THE DESCENDANTS OF BENJAMIN SMITH, SR. OF DUXBURY, MASSACHUSETTS WHO MIGRATED TO CHARLESTON, SOUTH CAROLINA

The original version of this article appeared in the *Mayflower Quarterly* Vol. 58, No. 2, May 1991 pages 112-115.. This was early in the genealogy study of the family by both Anne Soule Lapham Blevins and Ernest Everett Blevins. This version is revised by Ernest E. Blevins with information uncovered since the appearance of the first article some 15 years ago. This line demonstrates the arrival of two lines of Soule

Descendants to Charleston, South Carolina.

This is one of the Many of the ancestors of the Pilgrims that settled Plymouth Rock in 1620 later moved to another town called Duxbury. This town is located across the bay from the town of Plymouth. The town of Duxbury remained in the county of Plymouth. The earliest dates for the settlement come from the early Plymouth colony records. Under 02 April 1632, there is a list of settlers who will reside in Plymouth in the winter to have better access to the church. Bradford disliked the separation of the group for general reasons, but the move across the bay made it difficult for those settlers to come to Sunday Church (Stratton, 48). According to the not contemporary introduction Plymouth Church Records a church was established in Duxbury in 1632. The latest a church would be there is noted in a 21 March 1636 General Court Record

referring to a matter between the two churches of Plymouth and Duxbury (Stratton, 53).

Much genealogical information was complied before 1891 by Annie Grey SOULE while she worked as a librarian at Athenaeum Library of Boston, Massachusetts (*History of the Lapham Family*, 21), and more on yearly trips up to Massachusetts and Canada. Her names have been very accurate; however, the list of the sources is in a book that has been misplaced. She made a chart of names for her son, Samuel V with some dates and places, but most dates and places were left out because of the lack of room on her circular chart. A photocopy of the chart exists in the possession of family. A few dates and places, including information on the death of Annie Grey SOULE and Samuel LAPHAM V are written in by a different handwriting - certainly that of Samuel LAPHAM VI. Over the past few years we, mostly my mother, Anne Lapham Blevins, have re-researched Annie Grey Soule's lines with modern information to provide it credibility with documentation. All of the references to her chart in this article have been confirmed by us. The chart does not show and we do not know if any data every existed on the cousin lines, but we are currently researching these. Some of the later information comes from the memoirs of Samuel Lapham VI that contains both a family history and his life's history. He wrote it when he thought he may have to be in combat during World War II. One of Samuel LaPHAM's ancestors was Benjamin SMITH.

BENJAMIN SMITH, Jr./Sr.¹ was born on 25 May 1784 in Duxbury, son of Benjamin Smith and Sarah Peterson (Duxbury Vital Records, 157). Sarah Peterson is a sixth generation SOULE (*Mayflower Families 3*, number 787, page 313). On 18 October 1812 in Marshfield, Massachusetts he married Margaret/Peggy Tilden (born 23 August 1791 and died on 08 November 1851) (Massachusetts Death Certificate of Margaret Tilden Smith, chart, application papers for the Society of *Mayflower* Descendants of Samuel LAPHAM V). He is known to have been a sea captain (*Duxbury Vital Records*, 419). He died on 24 September 1848 (*Duxbury Vital Records*, 419).

Children of SMITH (Benjamin and Margaret/Peggy (TILDEN)), all born in Duxbury,

Massachusetts.

i. Margaret S.² b. 30 August 1813, died on the 24 October 1813.

(Duxbury Vital Records, birth 15, death 419).

ii. Benjamin Smith III/Jr. b. 04 March 1815, died on 27 July 1848 off of New Orleans, Louisiana with no descendants. According to *Duxbury Vital Records* (p. 419) he died by drowning, but according to his Massachusetts death record he died of a "fever". His father and grandfather were sea captains, and he was a mariner at the time of his death. Family tradition has said that he died in New Orleans because of the yellow fever epidemic. The Captain's chest that was to be his when he made captain went to his sister Sarah Peterson SMITH. The chest is said to have been used by both Benjamin SMITH Sr./Jr. married to Sarah Peterson and Benjamin SMITH Sr./Jr. married to Margaret TILDEN. The chest still exists today.

iii. Hamilton E. b. 02 February 1817, died after 1864. He does not appear in the 1855 Duxbury Census, but appears in the 1865 census as "single" and working as a "clerk".

Margaret T. b. 26 February 1819 (Duxbury Vital Records, 158), d. She married Nathaniel F. FROTHINGHAM of Charlestown, Massachusetts on 15 December 1836. She presumably moved to Charlestown, Massachusetts. Further research is planned on their lines.

Franklin T. b. 20 June 1821 (Duxbury Vital Records, 157), died

on 29 March 1834 (Duxbury Vital Records, 419).

Sarah Peterson b. 08 March 1823 (Duxbury Vital Records 158, chart, Lapham Family Bible and Registry), died on 15 December 1889. She married Samuel LAPHAM IV. on 21 May 1845.

Mary b. 16 February 1825 and died on 18 December 1833. VII.

(Duxbury Vital Records birth 158, death 419)

Twin #1, boy, b. 16 February 1827 d. age 12 hours 1827.(Duxbury Vital Records birth 158, death 419)

Twin #2, boy, b. 16 February 1827 d. age 5 weeks, 1827.(Duxbury ix.

Vital Records, birth 158, death 419)

William H. b. 08 February 1829. (Duxbury Vital Records, birth 158). There is no record of him in the Duxbury Census 1855 and 1865. The Massachusetts Archives reports no records of his death from 1851 to 1865.

George W. b. 07 December 1830 (Duxbury Vital Records, birth 157). There is no record of him in the Duxbury Census 1855 and 1865. The Massachusetts Archives reports no records of his death from 1851 to 1865.

Helen Louisa b. 21 November 1832 (Duxbury Vital Records, birth 158). She married Ebenezer Thayer FOGG, Jr. on 05 October 1859 (Vital Records of Scituate b. 153, Massachusetts marriage record). He was born 31 October 1826 to Ebenezer FOGG, Sr. and Betsey

Morris T. b. 12 June 1836 (Duxbury Vital Records birth, 158). There is no record of him in the Duxbury Census 1855 and 1865. The Massachusetts

Archives reports no records of his death from 1851 to 1865.

Second Generation

SARAH PETERSON SMITH² (Benjamin Smith¹, Margaret/Peggy Tilden¹) was born on 08 March 1823 in Duxbury, Massachusetts. She married Samuel Lapham IV on 21 May 1845 at Duxbury, Massachusetts (chart; Lapham Family Registry; Laphams In America 418,430; Family Bible,

Membership papers of Samuel LAPHAM V).

Samuel LAPHAM IV was a naval architect and ship builder (Laphams In America, 418, 430; Family Bible). He was the partial owner of some of the ships that he built although records do not survive to show which ones. His clipper ship "Don Quixote" was second only to the record holder "Flying Cloud" for the fastest sailing time around the Cape Horn, the southern point of South America. Family traditions says he encouraged his sons to move into other fields because he was well aware that the day of the sailing ships was over by the 1860's. He died in Medford, Massachusetts on 24 May 1886, and his wife died in Charleston, South Carolina on 15 December 1889 while visiting her son, Samuel V. Her body was shipped north and she was buried in the family cemetery in Medford, Massachusetts (Lapham Bible, Massachusetts death certificate).

Children of LAPHAM (Sarah Peterson (SMITH) and Samuel IV)), all born in Medford,

Massachusetts.

George Bryant³, b. 1846 died 04 March 1849 (Laphams In America, 423). 1.

ii. Samuel V, b. 05 April 1850. (Chart, Lapham Family Bible) d. 25 December 1929 (South

Carolina death certificate). He married Annie Grey SOULE (Chart, Lapham Family Bible).

> iii. Luther, b. 03 June 1853, d. May 1917. No descendants. (Lapham

Family Bible, Laphams in America, 423.). Married to Harriet EELLS in Hanover, MA in 1901.(added notes by Samuel Lapham VI in back of Laphams In America). The Family Bible does not mention his death, "but a family registered has a note by [Samuel Lapaham VI] that Luther 'died in May 1917 in Hanover, Mass., without issue. No day is noted"

HELEN LOUSIA SMITH² (Benjamin Smith¹ and Margaret/Peggy Tilden¹) was born on 21 November 1832 in Duxbury, Massachusetts (Duxbury Vital Records, birth 158). She married Ebenezer Thayer FOGG, Jr. (son of Ebenezer T. FOGG, Sr. and Betsey _____) on 05 October 1859 in Boston (Vital Records of Scituate, birth, 153; Marriage record). He is listed as a trader on his marriage and son's birth certificates. In the Duxbury Census of 1855 she (spelled "Hellen" in the Census) is living in the household of Freeman SOULE and his wife, Nancy. This is almost certainly Helen Louisa as her nephew, Samuel LAPHAM V, later married Annie Grey SOULE, the youngest daughter of Freeman Soule. Freeman SOULE (1807-1866) and his father, Nathaniel SOULE (1767-1862), were sea captains as were the father and grandfather of Helen (History of Duxbury, 313; Nathanial Soule Mayflower Families III, number 425, page 190; Massachusetts death record, Duxbury Vital Records birth, 158). There seem to be many connections among the seafaring families of the region. Her Mayflower Ancestor Index is 12613, page 226.

Children of FOGG (Helen Louisa (SMITH) and Ebenezer Thayer), The last two were born in South

Scituate, Massachusetts. There may be other children.

Helen Hambleton³, b.____. No birth record in Massachusetts Archives. (Mayflower Ancestral Index number: 12612, page 226). She was married to Walter Robbins TORREY (Mayflower Ancestral Index, 226)

ii. Nellie H. b. 09 September 1863. Possibly a duplicate record of the Helen Hambleton listed above.

(Massachusetts birth record).

5 iii. Horace Tower, b. 29 October 1869 (Massachusetts Birth record; *Mayflower Ancestral Index*: 12614, page 226).

Third Generation

SAMUEL LAPHAM V³ (Sarah Peterson Smith², Samuel Lapham IV²) was born on 05 April 1850 in Medford, Massachusetts. He was married to Annie Grey SOULE (b. 31 December 1856 in Duxbury, Massachusetts, d. 04 November 1935 in Charleston, South Carolina) on 10 March 1891 (Chart, Lapham Family Bible, for both; South Carolina death certificate of Samuel Lapham, Massachusetts birth record and South Carolina death certificate of Annie Grey Soule). Before the War Between the States there were many connections between the ports of Charleston and Boston. One involved the shipping of natural ice by sailing ship from New England to Charleston. Samuel Lapham moved to Charleston to represent Alva Gage Ice Company of Boston in 1871, at the age of twenty-one. He became involved in the development of mechanically produced artificial ice. He eventually became active in both local and regional centers of the ice industry. He held positions on the local company board as treasurer and on the Board of Directors of several companies based in Savannah, Georgia; Mobile, Alabama; and New Orleans, Louisiana. He was also an official of the Southern Ice Exchange. It is said that Samuel Lapham was accepted into Charleston's postwar society because he was a gentleman and conducted himself accordingly in the difficult conditions of the time and place. He presided over the United Confederate Veterans convention in Charleston in 1899. He was on the City Council and was mayor pro-tem of the City of Charleston a number of times. He was chairman of the Ways and Means Committee for his entire three terms. He secured a adequate water supply for the City of Charleston and established a commission to run the operation. He was a publisher of the short-lived The Weekly Sentinel -- Official Organ South Carolina Federation of Trade and Labor Unions. Samuel Lapham V was the chairman of the Official Banquet Committees and in charge of the welcoming banquets for President Roosevelt in 1902 and President Taft in 1909. He was a director in 1901 to 1902 for the South Carolinian and West Indian Exposition. For 33 years he headed the City Board of Park Commissioners. A tablet bearing his name is on the bridge over the sunken garden in Hampton Park, Charleston, South Carolina. He revived the B.P.O. Elks Lodge in Charleston, which set up a scholarship at the College of Charleston called the Samuel Lapham Scholarship. (Charleston City records; History of the Lapham Family, 16-21; his grave stone). In 1891 he returned to Massachusetts and on 10 March 1891 married Annie Grey SOULE (born 31 December 1856, died 04 November 1935) in King's Chapel, Boston (Membership papers of Samuel LAPHAM V).

They both returned to Charleston to live. She is of *Mayflower* decent: sixth in direct line of George SOULE (membership papers of Ernest Everett Blevins and Anne Soule Lapham Blevins) and through her mother, Nancy FREEMAN, eighth in decent from Governor BRADFORD (Membership papers of Annie Grey Soule Lapham). Samuel Lapham V and Annie Grey Soule Lapham are buried in Magnolia Cemetery in Charleston, South Carolina. Their gravestone reads:

5 HORACE TOWER FOGG³ (*Helen Louisa Smith*², *Ebenezer Thayer Fogg, Jr.*²) was born on 29 October 1869. He married Sabra Isabella Faulkner sometime around the turn of the century. There is no marriage record prior to 1896 in the Massachusetts Archives, although his wife is listed in the *Mayflower Ancestral Index* number 12614, page 226).

Child of FOGG (Horace Tower and Sabra Isabella (FAULKNER)), probably born in South Scituate,

Massachusetts. There may be other children.

i. Helen Louise⁴, b. (Mayflower Ancestral Index number 12613, page 226). This is "Cousin Helen" who visited Charleston with the "Gifford Sisters" in the 1930's (as remembered by Anne Blevins)

Fourth Generation

SAMUEL LAPHAM VI⁴ (Samuel, Annie Grey Soule⁵) was born on 23 September 1892 in Charleston, South Carolina. He was married to Lydia LaRoche THOMAS (born 22 February 1904, died 19 December 1989 in Greer, Greenville, South Carolina) of Florence, Florence, South Carolina on 08 July 1926. He graduated from the College of Charleston in 1913 and received his degree in architecture from Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He was an architect with Albert Simons (pronounced Simmons) at the firm Simons and Lapham. The firm was renowned for its preservation, reconstruction, and remolding of historic houses and buildings in the South Carolina Lowcountry. He also designed many public buildings and private homes as well as several buildings at Parris Island Marine Base, South Carolina. One of his buildings was on 40 East Bay Street in Charleston in 1925. During the preparation of the lot the site of the Granville Bastion of

1704 was discovered. The firm decided to uncover the remains for measurement and observation. They were carefully reburied under the Omar Temple for any future study. He also wrote about this excavation as well as other topics. (South Carolina History and Genealogical Magazine 221-227, Excavations on the Site of the Granville Bastion (1704), Blevins 5). He also wrote a chapter in Architectural Practice in South Carolina, and with his partner, Albert Simons, wrote The Early Architecture of Charleston (Blevins 22). Early in his career he taught architectural and engineering drawing part-time at his alma mater, the College of Charleston. He served in France in World War I as a Lieutenant, was a US Army Reserve Officer and was called to active duty during World War II. He returned with the rank of colonel and resumed his architectural practice at the end of World War II (History of the Lapham Family). He died on 02 October 1972, Charleston, Charleston, South Carolina. They are both buried in Magnolia Cemetery, Charleston, Charleston, South Carolina.

ANNE SOULE LAPHAM⁵ (Samuel⁴ and Lydia LaRoche Thomas) was born on 30 April 1929 in Charleston, Charleston, South Carolina and died 19 October 2002 in Spartanburg, Spartanburg, South Carolina, the family retains her cremains. She grew up in Charleston and went to school at Ashley Hall girls' school in Charleston. She later went to the University of Rochester in Rochester, New York for a degree in Physics. She then went for her masters at Duke University in Durham, North Carolina where she met Maurice Everett BLEVINS (b. 30 March 1928, Franklinville, Franklin, New Jersey). They were married on 19 July 1952 at St. Michael's Episcopal Church in Charleston, South Carolina (South Carolina Marriage License). After she received her degree in Physics and her husband received his Ph.D. in Physics they settled in Spartanburg, South Carolina. She taught at Converse College in Spartanburg, South Carolina for several years before retiring in 1968 to have her son, Ernest Everett Blevins. Maurice taught at Wofford College and Spartanburg Technical College in Spartanburg, and later worked in industry in research and development at Steel Heddle Manufacturing Company in Greenville, South Carolina and robot programming for Cincinnati

Milacron in Greenwood, South Carolina..

Child of BLEVINS (Anne Soule (LAPHAM) and Maurice Everett), born in Spartanburg, South Carolina.

i. Ernest Everett⁶, b. 16 November 1968 married Lisa Ann Schlosser (b. 30 December 1975, Flint, Genesee, Michigan). They have Savannah Gayle BLEVINS (b. 29 June 2001), Avery Everett BLEVINS (stillborn 12 February 2004), Ana Grace BLEVINS (b. 21 December 2004), and Cameren Everett BLEVINS (b. 8 May 2006).

If one single thing could be said about Irv Eisdorfer, it is that he took life straight on and most of the time came out ahead. His mind was still clear, but his body failed on February 4, 2007 at Robert Wood University Hospital, New Brunswick, NJ. If it had to happen, that is how he preferred it. One of his oft said sayings was "Cowards die a thousand deaths: the brave die once." He was 87.

Irv was born on April 21, 1919 in Corona, Queens, NY to Morris and Dora Eisdorfer and was their second of four children. His father came to this country alone as a fifteen year old from a village, then in the Austro-Hungarian Empire, now part of the Ukraine. As with many immigrants here, Morris never returned to his homeland. Irv visited the village in 1997 on a trip that also included Hungary and Romania.

He grew up in Far Rockaway, Queens, NY and attended local schools. Irv graduated from the City College of NY in 1939 and was the first in his family to attend college. His parents were sure that his intention was to become a rabbi, but they had to settle for a chemist. He went on to complete a masters degree from DePaul University in Chicago and later did additional graduate work in pharmaceutical chemistry at Temple University in Philadelphia.

Hired fresh out of college, by Picatinny Arsenal in NJ, he worked in an explosives analysis lab. After the start of WW II, his entire lab was drafted, inducted into the US Army, completed basic training and then returned to Picatinny as a unit. Irv spent the war taking apart and analyzing captured German munitions. He was honorably discharged in 1946 with the rank of staff sergeant. While at Picatinny, he met his predeceased former wife Paula Parzen. Irv and Paula moved to Chicago after the war where he took a job with Swift and Company; son Stephen and daughter Elise were born during those years.

Irv moved on to Smith, Kline and French in Philadelphia from which, after almost twenty years, he took early retirement as Associate Director of Research and Development. During that time he played a significant role in developing drugs such as Thorizine which are still considered to represent a major advance in the treatment of the mentally ill. In spite of not being "the magic bullet" for psychosis, this class of medications nevertheless changed the way people think about mental illness and significantly altered the structure of mental health care delivery services in this country. A very special highlight for him was being selected as a Gordon Research Fellow. Irv was never one to sit still for very long; he soon was back to work at Hoechst-Roussel Pharmaceuticals in NJ as Director of Quality Assurance and remained at Hoechst until 1988 when he retired at age 69. Even after retirement from Hoechst, Irv continued to work as a consultant. He truly enjoyed his chosen profession and was an emeritus member of the American Chemical Society.

In his mid-fifties he discovered bicycling and it was

the start of a decades long love affair. Irv soon joined the Central Jersey Bicycle Club; he participated in and led many rides, served on and chaired committees and later became club president and long-time board member. His enthusiasm and dedication earned him a Spirit of Cycling Award from the club and recognition at a National League of American Wheelman Rally in Salisbury, MD. To mark the transition from full career life to "retirement", Irv participated in a ride celebrating Australia's Bicentennial in 1988. He and wife Susan Fogg Eisdorfer joined a group of 500 Americans that flew to the great land down-under to join the party. The two week ride began in Melbourne and ended in Sydney. Irv did not feel too bad about not completing one 17k stretch of sanded out road, since even the Australian Army cycling team opted out. Irv's last big bike trip was when he was 80. He took son Ethan, plus three of Ethan's friends, on a week long ride in Germany along the Rhine from Speyer to Cologne. After finally giving up his beloved sport, Irv turned his energy toward volunteer work with the American Cancer Society.

He was an active member of Congregation Knesseth Israel in Bound Brook, NJ, serving on the Board for many years. He is buried in Washington Cemetery, Deans, NJ with predeceased grandson, Matthew Gonzales.

Irv is survived by his second wife, Susan, and biological children Stephen Martin, Ethan Aaron and Elise Eisdorfer Gonzales. Additionally, he legally adopted Ian O. who was born to Susan's first marriage. Ian and Ethan are both George Soule descendants (2 lines) through Susan. Grandchildren are Chloe Kimian and Calla Ray, daughters of Ian and Kimberley (Hess) Eisdorfer of Chattanooga, TN, Hope and Benjamin whose parents are Stephen and Judith (Petsonk) Eisdorfer of Highland Park, NJ, plus Gabrielle and Joshua Gonzales, daughter and son of Gary and Elise (Eisdorfer) Gonzales of Highland Park. He is predeceased by his brothers David and Norman. A sister, Frances Eisdorfer Black (Ralph), of Encino, CA remains, and nieces/nephews from all siblings.





Annual Report 2006/2007

I. Projects presently in process

A. Upgrade and corrections/additions to the Soule Kindred indices, (SKDXa, SKDXn, and SSDX) /2005.

This project has been "well started." Several known, additions and corrections have been accumulated along with those additions which have accrued from a recent Soule Genealogy by Mrs. Joyce Cathey Soles (Mrs. Donald E. Soles) of Chesapeake, Virginia. This genealogy will contribute an estimated 400-500 new entries each to the Soule Kindred Indices and the SSDX.

B. Soule Kindred Census Records--CD Project. (SKCenProj.__)

This project is mostly in the planning stages at this time. Quite a number of Census Record CD's have been accumulated for extraction to a separate set of files which will be sorted by census year, alphabetically by last names, then first name; then by county, state and town or township.

Several years ago, two separate individuals-- Members of Soule Kindred made starting efforts to this project. Immensity of the project and scope of new (Internet) data (with its consequent availability of data), have changed the scope of the project to the extent that it probably should be considered a new project. Old project plans and data tables should still be useable, however.

C. Soule Kindred Vital Records on CD Project (SK VR Proj.)

This project is also mostly in the planning stages. Several Vital Records CD's have been accumulated for the start. These will be extracted for Soule* family vital records (births, marriages and deaths) wherever possible and sorted into Soule family entries by State County and local area, files. The idea behind this project is to tabulate these families into concentrated geographical areas with chronological listings to show when a family lived, where they lived and possibly how they may have migrated from east to west.

NOTE: Lack of this type information has been one of the ongoing "Weaknesses" of such genealogical reference material in the past. For the most part, we know who they were, and who were their parents but we have little to go on as to where they lived or moved on to, or when?

D. Soule Kindred/Ridlon Soule Genealogy Project. (SRIDXa and SKRIDXx.____ files.)

These files are "well started." SKRIDXa is a recapitulation of the original index to G.T. Ridlon's Sole, Soule, Sowl, etc. Family genealogy published in 1926 at Lewiston, ME and in limited quantities. This index committed to CD computer media files will be a quicker access to the data in Ridlon's Two Volume book, and will be linked by computer files to the text of the books. (These two volumes have been previously computerized and are available on CD, from separate suppliers, at competitive prices with hard copy reprints of the books.)


Ridlon's first editions did not list persons of the Soule Families per se. Therefore, the second group of these files (SKRIDXx.___) will correct those omissions. It indexes all the Soule family names in a separate file but will be incorporated into a CD along with the original index.

E. Cross Reference Indices from SKDX and SSDX Files To those of The General Society of Mayflower Descendants (SKMAI-DX)


These files are well started. There were Three (3) published indices by the General Society of Mayflower Descendants which apply to this index. Merging of the (total of 5) indices will enable Soule Kindred (and other) persons to more easily find Mayflower families to which they are related, in order to complete their Mayflower Membership Applications should they be interested in doing so.

F. During the past two years, our Historians Office has engaged researchers for the purpose of having them visit remote libraries, courthouses, cemeteries and other facilities in order to do pure genealogical research pertaining to families which we have long known about, but for which we have had little previous information. I cite a trip to Eaton County, Michigan, the Eaton County Courthouse at Charlotte, MI and the Michigan State Library at Lansing, By Ms. Sue Thompson with assistance by Mrs. Janet A. Carper, Soule Kindred Member. These projects bring the genealogical expertise and their services to the benefit of Soule Kindred in areas

Do they do anything at all? I must proclaim that the number of emails and research (sub-projects that we have been involved with keeps us both hopping and well engaged.

II. Projects planned for the future

At an annual business meeting several years ago, Soule Kindred in America, had discussion pertaining to what then was entitled "Electronification" of our Soule Kindred Archives. At that time the electronic filing of paper files of data was not yet conceived let alone starting of its infancy. Our long range goal has been to transfer and tabulate such files from existing books, CDs, county,town and state histories biographical sketches, anything and everything concerning the, lineages of and history of George Soule-Mayflower Passenger. Acquisition of such data is surely an easy matter, in fact our archives hold much of it right here in St. Francisville, and in Lynde Randall's personal library at Yarmouth, ME.

At present, hopes and goals for these projects are:

- A. Downloading the Soule entries from the periodical: New England Historic and Genealogical Register
- B Downloading the Soule entries from all volumes of the periodical New York Genealogical and Biographical Record.
- C. The periodical National Genealogy Society Quarterly.
- D. Numerous volumes on CD of genealogy software which has books already copied into computer media.

NOTE: In light of the vastness of these projects, funding for computer supplies, paper, postage and also wages for computer entry personnel will of necessity be required. As a matter of administrative interest, I would like for the hierarchy of Soule Kindred to consider requesting funds (possibly from our benefactor Mr. Luther Soule or some other willing benefactor) to make these projects become a quicker reality. My budget request for 2007/8 will reflect those requests.

Dear Susan,

Congratulations on the Newsletters. It's great to see something interesting in print. I thought that you might be interested in the inclosed photographs of the Soule Memorial Fountain in Plainwell, Michigan as of today, almost a 100 years after the photograph on the postcard published on the rear cover of volume XXXX, No. 1 of the Soule Kindred Newsletter. The structure sits at the apex of a small town greenspace called Hicks Park and is adjacent to the main intersection in town. I tried to capture the same shot as was in the postcard. However, in spite of the fact that the building seen behind the fountain in the postcard is still there, I couldn't line things up as they were back then. I have a feeling that the structure was moved 20 or 30 feet south (to the right in the postcard) at some point in time to accommodate the building of streets. The building seen at the right in the postcard is now gone, replaced by the Masonic Temple building in 1916. The postcard must be a bit newer than 1905 – I'd guess 1907 or 1908 – as the fountain was not erected until 1907. Finally, the "fountain" has no fountain within it – at least not in December. There is a small "manhole cover" in the floor that may allow a fountain to be erected seasonally, but that seems a bit strange to me. If the fountain has been removed it isn't for lack of water. Plainwell is on an island in the Kalamazoo River and there is a fire hydrant immediately adjacent to the structure.

Soule captured vanishing way of life

The photograph was taken within one hour of the killing. It pictures a scalping victim in 1868 lying on the prairie near Fort Dodge, Kan. More than just a shot of corpse, the early photograph brings the viewer face-to-face with the hostility between the U.S. Seyenth Cavalry and the Cheyenne and Aranaha.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 20, 2005

Harper's Weekly made an engraving of this photograph and circulated it around the country in its Jan. Io, 1869 edition. It was the first published work by photographer William S. Soule and a radical expression of reality for its time.

In 1867, Soule was a wounded Civil War veteran looking for a fresh start. He headed west and landed in Fort Dodge, where he clerked in the post store. With him, Soule brought equipment for landscape and portrait photography.

Photography was his hobby and it would be through this newfangled medium that he claimed his fresh start. It was also the same era when American Indian culture by the white man's invasion of the West. Photography came along and made it possible to record with unbelievable accuracy what was being lost.

The camera could capture reality quickly and accurately and it wasn't just the occasional landscape that photographers such as Soule wanted. It was Indian portraits. A bird's-eye-

view of the people and their vanishing way of life. A number of historians se

A number of historians say most of Soule's Indian portraits were shot at or near Port Sill, Okla. Sill was a military headquarters and an agency for several tribes, including the Comanche, Klowa and Wichita. Some of the tribes were intrigued with the idea of recording their images. The old adage of the camera capturing their soul had little basis in reality for them.

In some cases, it took time for Indians to realize how disrup-

tive the camera could be. At the turn-of-the-century, hoards of photographers flocked to Hopi ceremonial dances. By 1915, tripods and cameras were banned.

Artifacts from the years immediately following the Civil War are particularly interesting to collectors. They're interesting not only for their age and artistic qualities but also because they lay bare one of the bloodiest eras in American history. The virtual extermination of a culture.

That's one of the reasons why an album of Soule's portraits draws so much interest at auction. His photographs of the Plains Indians and their surroundings from around 1867-1874 are riveting. One particular album of 41 photographs was originally given by Soule to his sister, Salucia Abbott Soule, and descended through the family. It was housed at their homestead in Chelsea, Mass.

The album and sleeves were in poor condition but the photos, with the exception of some minor staining, were in excellent shape. Included among them were famous Indians Big Bow, Satanta, Kicking Bird and

Little Raven. Expected to sell for \$15,000-20,000 in the American Indian & Ethnographic Art auction at Skinner's in Boston, Mass., the album brought \$70,500 on Sept. 10. Here what some other vintage photographs in the auction sold for:

More About William S. Soule (1836-1908)

William Stinson Soule was born in Maine and, prior to the Civil War, worked with his brother John P. Soule at the Soule Photographic Company in Boston. He served the Union cause during the war and was wounded. Afterwards, while still healing, he worked as a photographer in Chambersburg, PA and then at age 29 went west.

"Will" Soule first gained prominence with an image he took of a hunter killed and scalped by Indians near Fort Dodge , Kansa and the two US Army men who found him. This image was sent east, purchased by, engraved and published in Harper's. More photographs followed; he eventually became very well known for his images of American Plains Indians. Soule was on location to document Native American tribes before they became subjugated by the Army and unending hordes of settlers seeking cheap land. Thus, he provides a unique look at a pivotal slice of our nation's history. He documented events and people in a way first made possible by the wet-plate photography technology used during the Civil War.

Following these very productive years, Soule returned to Boston where he again worked with his brother John.





She has traveled to participate in an Earth Watch whale expedition and performed for 3 weeks in Europe in Dance.







Bishop BISHOP Robert M. Bishop, 85, NYSE executive Robert M. Bishop, 85, died on Thursday, May 10, 2007, at Overlook Hospital in Summit. A Mass of Christian Burial will take place on Saturday, May 12, at 10 a.m. in Immaculate Heart of Mary R.C. - All Chesitieds A Complete Shopping Section Church, Scotch Plains. Interment will follow at Fairview Cemetery, Westfield. Visiting will be this evening from 7 to 9 p.m. in the Gray Funeral Home, 318 East Broad St., Westfield. Born and raised in Elmira, N.Y., Mr. Bishop lived in Connecticut before moving to Fanwood several years ago. Bob was editor of the school newspaper at the Elmira Free Academy, Scout reporter for the Elmira Star-Gazette at the 1937 Jamboree in Washington and a cub reporter for the StarGazette during his summer vacations. While at Union College in New York, he was the campus stringer for the Schenectady Union-Star, Albany Times-Union and the New York Times. He also worked in the colleges public relations office. After graduating from college with the accelerated Class of 1943W, he received the colleges Daggett Prize as the senior of the best character and conduct. After attempting to join the Navy for pilot training and being rejected, he joined the Army Air Force light plane training program at an airport in Schenectady. He was then sent to college training detachment in Nashville, Tenn. It was there at a USO dance that he met his future wife, Anne S. Rowan. They were married on Oct. 30, 1943. Bob became a twin-engine instructor pilot. He was one of the initial cadre of advanced instrument flying instructors who taught pilots to use the full panel instrument systems. He then joined the training pipeline to fly the Douglas B-26 Invader in the Pacific but the war ended before he Returning to Union College, he became assistant director of public relations. In 1948, he was named Trinity Colleges director of public relations. He established the summer carillon concerts that were opened to the public on the college quadrangle. In 1955, Mr. Bishop joined the staff of the New York Stock Exchange as an assistant to the president, who happened to be the former president of Trinity College. He advanced to senior management at the NYSE in the areas of member firms regulation and surveillance. Early initiatives were to formalize the qualification of registered representatives through exams and to establish procedures to discipline those who violated Exchange rules. As the NYSEs chief of regulation, Mr. Bishop enforced capital requirements and other measures to assure the integrity of the securities markets. He frequently testified before the Securities and Exchange Commission on the self-regulation of the securities markets. When Mr. Bishop retired in 1986, he was senior vice president and chief regulatory officer of the Exchange. In his history of the stock market in the 1960s and 1970s. Alec Benn said Bobs efforts to preserve the NYSE have never been fully appreciated. In retirement, Mr. Bishop joined the International Executive Service Corps. Accompanied by his wife, Anne, he went on missions to advise stock exchanges throughout the world. His Model Rules for a Stock Exchange were widely adopted.
