Researchers have been looking for the birthplace and parentage of George Soule for at least one hundred years. A number of possibilities have been uncovered over the years, but none was particularly convincing. Past issues of this publication have contained articles on new information as it was discovered. We continue this vital work with the following article that was originally published in the June, 2008 issue of *The Mayflower Quarterly*. It explores new possibilities discovered in Holland and presents the fascinating possibility that George Soule began his voyage in Delftshaven, rather than the commonly held belief that he joined the group just before it left England. Previously thought to be a "stranger," it now appears he may have been one of the "saints."

Pilgrim George Soule: Update on his possible ancestry

In the group decision to determine the members of the congregation who were to leave first for the wilds of North America, it was recorded by Edward Winslow in 1646 that "it was best for one part of the Church to goe first, and the others to stay, viz., the youngest and strongest part to goe."^[1] In 1620 Edward Winslow was 24 years old, and George Soule, who accompanied him in 1620 as a servant, was certainly younger than Edward, and probably aged 18 years.^[2] There is nothing to indicate that George Soule was not in Leiden before the *Speedwell* left Delfshaven in 1620 for Southampton, England.

Y-DNA testing has yielded a very distant connection (16/25 match), if any, for George Soule (back some 4,500 years) with William Throope, who is known to have come ca 1664 from Nottinghamshire in England.

George Soule came on the *Mayflower* as servant to Edward Winslow, who was closely associated with William Brewster in Leiden. It would not be surprising that William Brewster could have suggested George Soule to Edward Winslow as one of the "youngest and strongest" who were ready to venture across the Atlantic Ocean in 1620. William Brewster had removed to Leiden by May 1609 and in 1611, as "Willem Bruysteer" was a witness to the marriage there on 27 Dec 1611 between "Willem Boekrum" (William Buckram) of Ipswich, Suffolk, widower of "Judick Boeckrums" (Judith Buckram), block-maker to "Lijsbeth Neel" (Elizabeth Neal) of "Scroebe" (Scrooby).^[3]

Nottinghamshire is where William Brewster came from: his first child was b. 1593 in Scrooby, Nottinghamshire. Initial Y-DNA testing of Brewster descendants indicates a very distant connection (14/25 match), if any, to George Soule (some 5,500 years back) and a more recent connection (21/25 match) to William Throope (some 2,000 years back). No birth or marriage records have been found for William Brewster or for his wife Mary, although it would appear such records, if extant, should be found in Nottinghamshire. Records of Scrooby in the Nottinghamshire Archives, however, have been checked with no findings.^[4]

William Brewster is presumed to have been born ca. 1566/7 and his wife Mary is presumed to have been b. ca 1568/9.^[5] In Leiden their household would have included these children: Jonathan (b. 1593), Patience (b. ca. 1600), Fear (b. ca. 1606), child (bur. Leyden 1609), Love (b. 1611), and Wrestling (b. 1614).^[6]

It would appear that William Brewster's household in Leiden would have also included his printing associates: first, John Reynold(s), who had completed his 8-year apprenticeship in England, moved to Leiden, where he married in 1617 and apparently moved out of William Brewster's household shortly. His space in the Brewster household was probably taken by Edward Winslow, who married in 1618, so probably also moved out before 1620. If George Soule

had been taken into the Brewster household about 1619, then George Soule, being apparently a lusty young man, would have been a prime candidate from the “youngest and strongest” for sailing on the first voyage of the *Mayflower*.

Thus, while it is always possible that George Soule was related to Mary (---) Brewster, or Elizabeth Neal, both apparently from Nottinghamshire, more weight should be given to the relative Y-DNA distance of the George Soule Y-DNA from both Brewster and Throop Y-DNA. Y-DNA distance often translates into geographical distance over time. Thus it is possible that George Soule was connected to an English or Huguenot (Walloon) family in Leiden and Canterbury and continued this association in Plymouth.

This conclusion is supported by the grouping of the *Mayflower* families in the 1623 land division: George Soule is included in the group on the south side “of the brooke to the baywards” which consisted of persons mostly from southeastern England (ranked by age), and, more importantly, still associated with William Brewster: William Brewster, Robert Cushman, Samuel Fuller, John Billington, Isaac Allerton, William Bradford, Peter Brown, Richard Gardener, Joseph Rogers, George Soule.^[7]

In Leiden is the record of Susanna “Sule” of Canterbury in England,^[8] who was betrothed on 31 May 1629 to Hugo del Porte of Tourcongie.^[9] ^[10] The relationship of the bride and groom to the others mentioned in this record is open to interpretation, including the appearance of Jan Solet (a French pronunciation of Soule or Sule), who is listed as “step-father” [future father-in-law?] of the groom, unless we take the interpretation that Jan Solet had married the widowed mother or step-mother of Hugo del Porte. Likewise, Jenne Fromenu, named as “mother” of Susanna Sule, may also be her future mother-in-law.^[11]

The only other similar surname entered in these records at Leiden pertains to the death by drowning of “Jacques Sulleyn” of Canterbury, about 25 years old, with permission to bury the body 16 Jan. 1617.^[12] It may well be that the age or surname, or both, of this “James Sulle” was misstated or copied in error.

The following nuclear family is proposed for George Soule:

John/Jean/Jan SOULE/SULE/SOLET b. ca 1575; d. Leiden after 5 Dec 1612 and possibly after 31 May 1629; m 1. ca. 1600; m 2. ca. 1612 Jenne? (Fromenu) del Porte?

While the first name Susanna is relatively common, George Soule’s daugh-

ter Susannah m. ca 1661 Francis Waste/West. George Soule's second son was named John Soule, who m1. ca 1656 Rebecca Simmons and m2. 1678 Esther (Delano?) Sampson. A distant connection to the Delano and Mahieu families, with their numerous Jennes (or Janes), may be indicated, as Phillipe Delano's family was from Tourcongie and environs.^[13]

And then there is the remote possibility that George Soule's wife, apparently Mary Bucket/Becket [Bouquet in French?], may have come from a Walloon family. A slightly similar surname, "Bussche" (Bushet/Bursher?), is found in the early Leiden marriage records and these persons are listed as coming from Canterbury, Sandwich, London, and probably Colchester.^[14] One Edward Burcher received land in the 1623 land division.^[15]

Furthermore, one George Sole, apparently of Woodchurch [near Canterbury in Kent], is noted as having sold land to John Sharpe of Westwell, the elder, in Sharpe's will proved 13 Sept 1593.^[16] No link has been found to date between George Sole of Woodchurch and George Soule of the *Mayflower* although the older George could turn out to be an uncle or grandfather, if records can be found.

He would always help people, never passing judgment on anyone. He had a great sense of humor and loved practical jokes. He enjoyed spending time with his family, reading, and all types of music.

Mr. Gregory was preceded in death by his parents and sister, Evelyn Barnes. He is survived by his sisters: Sonya Vondrak, Melba (Jim) Alford, Anna (Del) Bristol, Jeanine Gentry, all of Norwalk, Rita (Larry) Mercer, of Montpelier, Ohio, and brothers Huntz (Mary) Gregory, of Norwalk, and Gregg Gregory, of Sedona, Arizona, brother-in-law, Terry Barnes, of Lawrence, Michigan; and numerous nieces and nephews whom he dearly loved.

Autumn Pleasures

With this issue, our thoughts again return to the harvest bounty season. Once a year we share favorite recipes from our family tables in honor of the American Thanksgiving tradition our Pilgrim Ancestors began at Plymouth Colony in 1621.

Pumpkin Grits

Serves 8

This corn and pumpkin dish has ancient Native American roots. The modern version offered here is a favorite of University of Tennessee fans who call it "Go Big Orange Grits." Anyone who has enjoyed that American classic "spoonbread" will recognize a culinary cousin in this recipe. Here is an excellent alternative for those who want pumpkin on the table in a form other than pumpkin pie for a change. Of course, those who prefer to go with their New England side can opt for yellow corn grits (sold as polenta), rather than the white corn grits favored in the South. Use a 2 qt. greased cassarole.

- 4 cups chicken broth
- 1 cup QUICK grits, not Instant
- 2 beaten eggs
- 1 16oz. can of plain pumpkin purée
- 2 cloves fresh garlic, finely chopped
- ¼ cup finely chopped scallions
- 1½ cups of pre-packaged, shredded sharp Cheddar cheese
- ¼ teaspoon each of nutmeg and cayenne pepper
- salt and pepper as is your preference
- butter/margerine as needed
- ¼ cup hulled toasted pumpkin seeds

(sold raw and called pepitas).

Pre-heat oven to 325°-350° and butter your favorite baking dish. Toast seeds in a heavy bottomed sauce pan. Stir constantly; they will puff and pop as they toast. Remove from heat, cool and store in a zip-lock bag until time to use.

Fry garlic and scallions in a bit of butter or margerine until soft and lightly browned; put aside. Bring the chicken stock to a boil, then add grits slowly. Reduce heat and keep stirring until the mixture is thick - at least ten to fifteen minutes. Remove from heat and add pumpkin purée; mix together completely and allow some time to cool. Add a spoonful of mixture to the beaten eggs and combine thoroughly until smooth; stir eggs into grits and again combine well.

Finally, fold in the garlic/scallion sauté followed by the cayenne, nutmeg, salt and pepper. Pour into the prepared cassarole dish and bake approximately 50 minutes or until the contents are puffed and the top nicely browned. You can test by inserting a dinner knife into the center. If it comes out clean, the grits are done and ready for the table. Sprinkle the pumpkin seeds garnish just before serving.

"For Adults Only" Appetizer

Serves 4

This creation is known to many as an Oyster Shooter. If you have never

consumed frozen vodka before, here is your big chance. We have Jasper White to thank for this one. Your editor has no proof that he is a Soule descendant, but he is a darned good chef. The following ingredients will serve four people. Begin by putting four 2 oz.tall shot glasses and the vodka in the freezer.

- 4 medium bluepoint oysters
- 1 tablespoon cocktail sauce
- 1 teaspoon white horseradish sauce
- 12 dashes of hot sauce
- ½ cup good quality vodka, frozen
- 4 small celery sticks or 4 slender 3" inch sticks of fresh daikon radish

To freeze vodka: simply place something less than a completely full bottle in the freezer for at least four hours. Please note that it does not actually freeze due to the high alcohol content, but pours and appears to be thicker and looks cloudy.

To prepare, remove the glasses from the freezer and place one freshly shucked oyster in each one. Combine cocktail and horseradish sauces, then place 1/4 of the mixture in every glass, followed by 3 drops of hot sauce into each, as well. Insert celery or daikon sticks as preferred and pour 1/8 cup of vodka into each glass. Serve immediately.

Preserved Fish Deuel a descendant of George Soule of the *Mayflower*

George R. Nye

This article presents an outline of the descent from George Soule to Preserved Fish Deuel, the family of his son "Cornelius" and follows the branch of the latter's son William Henry Deuel's children through their western migration and immigration to the North West Territories in Canada.

Introduction

In *Mayflower Families In Progress - George Soule Gen 1-4 (2006) #26* the family name is spelled Davol. However, the earliest reference to this branch of the family appears in the October 1928 issue of the *New England Historical & Genealogical Register*.^[1] The obituary of Mrs. Helen B. (Grison) Galpin of Muskegon, Michigan provides an outline of the descent from William Davol, who was in Duxbury, Plymouth Colony in 1640; at Braintree, Massachusetts in 1643 and later at Newport, Rhode Island, and through a son Jonathan and a grandson Joseph Davol who married Mary³ Soule, granddaughter of George Soule. One of their sons was Benjamin Davol⁴ of Dartmouth, Massachusetts and Pawling, Dutchess Co., New York. According to Evelyn Eaton, it was during the family's stay in Dutchess County, about 1775, Benjamin Davol⁴ grew tired of having his name pronounced "devil" and declared henceforth it would be written as Deuel.^[2] Frank Doherty in his definitive work on the Beekman Patent describes in detail the settlers, including the Deuel family.^[3]

John⁵ Deuel married a Mrs. Anna Tripp and left a will dated 16 October 1806 and probated 28 November 1806 at Pawling^[4] in which he mentions among his sons, Cornelius⁶, who married Mary Fish, daughter of Preserved Fish, and they resided in Cambridge, Washington County, New York. Cornelius⁶ left a will^[5] naming among his children Preserved⁷ Fish Deuel (born about 1783, who married Mary Rice in Cambridge on 12 June 1806). They removed to Massena, New York, possibly because he "was accepted as a member of the White Creek, Saratoga, NY, Monthly Meeting with his sister Mary on 20 March 1794. On 12 June 1806 Preserved was "disowned" for his marrying outside the Quaker Society."^[6]

Genealogical Summary

2. WILLIAM CORNELIUS⁸ DEUEL was born [26 August] 1806/7 in Louisville Landing, St. Lawrence Co., N.Y., and died 26/27 August 1879 in Louisville, St. Lawrence Co., N.Y. He married SARAH HENRY 15 October 1829/30 in Louisville, St. Lawrence Co., NY.^[13] She was born [4 March 1810] in Vermont, and died 18 June 1903 in Iowa.^[14]

William Cornelius Deuel was known as Cornelius Deuel after his grandfather. It was very difficult to find records in Louisville; however, Cornelius⁶ is a known *Mayflower* descendant (*MFIP* Soule #602). The family of Cornelius Deuel is taken from private family papers compiled by Edgar H. Dewel Jr. b. 26 January 1917. "His grandfather Ira Gibson Deuel b. 30 September 1852 changed the spelling of his name at the insistence of a school teacher at the Academy who thought Dewel was more proper than Deuel. William "Cornelius" Deuel was a farmer and hotel operator in the Town of Louisville."^[15] His grave marker has not been discovered. Cornelius Deuel's name does not appear on the list of relocated graves, and only the known graves in Louisville Landing were relocated during the building of the St. Lawrence Seaway.

In the 1850 census and 1860 census the family are listed under Deuel. In the 1870 census of Louisville, St. Lawrence Co., N.Y. page 463B, Cornelius, Sarah and son Ira are listed under the spelling of Dewell. Marriage, birth and death records were not kept in New York State until after 1880.^[16]

The 1900 US census for Minnesota Lake, Faribault County, Minnesota, lists Sarah (Henry) Deuel as born March 1810 in Vermont. She moved west with her children to Minnesota and Iowa. Her place of death has been listed as Des Moines, Iowa. However the family papers of Edgar H. Dewel Jr. state that the place of death was at her son Ira's place in Goldfield, Iowa, in 1903.

3. WILLIAM HENRY⁹ DEUEL was born [4 April] 1841 in Louisville, St. Lawrence Co., NY, and died 21 July 1883 in Madison Township, Grant Co., S.D.[18] He married MARY ELIZA BARRETT 12 December 1875 in Vernon Township, Humboldt County, Iowa,[19] daughter of JOSEPH BARRETT and MEHITABLE NOYES. She was born [9 March] 1852/3 [Albany], NY and died 20 October 1927 in Ponoka, Alberta, Canada.[20]

Proof that William Henry Deuel, b.1841, was the son of Wm. "Cornelius" Deuel and Sarah Henry was difficult due to a lack of a birth registration. However, an entry in the Louisville Town Clerk records after the Civil War provided substantiation.[21] He married first Safrina Gleason as she appears in the US Census, 1870 Massena, N.Y, as the wife of William Deuel. They were married 11 October 1865. She died in April 1873, Louisville, St. Lawrence Co., N.Y.[22] (no known children). Wm. H. Deuel removed from N.Y. to Iowa. The line being traced derives from his second marriage to Mary Eliza Barrett on 12 December 1875 at Vernon Township, Humboldt County, Iowa. In the early Iowa Records only their twin children, born 27 January 1882 in Liberty Township, Wright County, Iowa, are registered.[23]

The military service of William Henry Deuel is recorded in the Record and Pension Office in D.C. Wm. H. Deuel held the rank of private and later corporal in Co. F, 106 Regt. NY, Vol. Inf. He enrolled 8 August 1862 and mustered out 22 June 1865. His Prisoner of War records show him as captured and paroled at Fairmount, Virginia, 29 April 1863 and sent to the Army of the Potomac 29 October 1863.[24]

His death is a matter of some confusion as some compilers of the Deuel genealogy state he died in the famous tornado of 21 July 1883; however, the newspaper account which appeared in the *Grant County Review* dated 26 July 1883 clearly states William "Deuil's" life was cut short not by the "storm king" but by a stroke of lightning that struck the home of John Everson in Madison Township, Grant County, South Dakota. The report further recorded "Wm. Deuil came from Wright County, Iowa, about a year ago and leaves a large family including a brother-in-law E. F. Hartwell."^[25] He is buried in Milbank (old) Cemetery, Milbank, Grant Co., S.D.

The Military pension records refer to Mary E. Barrett's previous marriage to a Mr. Darling. George 'Darland' married Mary Barrett on 12 February 1869 in Humboldt, Iowa. This marriage ended in a divorce at the November Term, 1875, District Court of Humboldt Co. The decree permitted Mary E. Barrett to use her maiden name. The children of this marriage were: Minnie Darling (22 November 1869-23 August 1962); in October 1880, Minor Darling (22 January 1872-12 August 1945) was adopted by his uncle Mr. Edwin Hartwell; Adelbert died young after 1880 and Florence (8 May 1874-2 May 1949).^[26]

The family of William H. Deuel and Mary (Barrett) Deuel appeared in the 1880 US census for Liberty, Wright County, Iowa. William 'Duell' was 32, his wife Mary 28. The children Minnie, Adelbert and Florence were listed as 'Duell' but were certainly Darling. This 1880 census error has led many Deuel family researchers to attribute the three Darling children to William Deuel's first wife Safrina Gleason. In this census, only Ira 'Duell' and baby 'Duell' were the children of Mary (Barrett) Deuel by her second husband William H. Deuel.

Almost a year after the accidental death of William Deuel in South Dakota, the widow Mary Deuel married William Sherid Hall of Adam, Grant Co., Dakota Territory on 17 June 1884.^[27] He was a veteran of the Civil War and is on the 1883 pensioners list from Grant County, Certificate #22,918, having received a gunshot wound to the left arm. He died 3 October 1898 at Ramona^[28] and is buried in Ashgrove Cemetery (Nadu Seventh Day Adventist) near Badus, Lake County, South Dakota. In the 1900 US census for Badus, Lake Co., S.D., his widow Mary E. Hall was found with sons RD (Roy), Simmie (Simeon) and daughter Sarry (Sarah) Deuel; daughter Hattie Hall, son William Hall and daughter Mary Hall. The only official birth registration recorded was for Mary Rachel Hall b. 29 March 1896, Lake Co., S.D.^[29]

In the late 1890s South Dakota land was worth about \$15 an acre. Most of the small farmers were in debt for more than half of what their land was worth. Trying to pay the interest on the debt meant that many were never able to get out of debt. The Northwest Territories (Alberta) were advertising free homesteads. Then land in S.D. jumped 5 to 8 dollars an acre. They had a chance to sell off their land and stock, get out of debt and have a fresh start in a new country.^[30]

The resourceful Mary and her three elder [Deuel] sons made four claims for land in the Ponoka area of the Northwest Territories (now Alberta), Canada. Mary and her sons were granted a quarter section each.^[31] The history of the area states that the family came from Ramona, South Dakota in 1900 and they filed on their homestead in October 1900. Mary had real pioneer spirit, enduring many hardships with courage and hope.^[32]

The family is recorded in the 1901 Canadian census, Northwest Territories, District 202, p. 20, lines 38-44.

Mrs. Mary E. (Barrett) Hall and her sons Ira and Simeon Deuel are buried in the Dakota Cemetery, not far southeast from the homestead and northeast of Crestomere, Ponoka Co., Alberta. Roy Deuel is buried in New Denver, B.C. Cemetery. Sara May (Deuel) Davis and her husband Matthew Davis are buried in Burke Cemetery, Gregory Co., South Dakota. All have grave markers.

1 cup rosé wine
1 cup of toasted sliced almonds
small container of sour cream

Pulse the blanched almonds and 1/2 of the sugar in a blender until paste consistency; add 1/2 cup water and blend again;. Set aside. Boil the remaining water with the remaining sugar, plus the cinnamon stock until all of the sugar is dissolved. Add the cranberries and the almond paste, taking care to crush some of the berries in the pan. Simmer gently for 20 minutes. Add the wine and simmer for another five minutes. Remove cinnamon stick and serve each portion with a dollop of sour cream sprinkled with toasted sliced almonds. This soup is also good served cold.

Succotash Salad
with Maple Vinaigrette

1 bag frozen succotash, cooked
1 can dark red kidney beans, drained and rinsed
1 box frozen wax beans, cooked
1 box frozen green beans
3/4 cup fresh chopped green onions
3 tablespoons hulled, toasted sunflower seeds (heat and stir in a pan until brown to your liking)

Vinaigrette:
1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
1/4 cup fresh lemon juice
2 tablespoons maple syrup
1 cup extra-virgin olive oil
1/2 teaspoon kosher salt
1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper

Assemble vegetables and sunflower seeds. Mix together the dressing ingredients and pour just enough to

gently cover vegetables to your liking; reserve remainder for another use. Marinate until ready to serve.

As readers can see, your editor is a traditionalist when it comes to ingredients, but not necessarily when it comes to specific dishes in a specific order. As long as all the traditional foods are there somewhere throughout the meal, that to me is what makes it a real Thanksgiving.

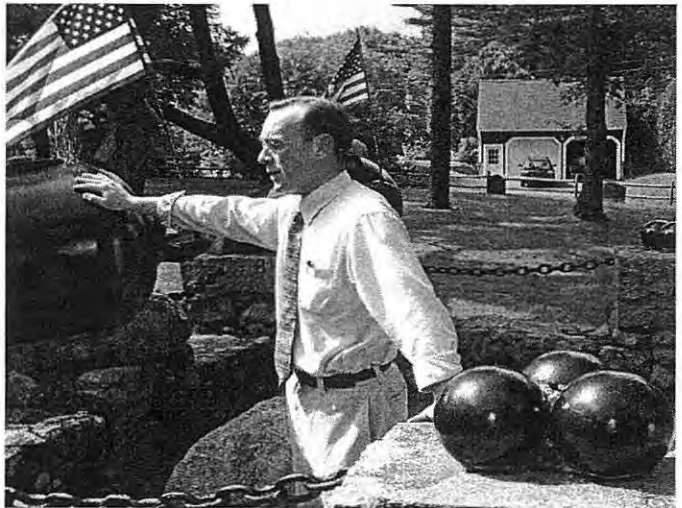

Friday, the twelfth, dawned bright and sunny, thus making it a perfect day for Plimoth Plantation. Kindred explored the sites on their own or in small groups, but gathered at lunch time in the Accomack building for the "Taste of Two Cultures" meal that paired both Colonial English and Native American dishes. Many of us did not know quite what to expect when served the Sobaheg, but found this soup-like concoction of turkey, kidney beans, string beans, pumpkin and sunflower seeds to be quite tasty. Many spent time at the Nye Barn where the Plantation raises now rare and endangered species of livestock that were important to our ancestor's way of life. Also, vegetables and crops of their day are grown and the seeds saved to further perpetuate each plant line. That evening our own Judy Hughes helped attendees to understand and use the SK indexes and CD database to research their own lineages.

The cool, gorgeous weather continued on Saturday for our day in Duxbury. Rev. Cullen gave us an official welcome to First Parish, followed by presentations by Joe Shea, who spoke about Duxbury cemeteries and a major project to record data from each of the burial sites, and by Polly Nash who discussed church architecture and history. Patrick Browne of the Duxbury Rural and Historical Society presented an excellent Power Point presentation on "King Caesar" who is otherwise known to history as Ezra Weston - a George Soule descendant. Weston and his sons built, managed and sailed one of the largest fleets of ships of their day with virtually all of the ships built on the Bluefish River in Duxbury. His graceful home has been restored and is now the property of the Historical Society. Patrick has recently published a book on this very interesting Soule line (Norm Standish is a descendant). Following our box lunch, we boarded a bus for a tour with Patrick as our guide. We are indeed very fortunate; Patrick gave an exceptionally fine explanation of each site visited, including George Soule's burial place, his original lands on Powder Point and what is left of the foundation of the original Myles Standish House. Duxbury is today a very attractive town with many fine old homes that have survived good times and bad. The full day went on into the evening; the Kindred sampled traditional New England fare with clam chowder and lobster.

Sunday brought us to the final reunion day with morning service at First Parish Plymouth. During a special part of the service known as "Joys and Sorrows," Susan Fogg Eisdorfer lit a candle to honor the connection that all Soule descendants have with this very special church. It is the original 1620 congregation of which our ancestor George Soule was a part almost 400 years ago. It still keeps our heritage here in the present and carries it into the future. §

Kentucky Pound Cake with Buttercream Frosting

1 pound (4 sticks) butter
1 pound box of XXX or 10-X confectioner's sugar
6 eggs
4 scant cups cake flour (measured after sifting)
½ teaspoon almond extract
2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract
2 teaspoons fresh squeezed lemon juice

Cream the butter with a mixer. Pour in all at once sugar and beat, beat, beat. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well as each one is added. Add all the flour. Mix well on low speed until thoroughly blended. Then add extracts and juice. Combine thoroughly.

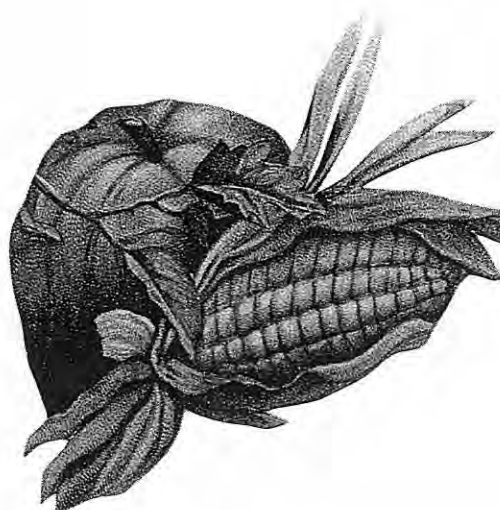
Line the bottom of a large tube pan with waxed paper. Pour batter into greased and lightly floured tube pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 1 hour and 15 minutes. When cool, frost with Buttercream Frosting.

Note: There is no baking powder used. Cake freezes well and can be sliced very thin. Recipe can be halved and baked in a small tube pan for a lesser time period.

Buttercream Frosting

½ cup butter
4 cups of XXX or 10X confectioner's sugar
2 teaspoons of pure vanilla extract
2-4 tablespoons of cream

Cream butter and then add the sugar. Mix; stir in vanilla
