signatures in the forms Soul and Sole, furnish conclusive evidence that for several generations the name Soule was pronounced to rhyme with coal, hole, etc.

\*Editor's note: George Ernest Bowman was a member of the early New York Society of Mayflower Descendants, the founder and State No. 1 of the Massachusetts Society and a notably accurate and well informed authority on Mayflower family histories. We are inclined to accept anything he says as fully authentic and dependable. The article on this page first appeared in "The Mayflower Descendant," Vol. XIV, No. 3, p 129, 130, July 1912.

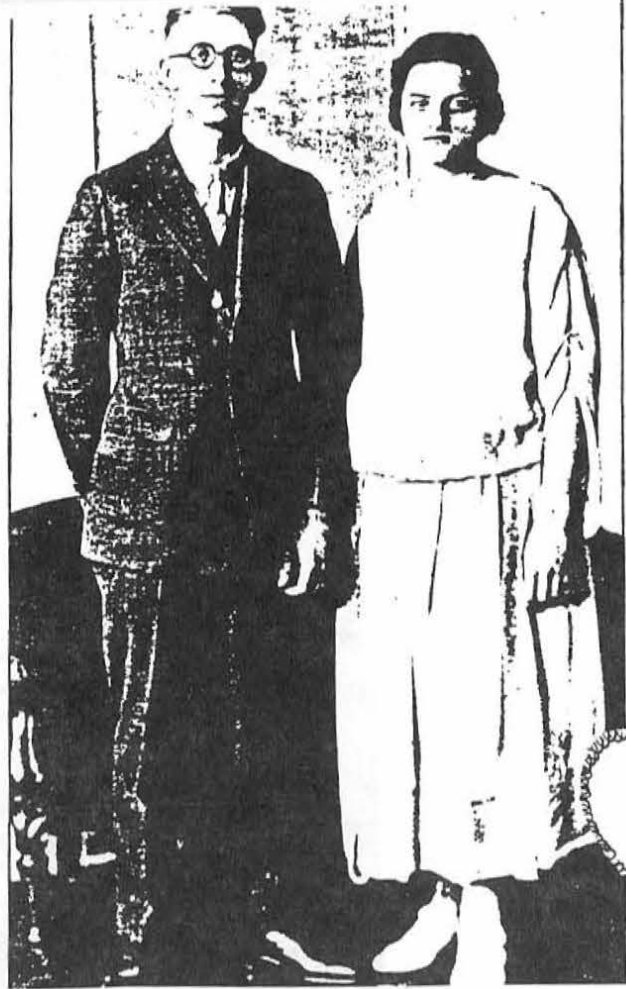

# Leon C. Soule, CSU professor, local leader

EAST CLEVELAND — Leon C. Soule knew he wanted to be a teacher all of his life. He fulfilled his childhood goal by teaching a multitude of subjects at levels ranging from the fifth grade through graduate school.

Mr. Soule served at various times as the chairman of the history, anthropology and art departments at Cleveland State University.

He pushed for the inclusion of black history at the school and was a strong supporter of CSU's requirement that mandates the study of issues relating to black Americans.

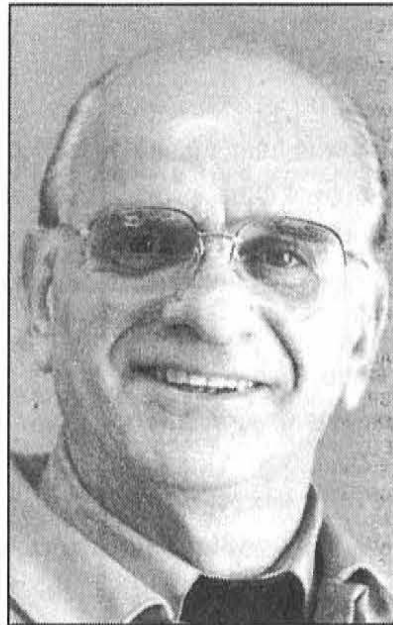
Mr. Soule had been ill in recent weeks. He died Tuesday at home in East Cleveland. He was 65.

He was born in New Orleans, La. He earned his undergraduate degree, master's degree with distinction and doctorate at Tulane University. His dissertation won a prize from the Louisiana Historical Association and was published. It was highly regarded by historians and changed basic assumptions about politics in New Orleans.

Mr. Soule taught grade school in the Lafitte, La., high school and undergraduate history at Tulane and Ohio State universities. He also taught in Glen Arbor, Mich.

Mr. Soule joined the CSU faculty in 1966 as an assistant professor of history. He specialized in American political history, the Jacksonian period and Southern history. He was the author of "The Know-Nothing Party in New Orleans: a Reappraisal," published in 1962.

Mr. Soule had a reputation for pushing students to conduct their own research from original documents and to examine the frame of reference of the authors they read.

Mr. Soule was an active Christian Scientist. He had been chairman of the trustees at First Church of Christ, Scientist in New Orleans, at Fifth Church of Christ, Scientist in Lakewood and at First Church of Christ, Scientist in Cleveland. He was a popular Sunday School teacher and superintendent. He was the faculty adviser to the Christian Science campus organizations at OSU, OSU-Lakewood and CSU.

Mr. Soule was also on the boards of the Rocky River Chamber Music Society, the Darius Milhaud Society, University Circle Inc. and the East Cleveland school board.

He said he wanted to try to make improvements everywhere because he believed in "refining the minutiae of daily life."

Mr. Soule and his wife, Lucile Snyder, were married 40 years.

In addition to his wife, he is also survived by a son, Robert L. of San Francisco, Calif.; and a daughter, Anne Lucille of Cleveland.

A memorial service will be at 4 p.m. Tuesday at the Mather Mansion on the CSU campus, 2605 Euclid Ave.

He was active in faculty governance and served as faculty representative to the CSU trustees. He was president of the CSU chapter of the American Association of University Professors in 1965-1966 and again in 1976-1977.

He retired in 1985, but continued to work at CSU until 1988.

# New Plant Groundbreaking Set By John Soules Foods

John Soules Foods will rededicate its future to the Tyler/Smith County area 11 a.m. Wednesday with a groundbreaking ceremony at the new plant site on Farm to Market Road 14, 1.5 miles north of North Loop 323.

The \$3 million, 60,000-square-foot building is part of a \$4.3 million expansion project for John Soules Foods, a locally-owned meat processing company serving the food service and grocery industries across 10 states.

The facility will replace a plant on Old Overton Road, which was destroyed by fire April 1.

Since then, John Soules Foods has operated in leased space at Brookshire Grocery Co.'s SouthWest Foods facility at East Texas Center, U.S. Highway 69, north of Tyler. The facility was formerly owned and occupied by the Southland Corp. of Dallas.

Company president John Soules said the company has experienced strong, consistent growth over the

past eight years, and was already evaluating its expansion options when the fire occurred.

The new plant will effectively double production space and enhance the company's ability to meet demands of new food contracts with Sysco Food Services and Brookshire's, among other customers, Soules said.

The plant currently employs 86, and the expansion is expected to create a minimum of 25 jobs.

After the fire, Soules confirmed that he was contacted by cities in three states, all of which were offering attractive financing packages as incentives to relocate the company.

Later, however, Smith County, Tyler Independent School District and Tyler Junior College approved four-year tax abatement for investment in the new plant, leading to the company's decision to remain in the Tyler area, Soules said.

Community support and tax abatement were key considerations

in the company's decision to remain, Soules said.

The new meat processing plant will be on a 67-acre tract on FM 14, also known as Tyler State Park Road, between Interstate 20 and North Loop 323.

The 200-by-300-foot building will be equipped with 20-foot clear heights, six dock doors and 7,000 square feet of adjoining office space, according to a description of the proposed building provided by the Tyler Economic Development Council.

Hal Snyder, representing Triad Construction, will serve construction manager on the project.

TEDC staff members worked extensively with John Soules Foods and area governmental bodies in securing both tax abatement and financing options for the project.

## Pilgrim descendent seeks kindred

Let's face it. Some folks simply have more soul, er, *soule*, than others. Just ask Betty Jean Haner.

Since 1970, Haner, a Colonie resident, has served as treasurer of the 360-member Soule Kindred in America Inc., an international genealogical society that tracks descendants of George Soule, one of the 102 Pilgrims who travelled to America aboard the Mayflower in 1620.

Soule died in January 1679 in Duxbury, Mass., near Plymouth, the site of the Mayflower's historic landing.

Haner, 64, said she got involved with the Soule Kindred after seeing an advertisement in the Mayflower Quarterly, a publication for descendants of the passengers who had come to the New World.

"I've been with it ever since," Haner said, crediting her mother with stirring her interest in her family tree. Haner's sister, Margaret Rocke, who lives in Florida, is also a member of the Soule Kindred, she said.

Because the 10th-generation descendant of Soule manages much of the membership's paperwork, Colonie is actually the de facto headquarters for the group, she said. The group's current president, Stanley Soule, lives in Bedford, Quebec.

There are several other Soule Kindred members who reside in the Capital District, including another Colonie resident, Harrison Leland, Haner said.

Founded in 1967 by its first president, George Standish Soule and its historian, Air Force Col. John Soule, the group became a non-profit organization five years later, Haner said.

While most members of the society are middle-aged or elderly, Haner noted that the group does boast some younger members, including secretary Christine Schlosser of Wisconsin, who is in her late 20s.

Each family society has a historian who maintains a library of microfilmed genealogical data for members to trace their roots, she said. Other services offered specifically by the Kindred Society include two \$1,000 scholarships to children of Soule descendants and a quarterly newsletter about society members, Haner said.

In all, there are 12 societies throughout the country dedicated to descendants of Mayflower passengers, including the Soule Kindred, the Brewster Society, for William Brewster, and the Alden Kindred, for descendants of John and Priscilla Alden, she said.

The Soule Kindred meets annually, but switches cities each year "to make it easier for 'cousins' spread throughout the country to participate in the reunions," she said. This year the reunion was held in Florida, Haner said.

Every three years, each society comes together for the Mayflower Triennial, held in Plymouth by the Plymouth, Mass, umbrella group, the General Society of Mayflower Descendants. That group, founded

in 1897, oversees 50 state societies, as well as one each in the District of Columbia and Canada.

Next year marks the 375th anniversary of the landing of the Mayflower. For July 23, 1995, the Mayflower Society is planning to hold a memorial parade in Plymouth, and also hopes to hold a swearing-in ceremony for 102 new U.S. citizens by a Supreme Court justice to honor the Mayflower passengers, according to Mayflower Society Historian General Caroline Kardell.

Membership in either the General Mayflower Society or one of the individual groups such as the Soule Kindred is exclusively for descendants of Mayflower passengers, Kardell said.

She noted a number of former U.S. Presidents are among the most famous descendants: John Adams, John Quincy Adams, Zachary Taylor, Ulysses Grant, James Garfield, Franklin D. Roosevelt and George Bush. Bush's wife Barbara is also a descendant, Kardell said.

According to B. J. Haner, This article was a result of sending a letter and a copy of the Genealogy at work sheet on page 108 of the Fall 1994 Newsletter.

Mr. Murnane took a few liberties and got a few facts wrong but at least something got published in this one paper.

## THE WILL AND INVENTORY OF GEORGE SOULE.

*Literally transcribed from the original records,*

BY GEORGE ERNEST BOWMAN.

George Soule died at Duxbury, probably in the month of January, 1680, since his inventory was taken 1 February, 1680 (new style). His wife died at Duxbury, in December 1676.

The will and inventory were recorded in the Plymouth Colony Wills and Inventories, Volume IV, Part I, page 50.

[p. 50] In the Name of God Amen

I Gorge Soule seni<sup>r</sup> of Duxberry in the Collonie of New Plym-outh in New England being aged and weake of body but of a sound mind and Memory praised be God Doe make this my last Will and Testament in Manor and forme following Imprimis I comitt my soule into the hands of Almighty God whoe Gave it and my body to be Decently buried in the place appointed for that use whensoever hee shall please to take mee hence; and for the Disposall of my outward estate which God of his Goodnes hath Given mee first I have and alreddy formerly by Deeds under my hand and seale Given unto my two sonnes Nathaniel: and Gorge All my lands in the Township of Dartmouth; Item I have formerly Given unto my Daughters Elizabeth and Patience all my lands in the Township of Middleberry Item I Give and bequeath unto my Daughters Sussannah and Mary twelve pence a peece to be payed by my executer heerafter Named after my Decease; And forasmuch as my Eldest son John Soule and his family hath in my extreame old age and weaknes bin tender and carefull of mee and very healfull to mee; and is likely soe to be while it shall please God to continew my life heer therefore I give and bequeath unto my said son John Soule all the Remainder of my housing and lands whatsoever to him his heires and Assignes for ever Item I Give and bequeath unto my son John Soule all my Goods And Chattles whatsoever Item I Nominate And appoint my son John Soule to be my sole Executor of this my last Will and Testament; and lastly I Doe heerby make Null and voyde all other and former wills and Testaments by mee att Any time made; and Declare this Instrument to be my last Will and Testament In Witnes wherof I the said Gorge Soule have heerunto sett my hand and seale this eleventh Day of August in the yeer of our Lord one Thousand six hundred seaventy and seaven;
