

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# **EDITOR'S NOTES**

Take note of the 1998 Soule Kindred annual reunion registration form on page 76. Margaret "Peg" Rocke is the hostess this year in Vero Beach, Florida. I'm looking forward to the Kennedy Space Center tour, among other things down there.

Well, I have decided that it's time for somebody else to share in the fun of putting this newsletter together quarterly. The Soule Kindred is now seeking another editor to take over this task.

If you are interested in becoming the next newsletter editor contact either President Chris Schlosser or myself.

Let me give you an idea of how I put a newsletter together. I have a personal computer (of course) with a black and white scanner and a black and white laser jet printer. My software is Microsoft Windows 95 and Microsoft Word for Windows version 6.0.

Microsoft Word for Windows is desktop publishing software. Using it, I create pages (templates) that define the pages of the newsletter. Much of the time I need only print out these pages (containing only the header at the top and the page number) and then scotch tape the letter or article to the blank page.

Occasionally, some information has to re-typed if the copy is poor quality. To avoid typing, I also have Optical Character Recognition (OCR) software that allows me to put the news article in my scanner and "read" the article into my computer as if I had re-typed the article. I also have a library of every issue of the newsletter for reference purposes and in case somebody requests a re-print of an old article. The newsletters would go to the new editor.

The printing company that prints, assembles and staples the newsletter from the original copy that I give them, requires that the total number of pages be divisible by four. So, each issue has to have 36, 40, 44, etc., pages, including the front and back covers. This is because the printing industry "shoots" four pages at a time with their camera and prints those four pages on a single large sheet of paper on their printing machine. If my original copy has more or fewer pages divisible by four than the newsletter contains blank page(s), which is a waste of paper and time.

I print the address labels on Avery brand self-adhesive label paper from the membership file I have in the computer. Again, I use Word for Windows and my laser jet printer to print the labels. Treasurer Betty-Jean Haner sends me the membership information and I simply keep my membership file in my computer. I have the membership file formatted so that I can also print it out on newsletter pages for inclusion in the year-end newsletter.

My local United States Post Office has issued a local bulk mailing permit (No. 109) in the name of the Soule Kindred. After applying the address labels, I deliver the sacks of newsletters for mailing.

As the saying goes, many hands make light work. The editor tasks are more efficiently and less tediously performed by two or more people. If you would like to take on the job, I will gladly help you set-up your computer and assist you to make the transition and the job as easy as possible.

# Finding family ties is an adventure for Pilgrims' offspring

# An estimated 35 million people can claim Mayflower lineage

You may be a Pilgrim Fathers son or daughter and not know it.

An estimated 35 million people are direct descendants of the 41 Mayflower Pilgrims who signed that famous compact in 1620 to form a "civil body politick for our better ordering and preservation" just before anchoring at Plymouth Harbor.

Once considered political and social outcasts, they have left a vast progeny who inhabit all 50 states, Canada, Australia and at least a dozen other nations. The Pilgrims' offspring may be the bluest of America's blue bloods, but they are hardly exclusive.

"The descendants of the Mayflower Pilgrims truly have scattered all over the world," said Richard Maxwell of Plymouth, Mass.

Maxwell, governor general of the 24,000-member General Society of Mayflower Descendants, is himself a descendant of seven the signatories to the Mayflower Compact. "It is not unusual to have multiple Mayflower ancestors. It was, after all, a very small community at first," he said. It is also quite common for the Puritan's progeny to marry 14 generations later.

"I'm a descendant of Stephen Hopkins. My wife is of John Howland," Steve Garrison of Orange County, Calif., wrote last week to an Internet message center operated by the National Society of the Sons and Daughters of the Pilgrims. We are interested in finding any 'cousins' in our area."

The vast majority of Pilgrim offspring are ignorant of their heritage. Few families maintain records that go back 377 years and ancestry organizations are becoming stricter in

the documentation necessary to confirm he claims of descendants.

Maxwell's group is the largest organization tracking what became of the Pilgrims' children. According to the general society's membership information, the offspring of the Mayflower voyagers still are disproportionately concentrated in New England.

"Of our largest state societies --we call them colonies--Massachusetts is number one with more than 3,000 members. But California comes in second place," Maxwell said.

Wisconsin has 374 members of The General Society of Mayflower Descendants. A statistical analysis of the group's membership records conducted by Scripps Howard News Service shows that the Pilgrims' children migrated mostly west, with heavy concentrations in Midwestern states and along the Pacific Coast.

The descendants were much less likely to move to Southern states. (The Mayflower originally set sail for Virginia and landed in Massachusetts by mistake.)

"I think it's true that most of them migrated to the western and central parts of the United States," said Pilgrim descendant Paul T. Zantzinger of Atlanta. "But I'm sure there are still plenty of Southerners who are eligible to join our group. They just don't have the interest or focus on doing so."

The Scripps Howard study found that the single highest concentration of Pilgrim progeny is in the Washington, D.C., area where 127 out of every 100,000 people are members of the Mayflower descendants' group. The finding is based upon calculations using Mayflower Society membership for each state or area divided by the Census Bureau's 1996 population estimates for the area. Next highest in concentration of known Pilgrim descendants are

Maine, Vermont, Rhode Island and Massachusetts.

The states with the lowest concentration are West Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Georgia and Louisiana. Even Alaska and Hawaii have higher concentrations of Mayflower descendants than most Southern states.

There are also a considerable number of Pilgrim descendants in Canada.

"At the end of the American Revolution, many of the descendants were English loyalists who fled to New Brunswick and Nova Scotia," Maxwell said.

Further complicating the search for Pilgrim offspring is the revelation that some of the Mayflower voyagers left children in England rather than expose them to the hazards and hardships of founding a colony in the wilderness of the New World.

"We've recently discovered a possible line to a child of John and Joan Tilly, who was born in England. Because his parents made the trip, he is a descendant of the Mayflower even though he didn't make the crossing," Maxwell said.

Despite the daunting nature of the search, Pilgrim descendants vow they will keep looking.

"It's interesting to know about your family, to get an idea of what your ancestors went through," Zantzinger said. "Certainly their heritage has survived. Their determination, strength of character, and their will to go forward is what carried the development of the New World."

# Descendants find some settlers' lives had dark side

Thanksgiving is a time when some descendants of the Mayflower settlers may want to bow their heads in thanks that others haven't found out what their ancestors were really like.

One was a pig thief. One was a drunk. One was a mutineer. One was a polygamist. Another was a murderer.

These are some of the findings of Caleb Johnson, 21, a history student at Texas Tech and designer of Web pages on the Internet that tell about the 104 Pilgrims and "adventurers" who left England and arrived aboard the Mayflower, at what is now Plymouth, Mass., in November ]620--and how they didn't, in fact, celebrate Thanksgiving in any formal way.

Johnson, who claims descent from no less than seven of the Mayflower travelers, warns that doing genealogical research is not for those worried about finding unwelcome things.

"Genealogy is for those who want to learn about their ancestors," he says. "It's not for those who want to put their ancestors up on some kind of pedestal."

Consider Edward Doty, one of Johnson's own forebears whose crimes are described on the young historian's Web page.

In 1621, Doty was found guilty of dueling and sentenced to have his heels tied together for one hour. In 1633, he committed a breach of contract for failing to turn over six pigs to Joseph Rogers, then fined 50 shillings for slandering William Bennett. During the next 15 years, Doty was convicted of disorderly conduct, assault, stealing firewood and letting his cows eat a neighbor's cornfield.

It happens that Doty was punished for one of his offenses by Miles Standish, a Johnson ancestor.

"It's like being descended from Billy the Kid and Pat Garrett both," says Johnson.

At least four other Mayflower settlers racked up impressive criminal histories, according to Johnson.

Stephen Hopkins was found guilty of breaching contract, price fixing, illegally selling alcohol and assault and battery. He was convicted of mutiny, as well, and sentenced to death, but punishment was commuted on behalf of his wife and children.

William Latham was convicted of breaking the peace and public drunkenness. Richard More was excommunicated for adultery and accused of polygamy for having wives on both sides of the Atlantic, but he was never so charged.

Then there was John Billington, who murdered another settler and was hanged.

Johnson points out that those with such records all belonged to the "London contingent" and were not religious separatists. The Pilgrims who fled from England to Holland in 1607-'08 couldn't afford to charter a ship to America by themselves, so they entered a partnership with "ordinary" Englishmen who wanted to come. Most of these settlers did not have churchly convictions.

Johnson's research has met no criticism, as yet, from the General Society of Mayflower Descendants, which has about 25,000 on its mailing list, including Johnson himself. Caroline Kardell, the society's historian in Plymouth, says, "I've heard a lot of good things about his Web page. He's doing a good job."

Dear Cousins:

You never know what interesting new "cousins" you'll "meet" in the news-letter, and I want to tell you about my experiences. The letter [published in January] from young Frank F. Soule III is a case in point. Back before the USA entered World War I his grandfather and my grandfather—both F. F. Soule—had their mail mixed—up in Chicago. I had a letter in my files which his grandfather, Frank F. Soule, had written to my uncle, Col. John E. Soule, responding to him about the mixup. He had met Fayette F. Soule, my grandfather, at the time, he also reported that a closer Soule Cousin had worked with his firm. He was a vice—president of Conde Nast and moved to New York in 1931. Fayette Soule moved to Pensacola in 1918 to build ships. I have written Frank III.

I started to write a dozen years ago when you had a picture and a little info on the Soule Domain restaurant in Lake Tahoe...before the reunion near there. Charles Edward Soule IV and I have a mutual great-grandfather. At the time I knew nothing else about him except his name, but have since corresponded with Ruth Soule Walley, his aunt, who with my mother Betty Soule Merritt, are the only grandchildren who survive.

Perhaps the most remarkable "find" took place almost 20 years ago, in May 1979. The 1979 Soule Kindred reunion was in Pensacola, and we published the lineage for Margaret Hall, a Soule cousin through his daughter. She helped with reunion plans. This lineage information reunited Gen. Hal Cushman Pattison with his grandmother's family in the South, about whom he knew almost nothing. She had left Pensacola in 1861 as the Civil War broke out. Margaret was a second cousin once removed. Several years ago, Gen. Pattison aided another Pensacola cousin with her Mayflower papers, and she wrote him about the family who remained behind.

So you see, you never know what will turn up in the pages of the newsletter, so keep the letters coming!

Dear Kierstin,

Thank you for your letter containing the Family line beginning with Jared B. Soles (1828-1897).

I am afraid that I can not help you at all in your search for other connections to this line. As you know, I am primarily tracking descendants of William and Anna (Sewall) Soule of Alburgh, Vermont ("William the Loyalist"). Your line may not be connected to this family at all.

If your line is connected to William the Loyalist, judging by the spelling of the name, it would <u>perhaps</u> be through Joseph Soule, 3rd son of Wm. and Anna Soule. Both William "the Loyalist" Soule and his 3rd son Joseph Soule, moved from Alburgh, Vt., to Sutton, Que. in 1895. Eventually, William came back to Alburgh (at least he is buried there). Joseph stayed in Canada and had a large number of descendants. The largest number of them that I know of are descended from John Soles (1789-1872), apparently the first and only one of them to choose this spelling: S O L E S. The problem is, we know of 12 children of this John and Martha (Pettis) Sole including one in 1827 and another in 1829. Doesn't leave a very likely place for your Jared's birth in 1828.

The oldest of Joseph's sons was Joseph Soule, Jr., born probably in Alburgh, Vt., before Joseph Soule, Sr. moved to Quebec. I know nothing else about this line. [we're "reaching" a bit here, Kierstin].

Dear Family and Friends,

The six roads west from the eastern plains of Colorado can only go where the mountain river valleys will let them. We live in the southwest corner of the river valley running northwest out of Colorado Springs for US We are actually west of the whole of Cheyenne Mountain on whose foothills we lived for the first six years here. We are so close to new foothills and peaks that in the past weeks, the sun set around 3:30 p.m. Our retirement center campus continues to expand with new residents now moving into a second 90-unit Apartment building. 14 new garden homes are underway. With their completion, the overall capacity will approach 450.

Last year, I reported that I had stopped my writing to check on our family roots. I urged everyone to give help to good family record keeping. Here is a report on my progress, which was our "travelling" for 1997.

In Mary's family we have found 6 men who fought in the Revolutionary War and Mary and our oldest daughter, Linda, are now in the Daughters of the American Revolution. These 6 men all belonged to German-speaking Lutheran emigrant families on her father's side. Through the DAR magazine we found records on her mother's side of 2 emigrant families who were French Presbyterians as Huguenots. Her mother would have been thrilled with the information. When I finished Mary's DAR application and showed her the folder of 113 pages, she said: "Daddy are your trying to give me the family I never had"? And I said: "No, I am trying to give you the family you always had and didn't know it."

In my family we ended up with 5 Pilgrim, English Puritan emigrants, all of whom signed the Mayflower Compact. In their families, we found 2 patriots of the Revolution. Our Aunt Jessie Gertrude Richards Duncan, who is 91, is now a member of the DAR and her application for membership in the General Society of Mayflower Descendants has been approved in Colorado.

Why bore you with all this trivia at Christmas time? It has been rewarding to fill in parts of the puzzles that I have been working on for over 40 years. If we had known about these 13 families while we lived amongst you, it would have given great focus to our travels. There are several scholarships for young people related to the 13. But the real reason is more significant. All 13 of these emigrant families came to these shores because of a passion for religious freedom and the equality of all men. 8 of their descendants joined Jefferson's Declaration to fight for faith and freedom with their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor. At one point in the new movie "Amistad," the black hero summons his ancestors forward to help him. The colonial patriots summoned help by taking all men back to the beginning and summoning their creating God as the source of their help and equality. It was the faith begun by the grown Christmas baby that brought all 13 of our emigrant families here. My writing begins with Jefferson's Declaration, will show what he did and will recover the achievement of the equality of all human beings in that same faith. The whole unfolding story of the two equalities has been in the scriptures all along, but it has been lost in the jumble of other stories. Coursens Thang

# Pensacola poet and author leaves legacy of history

Adeila Rosasco Soule, a spirited poet and author who chronicled West Florida from the horse-and buggy era to the space age, has died. She was 95.

"She was a very precious lady," said Bill Rosasco of Milton, a cousin. "She was well known for her writing ability. We're all going to miss her." Mrs. Soule had been in declining health for more than a year. She died Friday in her Bayshore Condominiums residence. She is survived by her son, Peter Fayette Soule of France, and her sister, Alyn Rosasco Mayo of Pensacola.

Memorial services will be announced at a later date.

In 1986, Mrs. Soule was named West Florida's first poet laureate by a coalition of government, civic and literary organizations.

"I am very pleased, very grateful for this recognition of my, well, I'll say it, of my 'giftedness,' " she said at the time. "It's a gift I must share."

Mrs. Soule lost her sight about 15 years ago but continued to write both poetry and stories.

"That never deterred her," Rosasco said. She didn't stop writing poetry until about nine months to a year ago. She hung in there very nicely.

Among her privately published books of prayers and poetry: "The Thinking Chair," 1971; "Listen, Pilgrim," 1980; "A Bird with a Broken Wing - Who Sings," 1983. "Broken Wing" was written in sections titled "Maidenhood," "Grandmotherhood" and "Personhood."

J. Earle Bowden, editor of the News Journal, said Mrs. Soule spent many hours describing her childhood to him and also wrote extensively about it.

"She was a delightful lady, very studious, knew what was going on in the world, Bowden said. "She wrote very lyrically about growing up early in this century. She was from an Italian family in the shipping business. She used to tell me they had their own little plantation life right in the middle of the West Florida woods."

Mrs. Soule, inspired by a deep interest in history, began work in the late '70s to clean up and repair the historic St. Michael's Cemetery in Pensacola.

In 1979, she complained bitterly, "Vegetation and savagery have taken over this place."

As a result of pleas at City Council meetings and other public forums, the Catholic diocese, the city and some downtown businesses began working to repair the cemetery.

# ADELIA ROSASCO SOULE

Adelia Rosasco Soule, retired teacher and author, died May 31, 1996.

She was born January 31. 1901 in Genoa, Italy but moved to the West Florida area with her parents Peter Louis Rosasco and Ermelinda Schiaffino Rosasco, as a young child.

She graduated from the College of Notre Dame of Maryland in 1923 and received her Masters Degree from the University of Grenoble in France.

She was the first Poet Laureate of West Florida and the author of four books.

Mrs. Soule was preceded in death by her daughter, Linda Soule Preston, and grandson, Peter Soule Preston.

She is survived by her son, Peter Fayette Soule of France, and her sister, Alyn Rosasco Mayo of Pensacola. Memorial services will be announced at a later date.

# SOWL-THREADGOLD CEMETERY IN TOWN OF ARGYLE BECOMES WISCONSIN'S 34TH DESIGNATED BURIAL SITE IN LAFAYETTE COUNTY

The Sowl-Threadgold Cemetery, a small historic family cemetery in the town of Argyle, has become the 34th designated cemetery in Lafayette County — and the 29th site listed this year by the State Historical Society of Wisconsin's burial sites preservation program.

The cemetery's namesakes, Robert Threadgold and Elijah Sowl, among the first pioneer settlers in the town of Argyle, are both buried in the cemetery. It was Robert who saved the three-rod-square hilltop cemetery from being lost to future land transactions, and the town has acted to maintain the small plot.

A catalogued burial site must have an accurate legal description recorded with the register of deeds. Older cemeteries often do not have accurate legal descriptions on record. In the case of the Sowl-Threadgold Cemetery, concerned descendants acted to have the cemetery resurveyed and the Society's burial sites office proceeded with cataloguing. When a site is catalogued, owners are notified of their responsibilities under state law and receive a tax exemption on the portion of their property containing the site.

The state protects all burials from disturbance — historic cemeteries, single burials (marked or unmarked), and Indian mounds. As part of its responsibilities under Wisconsin's Burial Sites Preservation Law, the State Historical Society works to list all state burial sites in its inventory. As of September 1997, the inventory of catalogued sites in the state numbers 9,381.

Persons having information about burial sites in their area are urged to notify the Society's burial sites preservation office. Historic information, current deeds, legal descriptions, owner information, and current photographs documenting the site's condition are welcomed.

# SURVEY MAP



URL — Uniform Resource Locator is the Internet address of an Internet page. Each URL is unique, and there are millions of them.


Usenet newsgroups — Electronic discussion groups organized around topics of mutual interest to participants.

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
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
