

[Editors's note]: Our feature family history this quarter is based in the genealogy of Darwin Soule (see cover photograph). The information was kindly provided by Sharon Vanden Bossche. This is a picture of Darwin Soule, my Great, Great Grandfather. He was born April 26, 1832 in Michigan (possibly New York since we have been unable to prove). He died July 18, 1921 in Auburn, Indiana and is buried in the Waterloo Cemetery. Darwin was the son of George Soule and Nellie Ellen. Darwin was married to Margaret Knight Hodges on April 17, 1869. He married also Lena E. McClary on April 23, 1898 and Aniso V. S. Blaker on October 29, 1903. Darwin fathered at least nine children: Mattie, Ben, Maggie, Nellie, Franklin (my line), Maude, Nina, Glen, and Ruth.

In this picture (unknown when it was actually taken), Darwin looks to be wearing the clothing of someone who worked for the railroad. Does anyone know for sure and, if so, which railroad was in Auburn around this time (1871-1921 - just guessing here)?

October 24, 1998

The meeting was called to order by the president, Chris Schlosser at 9:30 A.M.

It was moved and seconded that the reading of the minutes be dispensed with since they had been published in the newsletter.

Historian's Report

Gerry Schlosser stated that she has appreciated working with Soule Kindred for approximately 20 years, first as Newsletter Editor and then as Historian.

C. Jack Sowles thanked Gerry for a wonderful job and he is sure it will be hard to follow in her footsteps.

Jack is still getting organized, rebuilding filing cabinets and bookcases. He is doing some research. He has had about 20 quires for information from Soule Kindred members or prospective members. He is subscribing to Soule El NL, a computerized query service of Soule names. He has had about 60 queries from there.

Index Report

Jim Schlosser reported that there are samples of Indexes on the table. He will send orders for copies, which are \$10.00 per copy to those signing up. Sign up on the sheet on the table including your name and address. Jim has developed a new index. It is an index of items in the Newsletter since 1967.

Treasurer's Report and Membership Report

B. J. Haner gave the treasurer's report and membership secretary's report. There are copies enclosed. There was \$1195.00 donated to the scholarship fund this year. The membership dues covered the newsletter costs. There were a large number of copies needed to be sent to new members. There were not enough copies printed at the original printing to cover the need for additional requests.

Pat Johnston asked what was being done when memberships were not renewed and if we knew why the memberships were not renewed. Many times this is due to the death of members. Many times she receives the obituary but if B. J. does not receive this, then she has no way of knowing. A renewal notice is sent out in April when renewals have not been received.

Jack Sowles asked how he would receive a list of new members. B.J. said the distribution of the new member's names and addresses sent to the historian and the Newsletter Editor. She does this at the same time she sends out the new member packet.

There was a question as to what was included in the new member packet. B.J. had a packet, which she showed to the group. It will be left on the front table for members to look at after the meeting.

Newsletter Report

Will's last issue of the newsletter will be the October issue. Charles Healy of Creve Coeur, Missouri will be the new editor. Will has been the editor for 2 years and said it has been interesting. He will help Chuck get started.

During the past year there has been an exchange with the Sole Society in England of the Newsletter they publish. The copy they send goes to the newsletter editor. The information included is about the Soles (and variations of the spelling) of England. If there is something, which the newsletter editor feels, will be on interest, he will include it in our newsletter

Harold Soule asked if Will was interested in receiving biographies from members. Will said yes, and if there were newspaper articles which might be of interest to send them in also. Sometimes there are errors in newspaper articles, Will suggested that the person sending in the article make corrections, in order that the article in our newsletter be correct. Robert Bishop suggested that if the person sending in biographies had a computer and E-mail, that they use this method of transmittal in order to get the information printed in the manner in which it is written.

Chris formally thanked Will for all his work on the Newsletter. He has done an exceptional job and we thank him for his effort.

Scholarship Report

Elaine Soule' thanked the organization for honoring her Grandson with a scholarship.

Pat asked about the scholarship criteria.

The application is in the January issue of the Newsletter. The committee must receive the application by July 1st of the year of application. The applicants must have a proven lineage to George Soule. The committee includes

NEW BUSINESS

The Soul Connection in England was done through E-mail connections with the Newsletter Editor there. Chris received a letter from BBC about a Documentary on Mayflower Pilgrims. She and Gerry Schlosser were interviewed by phone for the documentary.

An Internet sight has been established www.soulekindred.org. A new web master should be considered for Soule Kindred in America, Inc. Jack Sowles suggested that perhaps Ruth Hall, who already has a web site from Roots Web Server, would be willing to marry up with our organization. Will has already made an initial contact with her. Bob Mosher also manages web sites for many organizations. He is also a Soule descendent.

The organization has paid \$70 to get the name for three years. Also, we need to have a server. There is usually an annual fee. Chris has paid for 6 months server until December. Then we will have to choose either to continue with that server or contact another one and pay the annual fee. We have funds set aside for this expense. They were donated for that purpose last year.

If anyone would like a T-shirt, please sign up with Norman Soule. Barbara asked if it would be possible to have sweatshirts. Norm will check on the price and have the information published in the Newsletter.

There were notes read that were received from Stanley and Carol Soule, Peggy Turner and Chris Hill. All of these peoples are members who usually attend the reunion but were unable to this year.

Elaine Soule' asked if it would be possible to increase the number of scholarships. Scholarships are determined by the amount of interest the funds earn. If we used part of the principal to increase the number of scholarships, we would soon be unable to give scholarships. It was decided that the committee would determine the number of scholarships, which could be given, based on the amount of income available.

Russel Kenyon suggested that maybe a mini newsletter could be sent out to e-mail addresses. Will felt that the work involved in publishing the newsletter is quite extensive and to ask a person to also put out a mini newsletter via e-mail might be too much.

Ben Soule' suggested that perhaps the Board of Directors should consider investing in a public address system in order that all the members could hear what is being discussed. There was a public address system in the room and it was set up to be used for the rest of the meeting.

There was additional discussion about the possibility of getting a web master. Years ago the organization had an associate historian. Jack Sowles suggested that position be reestablished and that person be the web master. He again pushed for Ruth Hall for the job. Chris and Will have talked to Ruth Hall and have no feeling that she would be willing to do the job. They will contact her and Robert Mosher to discuss the possibility of working with us on a web site.

Jack Sowles brought up the possibility of the organization purchasing a copy machine for the historian; setting up an annual budget for the historian, paying expenses of moving the materials from Gerry Schlosser's to his office and other ideas for the historian job.

It was decided these were ideas that first needed to be discussed by the executive board and a meeting for 3:00 P.M. the same afternoon was set up.

Next Year's Reunion

There was a discussion about the past practice that the reunion be scheduled every three years at Plymouth to coincide with the Mayflower Triennial Meetings. The majority of members liked the idea of having the reunion at that time in Plymouth. However there was no one who would host the reunion in Plymouth.

Norman Standish did offer to host the reunion in the summer at Lanark, Illinois. This is an area that many early Soule's settled in and should be very interesting to the members. Norman's invitation was accepted. Date of the reunion will be published in the Newsletter.

Jim Schlosser moved that the meeting be adjourned, Russel Kenyon seconded the motion and the meeting was adjourned at approximately 12:30 P.M.



Page 28.—JAMES SOWLE, hatter, of Saratoga, Albany County, New York, after my just debts are paid out of my dues, I give to my wife Jemima, my best bed, bedstead and cord with a full set of furniture for Winter and Summer, together with what interest she has left at Nantucket, both real and personal, free and clear to her own disposal; Also the use and improvement of my homestead farm and patten farm, called the potter place for ten years, if she remain my widow, or so long as she remains my widow to enable her to bring up my children that is under age; Also the use of all my household goods until I shall otherwise order, my meaning is that my wife should continue my widow after ten years, for her to have the choice of either room in my now dwelling house and the profits of thirty acres of the east end of my homestead farm so long as she remain my widow, and I desire her to accept the above gifts in lieu of her thirds or dower: to my son Jonathan, the two fifths of the one half of the one half of what estate I may have left to be delivered to him when he arrives at the age of twentyone years; to my sons, James and Robert, the manner as the above gift to Jonathan; to my daughters, Deborah, Lydia, Eunice and Hannah, each an equal quantity and quality of household goods as I have already given to their sister Levinas; Also

each of them a cow, to be given them when they arrive at the age of eighteen, out of my household goods or other estate to be left to the discretion of my executor. To my five daughters, Levinah, Deborah, Lydia, Eunice and Hannah, the other half of my estate exclusive of all particular gifts to be equally divided among them and be delivered to all that has arrived at lawful age; when my son Jonathan arrives to lawful age and in like manner as it becomes clear of other gifts my intent and meaning is that my wife have the use of all my live stock for ten years if she continues my widow, to be left to the discretion of my executor, whether to give them up to her as she may need or to demand them for division; Also my widow to have all my provisions both harvested and growing, for the use of my family; to my three sons all my wearing apparel to be divided equally; to my two sons, Jonathan and James, my guns. I make my brother, Jonathan Sowle, guardian to all my children under age; Also sole executor, authorizing him to take a deed or deeds as the circumstances of my land may need; Also to sell, dispose, give deed for to settle my estate or for my children's benefit.

Jonathan Soule: Appears with rank of private on muster and pay roll of Captain Calvin Partirdge's company, Colonel John

Cushing's regiment, for service at Rhode Island. Enlisted, September 23, 1776. Time of service, one month, twenty-eight days. Vol. 3, p. 62.

Jonathan Soule: Appears with rank of private on muster and pay roll of Captain James Harlow's company, Col. Ezra Wood's regiment, raised for eight months to guard the passage of North river. Enlisted, June 5, 1778. Time of service, eight months, four days. Vol. 20, p. 8.

He died January 6, 1832, aged eighty-four, and was buried in the old Elm street cemetery, and in 1875 removed to Pine Grove Cemetery.

Jonathan Godfrey Soule was a native of Waterville, and was educated in its schools and college, graduating from the latter in 1857. After graduation he taught as principal of Hartland Academy, later as instructor at Evansville Seminary, Wis., and as principal at Hartland and Foxcroft. In 1874, he was admitted to the bar in Waterville. He afterward served for twelve years as trial justice and was fourteen years a member of the board of education. His experience as a teacher fitted him for efficient service in this office, in which he is well remembered. He died January 1, 1888.

In 1825 the militia of the State included, infantry, 35,212; cavalry, 1,168; artillery, 1,865. Total, 38,245 men in seven division.

Other Waterville men who held rank in the militia, were M. P. Norton, Clark Lillybridge, Joshua Davis, Avery Briggs, Samuel Plaisted, Sanford Pullen, William Dorr, Jeptha Crowell, Gailen Soule, Harrison A. Smith and Joseph Marston.

WATERVILLE LODGE, No. 221, NEW ENGLAND ORDER OF PROTECTION was instituted June 19, 1893, with the following charter members: William T. Haines, Warren C. Philbrook, W. Fred P. Fogg, Carroll W. Abbott, Colby Getchell, R. E. Attwood, Gustavus L. Weeks, S. A. Estes, Clarence R. Miller, Granville Sibley, E. A. Bailey, Waldron F. Kennison, George V. Spaulding, Clarence E. Tupper, F. M. Shores, J. K. Soule, and S. H. Rhoades.

This order is a ritualistic, benevolent and fraternal one, with a present membership of about sixty. A rather remarkable thing in connection with Waterville lodge is that in the nine years of its existence death has not entered its ranks.

...Accordingly, the matter was brought to the attention of the College Board who acted favorably on a proposition to entrust the control of the school to a separate corporation. The

following act of incorporation was passed by the Legislature and approved March 8, 1901:

"AN ACT to incorporate the Trustees of Coburn Classical Institute.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

"SECTION 1. Nathaniel Butler, Franklin W. Johnson, George D. B. Pepper, Horace Purinton, Leslie C. Cornish, Edwin C. Whittemore, Horatio R. Dunham, and Cyrus W. Davis are hereby created a corporation by the name of the Trustees of Coburn Classical Institute, for the purpose of maintaining a literary institution in the city of Waterville with all the powers of similar corporations including the power to make and establish by-laws and regulations for the management of its affairs and the proper government of the institution.

"SECTION 2. Said corporation shall be governed and its powers exercised by a board of not exceeding seventeen trustees, of which the president of Colby College and the principal of Coburn Classical Institute for the time being shall, ex-officio, be members. At the organization of the corporation, the number of other trustees shall be fixed by the by-laws and shall be divided as nearly as may be into three classes; one class shall be elected for one year, one for two years, and one for three years; and at each annual meeting thereafter, members shall be elected by the board in place of those whose terms shall expire, and any vacancies in the other classes shall be filled.

"SECTION 3. Said corporation may use the real estate held in trust for it, and the income of all funds held in trust for it, by the president and trustees of Colby College, in accordance with the trust by which they are so held and with such arrangements as shall from time to time be made with said president and trustees; and may also take and hold, for the purposes of its creation, property in its own right to the amount of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

"SECITON 4. This act shall take effect when approved."

Additional members, besides those mentioned in the above act were elected as follows: George K. Boutelle, William T. Haines, George O. Smith, Fred M. Preble, Allan P. Soule, George W. Lord, Norman L. Bassett, J. Frederick Hill. At the first meeting of the Board, held June 22, 1901, George D. B. Pepper, D. D., LL. D., was chosen president; Norman L. Bassett, LL.B., secretary; and Horace Purinton, treasurer. The management of the school passed into the hands of the new corporation, July 1, 1901. The value of this change has already been seen during the past year in which the school has been strengthened in various ways and the plans have been set on foot for increasing the permanent funds of the institution.......

......Other well known members of the superintending school committee from 1864 until the town became a city were Prof. Moses Lyford of Colby, the Rev. J. O. Skinner, Prof. E. W. Hall of Colby, J. G. Soule, who died January 1, 1888, after a continuous service of thirteen years, Hon. S. S. Brown, Dr. A. W. Small, formerly of Colby, now of the University of Chicago, and Mrs. Martha Baker Dunn.

.......After Waterville's incorporation as a town, June 23, 1802, little time was lost in setting its school machinery in motion. At the first town meeting, July 26 of that year, the following school agents were elected: Elisha Hallet, Thomas Parker, Nehemiah A. Parker, Nelson Colcord, Asa Soule, Micah Ellis, Isaac Corson, John Streeter, Thomas Cook and Samuel Moors. On August 9 the town voted to raise \$300 for the purposes of schooling.

At the March meeting of 1803, the sum of \$400 was voted for schooling and only \$50 for preaching. At an adjourned meeting held May 2, it was voted to accept a report presented by the selectmen for dividing the town into school districts, which were referred to in the report as Ticonic, Rose's, Tenlot, Almond Soule's, Tozer's, Low's, Moors's, Asa Soule's, Osborne's, and Crowell's. The selectmen's report also provided for the choice of the several school agents at the annual town meeting, each district to have the liberty of "providing, agreeing with and paying their teachers," subject to the restrictions of the law in such cases made and provided. Discretionary power was granted the selectmen to aid small districts, and Rose's district was advised to join with neighboring families in Fairfield in support of a union school.

I leave my well-beloved wife Lydia, all my lands, goods and chattels; to be occupied by her during life; the estate to be kept together, but in case of want she to have liberty to dispose of it. I appoint my wife and son, Rouland Soule, executors. After the decease of my wife my estate to go equally to my children. The share of my son George, deceased, to go to his son Joseph; that belonging to my daughter Margaret unto her five daughters; that of my daughter Lydia, deceased, unto her children. Should any of my children die before my wife, their dividend to go equally to their children.

THE DEVOL FAMILY

Mary Soule, a daughter of George (2) and Deborah, born in Duxbury, Mass., was married to JOSEPH DEVOL, son of Jonathan and Hannah Audley Devol, all of Dartmouth, Mass., grandson of William Devol. The evidence of this marriage as given in the "Mayflower Descendants" is as follows: "In 1706, Joseph Devol and wife Mary (Soule) gave a receipt to her brother. William Soule, as executor of his father's, George Soule's, will." She had books and apparel, £8, a bed, pair worsted combs (cards), pewter, a warming pan, cow, lamb, hogshead of cider. Both Mary and Joseph Devol died in 1726. They had issue as follows:

- VI. BENJAMIN DEVOL, born Jan. 26, 1709; married Aug. 23, 1731, by Philip Taber, to SARAH MOSHER, a daughter of John and Experience (Kirby) Mosher, said Experience being the daughter of Richard Kirby and Patience Gifford, daughter of William Gifford of Sandwich.

Dissatisfied with his name, Benjamin seems to have changed it to "Devel," and some descendants have followed suit. He lived in Tiverton, R. I., until 1742, when he sold his lands and removed to Devel's Hollow, Oblong, Dutchess County, N. Y., near Wing Station, "one of the choicest pieces of land that was laid open by

settlement of the dispute concerning boundary between
Connecticut and New York, where his descendants still
live." Benjamin Devel died in the Oblong Jan. 19, 1792.
Will dated "24th 3d Month, 1788," and is recorded at
Poughkeepsie, N. Y. Nine children were born to
Benjamin and Sarah (Mosher) Devol.

Their daughter, SALLY ANN SHOVE, born 1803, married in 1821 ANDREW HOAG, son of Isaac and Anna (Powell) Hoag of Laurens, N. Y. (The Shoves and Hoags all Quakers.) Andrew and Sarah Ann (Shove) Hoag had four children; two of them, DENNIS and ISAAC, died single. The daughter, Phebe Ann Hoag, was the wife of MR. FITCH of Eagle Harbor, N. Y., by whom two children. Pioneer & General History of Genauga

Published in 1880 by the Historical Society of Genauga County, Ohio, this complied history of the county's sixteen townships was written by volunteers. Histories of the following townships are included: Auburn, Bainbridge, Burton, Chester, Chardon, Claridon, Hambden, Huntsberg, Muson, Middlefield, Montville, Newbury, Parkman, Russell, Troy, and Thompson.

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....The Baptist Church.—The regular Baptist Church, of South Russell, was organized, about 1841, by Elder Stephenson, of Chester. The first members were: Jackson Gifford and wife, Mrs. Josiah Nettleton, Harry Isham and wife, Parley Wilder, Lydia Warren, and Lemuel—eight members. Elder Stephenson preached for them awhile; also, Elders Green, Jackson, Thompson, and Willard, until he united with the Disciples. After awhile they became reduced in numbers, and finally sold their house, and it was moved away, about 1868. The Baptist meeting house was built, in 1846, two miles south of the center, at Soules Corners.

The Disciple Church.—The edifice of this organization was built, in 1848, on the east side of the road, opposite the Baptist house. The Disciple congregation was organized, in 1843, by Charles Bartlett. The first members were: A. L. Soule, Myron Soule and wife, Benjamin Soule and wife, Delia Soule, Anson Matthews and wife, Oliver Nettleton, David Nettleton, Mrs. A. C. Smith, Benjamin Matthews and wife, and Mr. Hyne and wife. Elder Wm. A. Lillie was their first resident preacher. Elder Wm. Hayden was the first to call the attention of the people to the principles of the reformation. A. Bentley, J. H. Jones, Jonas Hartzel, Dr. Belding, and other preachers, have labored there. Issac Errett, and A. S. Hayden held the first meeting in the Disciple house, January, 1849.

Three brothers, A. L. Soule, Myron Soule, and Benjamin Soule, came to Russell, in 1839, from Onondaga county, New York. They were active business men. A. L. Soule, Benjamin Soule, and Richard Robinson, with their families, moved to Michigan, about 1855. A. L. Soule died there in a few years. Myron Soule died, March 22, 1863, in Russell. The Union meeting-house at the center was built in 1850. Elder A. B. Green held a protracted meeting there, in the spring of 1851, and fourteen converts were added to the congregation of the Disciples. Elder A. Burns is at present preaching at the Disciple bouse one-half of the time.

About 1850, the ladies of the Disciple congregation organized a sewing society. Mrs. A. L. Soule was the first president, and Cordelia Robinson, treasurer. It's object was to help the needy. It continued but a few years.

BENEVOLENT SOCIETIES.

The Soldiers' Aid Society.—This was started in 1861—Mrs. James Cooper, first president; Mrs. Ahira Haven, vice-president, and Mrs. Myron Soule, secretary.

Perhaps many would deem this work very imperfect without something being said of the local militia. We will therefore add a brief sketch. From the first settlement of the town, our fathers seem to have acquired a military spirit, and were very active in organizing military companies. It became necessary at a very early day, to organize a military company, which arose from our critical relations to New York, the revolutionary struggle, and the almost constant apprehensions of an invasion from Canada. Up to about 1812, there was but one standing company after which there were three, one in the Little Village, one at the Corners, and one at the Borough. These companies continued in existence down to about 1840, when they were disbanded. Besides these standing companies, there was organized and maintained for a long period, a company of Cavalry, which was in existence at a very early day, but we are unable to determine the precise date of its organization. A portion of this company belonged in Wells

and Tinmouth. There was but one captain from this town; James McDaniels.

The company at the Borough, or east side of the town was next organized. Among its members were:William Soule, Gardner Soule, Wesson Soule, James Soule, Pardon Soule, John Soule

As 33 years have passed since our last roll of freemen was given, and as there are many at the present time, and will be at some future time, who would desire to know who were residents of the town after another generation had passed, we will give below a list of the names of the freemen in town (Danby) in 1866, viz:

....Ephraim Mallory was elected moderator of the annual meeting of 1775, and four highway surveyors were elected that year, viz: Abraham Chase, William Gage, Stephen Rogers and Clark Arnold. The assessors were William Bromley, William Gage and Stephen Calkins.

The people of the different towns were holding meetings and conventions, in reference to the general safety of the inhabitants on the grants. A meeting was held at the house of Micah Vail, Jan. 30th, to appoint delegates, to attend a general meeting of velegates from the different towns, to be held at the house of Mr. Martin Powell in Manchester, Jan. 31st. Joseph Soule was moderator of this meeting, and Micah Vail, Ephraim Seley and Joseph Soule were appointed delegates to represent this town in that convention.

WILLIAMS, STEPHEN, from Rhode Island, in 1776, was the first settler on the farm owned by Ita Edmunds; he was a son of Goliah Williams, and grandson of Joseph Williams, and of English descent. He became one of the largest landholders in town, being a prominent and useful citizen. He was the first

grand juror elected, which office he held for several years, and besides was honored with various other positions of trust, which attest his ability and good judgment. JOHNSON, CAPT. WILLIAM, born in 1785, m. Sally, da. Of Elisha Lincoln in 1806, and succeeded to the homestead of his father. His wife was born in 1784 and died in 1870, aged 86. Capt. Johnson was a man of industrious habits and a thrifty farmer. He was also an excellent mechanic and worked considerable at that trade. He was a member of the Baptist church and was looked upon as a Christian of exemplary piety. His religious views were afterwards changed and he became a Universalist. He was an officer in the State militia and held a Captain's commission. All speak of him as being an obliging and trustworthy citizen, and his memory is held in high esteem by all those who knew him. He was a man of genial temper, kindliness of feeling, generous and liberal; a kind parent and husband. No man loved fun better than he did, being always "fond of a good joke," yet plain and simple in his tastes, unobtrusive in manner, and of quiet humor. He lived a life of sterling honesty and uprightness, which terminated August 27th, 1846. The names of his children are as follows: John, Almeda, m. Aurelius Kelly; Elisha, Perry W., Reuhama, and Hiram, died in 1838 aged 21. John m. Caroline Bruce and died in 1829, aged 22, leaving two children, Henry and Sally. Elisha m. Basheba Preston, and died in 1849, aged 38, leaving two children, Julia Ann and John. His widow was again m. to Rufus Whitney and lives in Granville, N. Y. Henry, son of John, m. Helen Soule and has three children, Ida, Mylon and Lizzie.

In 1818, he removed to his farm in Mt. Tabor, where he continued to live for many years, during which time he gained many friends, as being a man of strict integrity and uprightness of character. He was a justice of the peace twenty-nine years in Mt. Tabor; town clerk and selectman several years, and was a prominent citizen of that town. He subsequently, in 1841, removed back to Danby, and

kept tavern for several years. He died at Rutland in 1857, aged 76. His wife died in 1866, aged 86. Their family consisted of eleven children: Lucy, m. Larned Bowen; Sophia, m. Andrus Bowen, of Dorset; Almira, m. Dr. Knowlton; Parris E.; Daniel; Hemen M.; Huldah; Amanda, m. Rev. Wm. W. Pierce, and died in 1844, aged 25; Caleb, Jr.; Hannah, died in 1831; and Larned. Parris, m. Ann, da. Of Wesson Soule, and lives in Dorset.

There were but two dwelling houses at Danby Borough, at that time, and one hotel kept by Bradford Barnes, but it was very thickly settled along Otter Creek north of the village. Hi All,

Anyone else researching William "The Loyalist" Soule? According to Ridlon he settled in Alburg, Vermont sometime after the defeat of the British forces at Saratoga in 1777.

I passed through Alburg today, and stopped at the cemetery near the jct of rt's 2 and 225. Most of the Soule (typically spelled Sowles) stones are in good condition and quite legible although the frost has heaved some of them. Engraved as Ridlon said (in the 1920's I think) on hard slate they are still quite legible. The Cemetery itself is also mwell maintained.

The family seems to have also spread eastward through Lower Canada, today the province of Quebec. In Mystic Que. (Missisquoi Co.) there are about a dozen Soule markers in the local cemetery. Further east near the town of West Brome(Brome Co.)there is a Soles road.

There seems to be some debate as to whether or not William was the son of Ezekiel and Hanna Delano or not. Any comments?

Alburg itself is situated at the north end of Lake Champlain where the Richelieu river empties onto Missisquoi Bay. The Richelieu was once a major waterway and is still navigable today for pleasure boats.

I descended through Amasa Soule who may have been William's brother.

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
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
