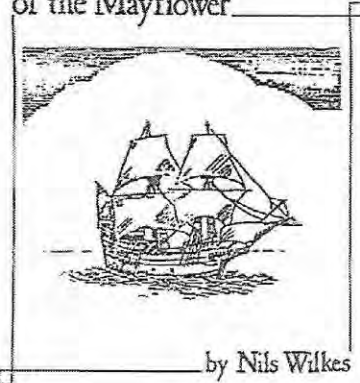

Grand canal idea soon dried up

Patent-medicine millionaire Asa T. Soule had the idea to create a 90-mile irrigation canal running from west of Dodge City to near Kinsley, fed by the Arkansas River.

This is one in a series of vignettes celebrating 151 years since Kansas became a United States territory. The series' name comes from the state motto, the Latin phrase Ad Astra Per Aspera, "To the stars, through difficulties."

In some parts of Kansas, Asa T. Soule is still known as one of the state's most colorful promoters.

Soule's influence sparked the Gray County-seat war, promoted the town of Ingalls and provided the initial funding for at least three banks.

But he's best known for the Eureka Irrigation Canal, one of western Kansas' earliest irrigation attempts.

By the late 1870s and early 1880s, Soule was a multi-millionaire.



He'd made a fortune selling Hop Bitters, a potent medicinal concoction guaranteed to cure anybody of anything. It was one of the top-selling cure-alls in the nation during the late 19th century.

Soule came to Kansas looking to invest his money in projects. He pictured a 90-mile canal running from west of Dodge City on the Santa Fe Trail to Coon Creek near Kinsley, fed by the Arkansas River. Along the canal, Soule envisioned

settlers growing produce and shipping it out by train.

In reality, the working portion of the canal ran only from Ingalls to Spearville, about 40 miles.

It might have worked under most conditions, but two things caused its demise: a drought and the sandy soil in western Kansas. Because of the soil, more water soaked into the ground than flowed through the canal.

The canal operated for only five years. But Soule made money on the project, selling bonds to a group of English investors for more than \$1 million in gold.

Soule also campaigned for Ingalls to be the seat of Gray County in southwest Kansas. He promised residents in Ensign and Montezuma that if they

backed the idea, he'd build them a railroad.

The people of Cimarron wanted their town to be the seat, so Soule hired professional gun-fighters to help convince them it should be Ingalls.

After Ingalls residents stole county records housed in Cimarron on Jan. 12, 1889, shooting broke out, leaving one Cimarron man dead and three Ingalls men wounded.

In the end, Cimarron became the county seat and Soule's railroad was never built.

Soule also gave 40 acres to Dodge City, where Soule College was built. After the college opened in 1888, its name changed several times before it ended up as St. Mary of the Plains College, which closed in June 1992.

Soule died in 1890.

After more than a century, portions of his canal are still visible along sections of U.S. 50.

One Family's Response to Sorrow

This winter I was browsing the SOULE name on eBay. A post card of the GEORGE GARY SOULE MEMORIAL FOUNTAIN caught my attention; I placed a bid and won the auction.

George Gary Soule's parents, Rowland and (unknown mother) were educated in western New York at the prestigious Casenovia Seminary. Later in life they moved to Watervliet, Michigan, located in southwestern Michigan.

Born at Lysander, New York, March 22, 1841, George sought his education at Red Track Seminary, New York. A school teacher, Carrie E. Hunt of Bridgeport, Connecticut, became his bride on December 12, 1867. To them were born sons Rowland L., Joe C., and Ellis G., and a daughter Daisy Eloise who died Christmas of 1872.

In his earlier years George Soule engaged in the publishing business of F. Beers, Ellis & Soule, New York City (map publishers). It was in 1869 that he entered the banking business with George W. Winegar, an intimate friend of his early years, and established the firm of Winegar & Soule, a bank of exchange and brokerage, opening for business July 1, 1869. By 1870 Plainwell had grown to more than a

thousand people.

Upon the deaths of Mr. and Mrs. Winegar in 1876, George Soule's banking partner became J. W. Hicks and the firm of Soule & Hicks continued until Hicks died in 1893. At this time Mrs. Hicks and R. L. Soule associated with George under the name of Soule, Hicks and Soule. This association continued until 1903, when the business was purchased by the Citizens' State Savings Bank.

A member of the M. E. Church, "he valued most his good name, his honor and integrity and set the highest value on the reputation he had justly earned for uprightness. Mr. Soule belonged to many fraternal societies. He was connected with the Michigan Paper Company from the time of its organization and had served for several years as a member of its executive board,

Mr. Soule, in company with three other gentlemen, was largely instrumental in starting The Enterprise in 1886, and has always remained a firm friend of the paper"

The Soule's son Ellis became gravely ill at his Spokane, Washington home. The elder Soule collapsed and died at his home while he and his wife were making preparations for their son's funeral in Plainwell. An impressive double funeral service was conducted for the beloved father and son on February 16, 1905.

Plainwell celebrated a Homecoming in August of 1907, at which time a park named for Joseph Hicks and G.G. Soule Memorial Fountain were formally presented to the Village as gifts from the wives of these gentlemen.

Fannie L. Pell, Village Treasurer of Plainwell for many years, she recounted, "One afternoon I heard a terrible resounding crash! I ran to the front office windows and saw what I thought was smoke.... Oh! two cars had come together and were on fire. I blew the fire whistle and brought the volunteer firemen in just seconds. What I thought was smoke proved to be cement dust that filled the air when a big truck full of hides was driven into the northeast concrete block column of the Soule Memorial Fountain!" Because of a chain-reaction accident in 1953, the Soule Memorial Fountain had to be removed; it was an obstacle for modern day traffic.

In the summer of 1970 the Jaycees built the current Plainwell Memorial Fountain, a modest version of the original. One unique feature is that one of the original arch stones was used in this new construction, linking the past with the future.

Information for this article was derived from "History of Plainwell, Michigan" which was graciously loaned to me by Jeff Phillips of Kalamazoo, Michigan. Published in 1978, it was written and edited by Joan B. Whitney of Plainwell and printed by Taylor Publishing Co., Dallas, Texas,

This volume's end papers feature a close-up view of the fountain which was located at the intersection of S. Main Street and four other streets. It is a sturdy concrete structure with metal railings surrounding it; if not for horses, it may have been to protect it from automobile traffic. Flowers boxes skirt it; there are four white porcelain drinking fountains inside the structure as well as exterior basins for horses and dogs. The red tile roof sports a floral motif pediment. This photo is of a later date than the post card here pictured.

In this post card can be seen the name SOULE in bas relief above the right entryway, the lettering is perhaps 15" high. ☒

DEATH'S SIGNAL BLOW.

Sudden Death of George G. Soule Follows that of his Son Ellis.

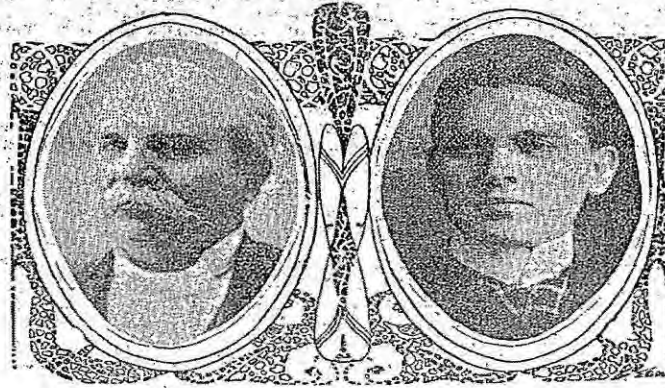
The telegram, announcing the death of Ellis G. Soule at Spokane, Wash., which was received here Sunday afternoon by his father, G. G. Soule, was a terrible shock to him as he had not known of his son's illness. Mrs. Soule was in Grand Rapids caring for the children of Mr. and Mrs. B. L. Soule, during the severe illness of the latter, and there Mr. Soule went to break the news of the great sorrow which had fallen upon them. Together Mr. and Mrs. Soule returned here Monday evening to prepare the home for the last sad home-coming of their son, as once before for their daughter. In this work he was on our streets yesterday morning and walked home about twelve o'clock. Soon after dinner he became faint and complained of his head. Dr. Stuck was hastily summoned and tried to relieve him but without effect and within twenty minutes his spirit had passed away.

The news of Mr. Soule's death has cast a deep shadow over the entire community and the sympathy of all goes out to the wife and mother, so terribly bereaved.

One of the saddest and most impressive funerals ever held here was that of George G. Soule and his son, Ellis, which took place at the Methodist church at 2:30 Saturday afternoon. The double calamity had become widely known and the church was crowded with sorrowing friends and neighbors, gathered to pay the last tribute of respect to the deceased. A quartet, composed of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Schoonmaker, Mrs. George H. Copp and C. W. Lasher, furnished appropriate music. Rev. F. W. Haist conducted the service, speaking from the words, "Know ye not that there is a prince and a great man fallen in Israel this day?" Rev. J. Z. Rossiter followed with a few words of consolation after which Peninsular commandery, Knights Templar, of Kalamazoo, conducted its impressive funeral service. The chancel was filled and the caskets were covered with beautiful floral tributes from friends here and in Spokane, Wash., where Ellis was in business. Among these were floral emblems and sprays from the Michigan Paper company, the A. O. U. W., K. O. T. M. M., K. of P., 1st National bank, Kalamazoo, Mystic Shrine of Grand Rapids, Knights Templar of Kalamazoo, Plainwell F. and A. M., L. L. A., Methodist church, and Sunday school and many others. The local F. and A. M. attended in a body and marched to the cemetery where the Knights Templar conducted the ceremony at the grave. Messrs Geo. H. Copp, Geo. W. Gilkey, J. H. Hitchcock, Al. F. Brown, C. W. Machemer, and J. R. Schoonmaker were the honorary bearers for Ellis.

George Gary Soule was born at Ly-sander, N. Y., March 22, 1841. His father and mother were both educated at Casenovia seminary, then the leading educational institution in western New York. His father, Rowland Soule, was a Methodist preacher, who later in life located at Watervliet, Michigan.

Geo. G. Soule was educated at Red Creek Seminary, New York. In his

early manhood he engaged in the publishing business in New York city, the firm name being Beers, Ellis & Soule. December 12, 1867, he was married to Carrie E. Hunt of Bridgeport, Conn. In March 1869, he sold to his partners his interest in the publishing business and in company with Geo. W. Winegar, an intimate friend of his early years, he established here the banking house of Winegar & Soule, opening for business July 1, 1869. On the death of Mr. and Mrs. Winegar in 1876, the late J. W. Hicks became a partner, the firm being Soule & Hicks. On the death of Mr. Hicks in 1893, Mrs. Hicks and R. L. Soule associated with G. G. Soule under the firm name of Soule, Hicks and Soule, which continued until October 27, 1903, when the business was sold to the Citizens' State Savings Bank.

Mr. Soule united with the M. E. church March 21, 1880, during the pastorate of Rev. G. L. Cole. He has been a member of the official board of the church for nearly the entire time of his residence in this village. He valued most his good name, his honor and integrity and set the highest value on the reputation he had justly earned for uprightness. He leaves a widow and two sons, Rowland Lucius and Joe O. His only daughter, Daisy Boise, died about two and one half years ago and his second son, Ellis died Sunday February 12.

Mr. Soule belonged to many fraternal societies. He was connected with the Michigan Paper company from the time of its organization and had served for several years as a member of its executive board. He was a loving and devoted husband, a kind and indulgent father. His genial and sunny disposition made him a favorite in society and at all social gatherings he was a welcome guest.

Mr. Soule, in company with three other gentlemen, was largely instrumental in starting the Enterprise in 1886, and has always remained a firm friend of the paper and in his death we feel that we have sustained a personal loss.

Dear Cousin Bill,

I sent something about this in about a year ago, but it must have got lost in the shuffle.

For years a substantial branch of the Soule family was partially severed from the main branch. In 1787 or so, a William Soule appeared in Alburgh VT, having served in the British army. He arrived with at least one child and proceeded to beget more. His descendents spread out from there, including my grandfather, George H. Soule, who left for North Dakota in the late 1880's. Problem is, since about 1967 nobody knew where William5 ("The Loyalist") came from. The lineage in Ridlon says that he was the son of Ezekiel4, but that William was proved to have died an infant. This break in the lineage did not prevent us from being members of the Soule Kindred (we WERE Soules, after all), but it did make us uneasy--and prevented those of us who had not joined the Mayflower Society from doing so. (They let me remain a member, grandfathered in, so to speak.)

All that has changed. The soon to be published final volume on the Soules of the Fifth Generation by Louise Throop establishes this line of descent: George1, George2, Nathan3, Timothy4, William5, Timothy6, William7, William Timothy8, George H.9, George10, George11 (me). When I came to apply for my new line, the General Society had already approved this line up through William Timothy8. By a search of various records, I recently proved my descent. My General Society number is 18957; my Minnesota number is 350.

I write about this in case any other descendant of William5 wants to use this existing research to establish their lineage. It is now possible after almost 40 years.

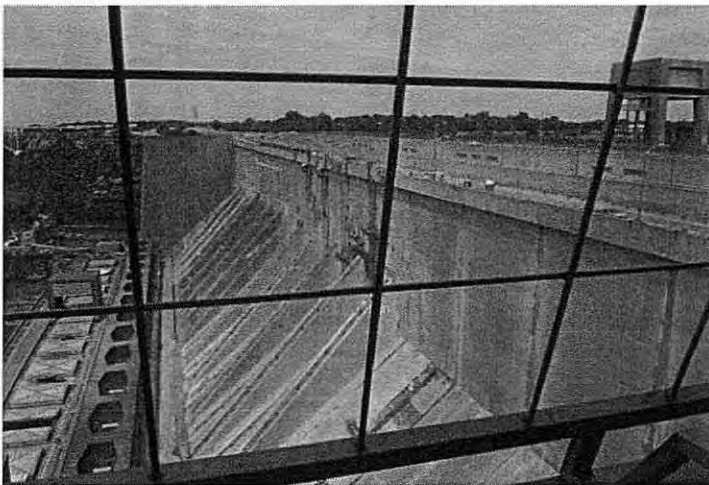

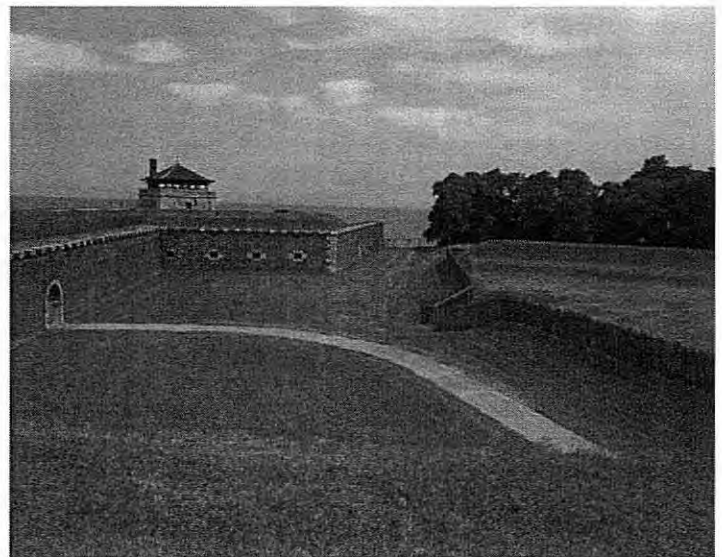

Annual Meeting
June 25, 2005**

The annual meeting of Soule Kindred in America, Inc. was held at the Hampton Inn in Hutchinson, Kansas. Frank Soule called the 37th general meeting to order at 9:02 A.M.

The Minutes of the 2004 Annual Meeting were reviewed. Christine Hill moved the minutes be accepted. Bill Warden seconded. Frank called for vote. The minutes were unanimously accepted.

Frank introduced Bill Warden as the Newsletter editor. Bill requested that members submit articles and obituaries to help him produce a better and more complete Newsletter.

It was also proposed that the 2007 reunion be held in Cincinnati, Ohio and the 2008 reunion be held in Plymouth, MA


Frank said that we are asking male members with the Soule name (direct male lines to George Soule) to have a DNA test done. This is being done to see if it will help find George Soule's parents.



Dorothy F. Soule, 1923 – 2005

Dear friends, relatives, and colleagues of Dorothy and John Soule,

It is with deep regret that we inform you of the passing of Dorothy Fisher Soule in the early morning hours of March 5th, 2005. As you may already know, Dorothy had surgery to remove a malignant tumor last fall. We were very hopeful for her complete recovery. She was working at the University until shortly before her death. However, recent tests revealed that the cancer had spread. Upon that discovery, she made the decision that she would forego further medical intervention. Dorothy spent the last days of her life at peace, with dignity and clarity of mind until the very end, surrounded by family and others who loved her.

Dorothy Louise Fisher was born in Cleveland, Ohio, October 8th, 1923. She grew up near Cleveland, and received her Bachelors degree at Miami University of Ohio. Dorothy met John D. Soule in a biology laboratory at Miami University. (John wrote home that he had met a beautiful girl, who was really smart too.) Prior to John's departure for the Pacific during World War II, they were married July 3rd, 1943, in Denver Colorado. They embarked upon a life-long partnership of tremendous love and mutual respect. While awaiting the return of her beloved John, Dorothy began her association with the University of Southern California in 1945, as a Research Associate.

After John's return, Dorothy continued as a Research Associate while John earned his Ph.D. at USC, working in association with Dr. Raymond Osburn on the phylum Bryozoa. Dorothy also entered into the world of the Bryozoans at that time, typing John's thesis and creating scientific illustrations. A passion was born for both of them – they became true research partners. Dorothy eventually went on to earn her Masters degree from Occidental College, in Los Angeles, and her Ph.D. from Claremont Graduate School, Claremont, California. Their work lead them to many exotic locales, and they became colleagues and friends with wonderful people around the world. These friendships and connections were as important to them as their work. After John's death in 2001, Dorothy continued her work with the Bryozoans, and was actively engaged in research until one week prior to her death.

Dorothy is survived by two daughters, Patricia Kendrick and Susan Harrison, five grandchildren, and one great-grandson. In accordance with Dorothy's expressed wishes, there will be no memorial service. 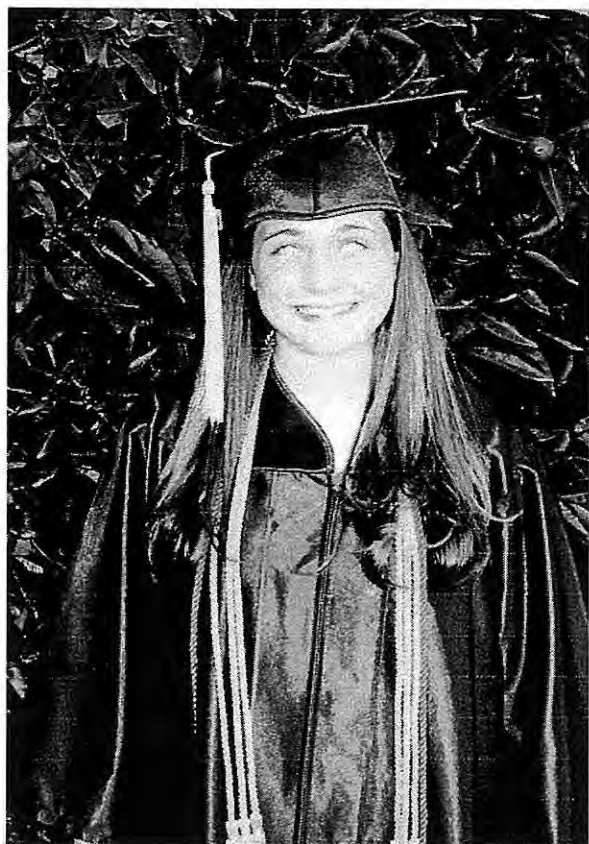

A Quebec Soule (Sowle) Lineage

- 5) Joseph Soule, born ca. 6 October 1747 in Dartmouth and died in Fairfield, Franklin Co., VT on 12 May 1820. He married Eunice Hungerford ca. 1767. Both are buried in the Munro Soule Cemetery in Fairfield, VT.
- 6) Timothy Soule, born 17 February 1768; died 27 December 1860 in Fairfield, VT. He married Betsey Elliot, daughter of Benjamin Elliot ca. 1787.
- 7) Timothy, Soule Jr., born at Fairfield, VT on 8 April 1813 and died there too on 16 April 1882. He married Miranda H. Burnham at St. Albans, VT on 4 May 1841.
- 8) Henry Alvin Soule, born at Fairfax, VT in 1848; date and place of death unknown. He married Persis Russell in St. Albans, VT on 29 April 1872.
- 9) Royston Floyd Percy Soule, born 22 February 1890 in Stanbridge East, Quebec, Canada; died in Montreal, Quebec on 28 April 1963. He married Alice Maude Watson on 20 September 1919. She was born in North Stanbridge, Quebec on 4 June 1889 and died at Mystic, Quebec on 27 February 1961.
- 10) Stanley Everett Soule, born in Mystic, Quebec (living) married Carol Joyce Sager on 28 November 1953 in Stanbridge Ridge, Quebec (living). Congratulations to Heather Keldgord

Two books have recently been published that are of potential interest to Soule Kindred Members. They are 1491 by Charles C. Mann, published in 2005 by Alfred A. Knopf, and Mayflower by Nathaniel Philbrick, published this year by Viking Penguin. Each will be reviewed in the next printing of the Soule Kindred Newsletter.

1491 refers to the year just prior to the arrival of Columbus in the New World in 1492 and examines what is now known about life in the pre-Columbian era. It describes the world that our George Soule found upon the Mayflower's arrival. Interesting enough, there is a chapter called "Why Billington Survived" which refers to the well documented incident of John Billington the younger's stay with Indians after getting lost in the woods near Plymouth. The largesse shown Billington by Massasoit helped to ensure the survival of the entire colony. It is an odd jump from 1491 to 1620, but useful for our understanding and forgivable since Charles C. Mann is himself a John Billington descendant.

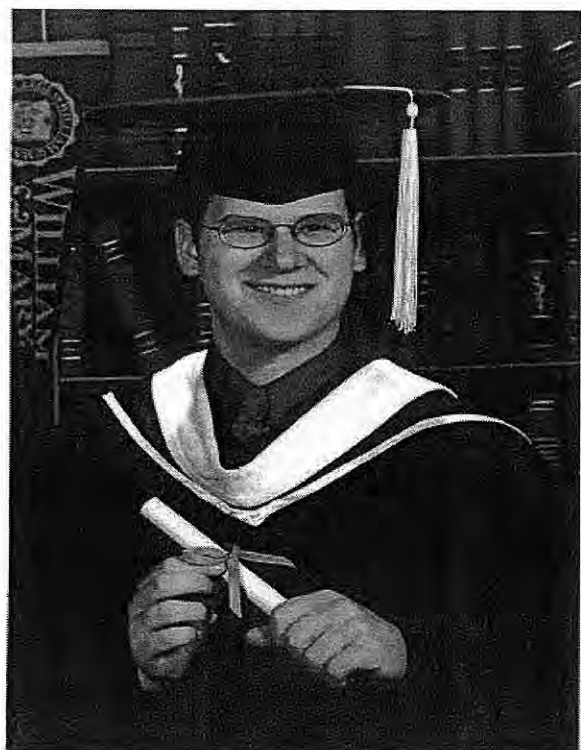
Mayflower picks up where 1491 leaves off. This book by Philbrick examines the early days of the colony, and particularly, the era of the Pilgrim grandchildren whose views of their Native American neighbors were different from the original settlers.

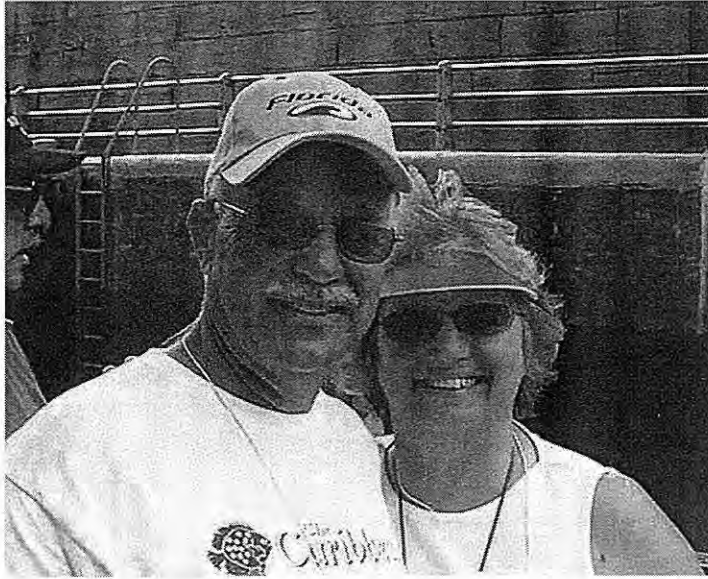

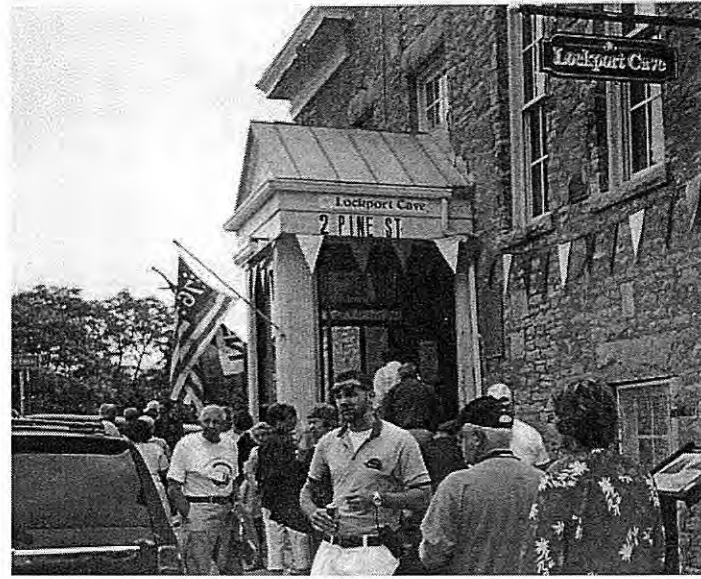
