MUSEUM CELEBRATION HONORS THE LEGACY OF GEORGE WILBERFORCE SOULÉ



The Mississippi Industrial Heritage Museum, located in the city of Meridian, holds the Soulé Live Steam Festival on the first weekend in November each year to celebrate the work of George Wilberforce Soulé and other industrial pioneers. In 2010 the event was held on Friday, November 5th, and Saturday, November 6th. The festival attracted a record crowd with several thousand visitors from 15 states and one foreign country.

Real steam engines operated on live steam and steam whistles sounded off at the new whistle station on the west side of the property. The museum's steam engine collection, along with visiting collectors' engines, was available for viewing. The newly installed permanent steam boiler powered the steam demonstration room, which features a large 1905 Watts-Campbell Corliss steam engine in operation. The 1870 Manchester steam engine on display, originally restored and operated by the Ford Museum, and a collection of handmade, miniature model steam engines delighted the crowds.

In the Soulé factory machine shop, blacksmith demonstrations were held at regular intervals. The longest operating line drive shaft in the U.S. powered belt-driven lathes and drill presses.

Museum Celebrates Soulé Legacy

The Industrial Technology program students from Meridian Community College demonstrated the antique machine shop equipment on both days. Other demonstrations included the broom-making demonstration, potter's wheel, antique print shop, spinning and weaving demonstration area and wood-carvers. A group of flint knappers showed Mississippi's earliest industry -- the creation of spear points and arrowheads.

In 1979, Soulé Steam Feed Works site was listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The site was designated a Mississippi Landmark in Fall 2003. When Soulé Steam Feed Works closed, interested Mississippi leaders worked with owner G.R.G (Bob) Soulé to create the non-profit Mississippi Industrial Heritage Museum. It was designated the official state historical industrial museum in July 2004 by the Mississippi legislature. The goal of the Museum is to restore the Soulé buildings to the 1930's era and feature southern industrial manufacturing processes, including how steam engines were made. The Museum operates primarily through grants, donations and fundraisers.

Visitors are encouraged to take a tour of the Mississippi Industrial Heritage Museum in Meridian, MS, and learn more about your cousin George Wilberforce Soulé. For more information on the museum, see its website: www.Soulélivesteam.com



Duxbury Property Owned by Soule Descendants in the Late 1700s

A peek into the past

Duxbury's Early Settlers: Thomas Prence

The property granted to Thomas Prence comprised 80 acres. At the time, Prence was married to Patience Brewster, daughter of Elder Brewster; they had two children, Thomas, Jr. and Rebecca. Prence was the third governor of Plymouth Colony, serving 18 times (one-year terms) and when he was not governor, he was assistant governor.

In total, Prence had Thomas, Jr., and eight daughters. He was married to Patience from 1624 to 1634, when she died. He then married Mary Collier, daughter of William Collier, in 1636, and finally married Mary Freeman, widow of Samuel Freeman of Eastham in 1662. All but two of his daughters settled in Eastham and his son Thomas went to England.

His daughter Mary married John Tracey of Duxbury, and his daughter Elizabeth married Arthur Howland of Marshfield. The colony records mention, "Arthur Howland is fined five pounds for making proposals to Elizabeth, daughter of Thomas Prence, contrary to the mind and will of their parents." Arthur could not be dissuaded, however, and he

eventually married Elizabeth. Apparently, even Pilgrims had in-law issues.

Prence died in Plymouth in 1673 at the age of 73. His property passed to John Howland (Pilgrim), who Governor Bradford called "a lusty yonge man," and then to William Kempe (Kemp) on April 2, 1640, the last time it contained 80 acres. William Kempe was married to Elizabeth Partridge, the Rev. Ralph Partridge's

daughter. Rev. Ralph was the first minister of Duxbury's church.

At this point, it appears the easterly 40 acres (which includes present-day Soule Avenue, Spruce Street, Sanger Road and Beechwood Lane) passed into the Partridge family. First Elizabeth inherited the property upon the death of her husband William Kemp (1). (We use numbers to differentiate between people of

the same name but of different generations.) It is strange that a daughter would inherit property in the 17th century, but she must have been the Rev. Ralph's only child. Then the property was sold or given to George Partridge, likely an uncle or cousin, and he left it to his son, James.

The next known owner was Charles Turner who was minister of the Duxbury

Church in 1755. He resigned the ministry in 1776 "because of ill health," but many believe it was because he was a Loyalist. He moved to what is now Turner, Maine (yes, they renamed the town after him,) and some of his stories refer to his stay in Duxbury and being jeered while preaching with the meeting house half empty (H. A. Fish).

Charles Turner, Jr. deeded the property referred to as the "Turner Farm" to Zedekiah Sanger, who succeeded Charles Turner as minister of the Duxbury Church. Rev. Sanger was quite successful as Duxbury's minister, and the meeting house would only hold half of the people who wanted to attend. (The Revolutionary War undoubtedly resolved this problem.) Rev. Sanger was the first minister to preach in the Meeting House that the Unitarian Church replaced. After about 10 years (1776-c. 1786) Rev. Sanger resigned; he tried navigation and failed, and then resumed preaching in south Bridgewater.

The next owners of the easterly 40 acres were James Soule (family members pronounce the name "sole" and it was originally spelled Soul), his sons James and Richard, and after them, Renslow Crosby who had married one of the family.

James (1) had a shipyard at the water's edge (just east of the current Landing Road Beach) where he had built a wharf and conducted a salt works. The Soules built a number of small craft. It seems that there was an active shipyard

on this property for more than 100 years when it was finally sold to Edward G. Beechwood in 1922.

It appears that Soule Avenue got its name from the Soule family, Sanger Road from the Rev. Zedekiah Sanger, and Beechwood Lane from Edward G. Beechwood. The other streets probably were named for "what was there:" Spruce – spruce trees; Summerhouse – a summer house.

The westerly 40 acres of Prence's original 80, passed to Patience Kempe (Kempe, not because she was William Kempe's (1) daughter, but because she was William Kempe's (2) daughter) who married Dr. Samuel Seabury and probably was given this 40 acre lot by her grandmother Elizabeth (Partridge) Kempe Thatcher, who inherited the land from her first husband, William Kempe. Follow?

The land was in Dr. Samuel Seabury's possession before Feb. 13, 1689 when George Partridge referred to it in a deed (Ply. Colony Reg. of Deeds, Bk. 1, P. 142) (E.D.J.). Henry A. Fish describes at length the matrimonial alliances of the

Partridge, Kemp, Thatcher, and Seabury families as "causing no end of trouble to genealogists." No doubt!

Here's what we think happened: William Kempe (1) was a widower with a son William Kempe (2) when he married Elizabeth Partridge. William Kempe (1) died c. 1641, and his widow married the Rev. Thomas Thatcher in 1643 and they had a daughter Patience (named after her grandmother Partridge) who grew up to marry William Kempe (2), her mother's step-son.

According to Justin Winsor's History of Duxbury (1849), the inlet below Bay Road west of Landing Road was referred to as "Mosquito Hole" as early as 1639. This establishes a historical reason for why the southerly portion of Myles Standish Park is sometimes referred to as "Mosquito Village." For the most part, streets in this area are named after the early Pilgrim settlers.

The Shore Acres Inn was located on the southwest corner of the intersection of Soule Avenue and Tremont Street in the late 1920s. The Inn was owned by Louise Chandler and her husband Norman St George and catered to actors and actresses. After her husband died, Louise married actor Carl Stowe and they continued to operate the Inn for some time. It was not unusual to see Mrs. Stowe, noted for her striking outfits, out doing her daily shopping wearing white gloves and a large hat.

Second Family Story

In celebration of Soule Kindred's 45th anniversary year, articles from past newsletters will be reprinted throughout the year. This article appeared 35 years ago in Vol. X, No. 1 (January 1976). The article has been edited slightly for clarity and space considerations. The editor at the time, Mary Crismore, had asked that members submit family stories, which she hoped would be an ongoing feature of the newsletter. This was the second such story. Maybe you, too, share some or most of Betty Whitecotten's lineage. Please send any Soule family stories you would like to share with your Soule cousins to editor@soulekindred.org or the address on the back of the newsletter.

I am happy to report that I have been accepted into the National Society Daughters of American Revolution (DAR). My membership was accepted on Bildad William Soule, a drummer boy of 16, who served in the latter part of the war. I understand that Bildad William Soule's name has recently appeared in the National DAR magazine, evidently I am the first applicant to base my DAR membership on his service record.

Another point of great interest to me was the name “Bildad”. I have wondered if it might have been a nickname. This last year I started a special project to read the Bible from cover to cover. First I did the New Testament, then began the Old Testament and recently in reading the Book of Job, Chapter 2, Verse 11 there's Bildad, the Shuhite, one of the three close friends of Job who came to him to comfort and console him in his distress. The whole Chapters of 8, 18, and 25 are all Bildad counselling with Job. This was a great revelation to me and to all the family thus far, perhaps other members of the family have had similar thoughts concerning the name and may be interested to learn about it.

Thinking of the Soules family at Terre Haute, Indiana, and future generations who may be hunting their family lineage records, I have the names of the children of Origen Brigham Soules (grandson of Bildad) and Francis Ann Watkins-Draper Soules, they are:

- 1) Julia Esther Soules, born January 3, 1856, died 1943. Married George Franklin Sankey, September 23, 1875 (my grandparents). Their children: 1) Charles Origin Sankey; 2) Fannie Mae Sankey (m) Pearl Ripley; 3) James Raymond Sankey.
- 2) William Soules, born June 10, 1857, died 1944. Married Bertha Frazee, August 24, 1882. Their children: 1) Gertrude Soules; 2) Jessie Soules (m) Charles Hunter; 3) Esther Soules (m) Basil Whitlock; 4) Lou Soules (m) Dr. Herschel Brunker, daughter, Jane Brunker, deceased; 5) George Soules, daughter, Marianne Soules (m) Harmon Shaw.
- 3) James Soules, born March 21, 1862, died 1945 in North Dakota. Married Bele Jones, October 20, 1891, deceased). Remarried Wilhelmina Neukom, September 13, 1902. Children: 1) Frances Soules; 2) Mary Soules (m) Mr. Bing;
- 4) Eliza Jane Soules, born October 14, 1864, died 1951. Married, Wesley J. (Jack) Woolin. Child: 1) Hazel Woolin (m) Herman Modisett, had son Jack Modisett.
- 5) Charles A. Soules, born December 2, 1866, died 1940. Married twice. Children (1st marriage: 1) Hobart Soules; 2) Randolph Soules; 3) Irene Soules (Aunt Mollie raised her) (m) Mr. McDermott, children: Rosemary McDermott, Dorothy McDermott and Arthur McDermott; 4) Origen Soules. Children (2nd marriage: 5) Frances Soules; 6) Christine Soules; 7) Mary Soules; 8) Pansy Soules (m) Mr. Persinger; 9) Oscar Soules; 10) John Soules.
- 6) Mary W. Soules, born December 25, 1868, died 1946. Married Charles R. Vice, September 22, 1908. No children.
- 7) Fannie Soules, born January 5, 1869[sic], died 1877 (8 years age).
- 8) Warren Soules, born June 21, 1877, died 1946. Married, Lelian Graves, September 19, 1894. Their children: 1) Helen Soules (m) Prentice Fell, daughter Doris Ann Fell (m) Mr. Clingerman; 2) William Soules; 3) Grace Soules (m) Burr Fell, no children; 4) Russell Soules.

Some of my fondest memories of my childhood are centered around this family. Always my grandmother, Julia Soules Sankey and my grandfather had a big family gathering at Christmas in their home, with

immediate family, the Charles Sankey family, the Ripley family, Uncle Jim, Aunt Mollie and Uncle Charlie Vice, Aunt Lyde and Uncle Jack Woolin, Hazel and Herman Modisett and Jack.

Then on New Years we would all go to Mary Soules Vice, "Aunt Mollie" Vice's home which was the old Origen B. Soules homestead, with Uncle Will and Aunt Bertha Soules and their family, Uncle Warren and Aunt "Lel" Soules and their family, and Uncle Charley and Auntie Soules and their family and always Irene Soules McDermott and her family, for a continued family gathering. What fun we had with those wonderful people!

Oh, what such delicious food, such wonderful heartwarming feelings of love and goodwill for one another, how we all looked forward to those gatherings! This family of 8 children, the 7th child, Fannie, died at 8 years of age, all remaining 7, lived to advanced years. Charles was the first one to pass away in 1940, at age 74; my grandmother, Julia Soules Sankey died in 1943 at age 87: "Uncle Will" William Soules died in 1944 at age 87; (He was the father of Gertrude Soules and Esther Soules Whitlock - both teachers in Vigo County for many years). "Uncle Jim" James Soules died in North Dakota in 1945 at age 83. He went to North Dakota when a young man, was elected Auditor of Dickinson. His daughter Mary Soules was a physician. "Aunt Mollie" Mary Soules Vice died in 1946 at age 78. "Uncle Warren" Warren Soules died in 1946 at age 75; and the last "Aunt Lyde" Eliza Jane Soules Woolin died in 1951 at age 87.

The family remained close throughout their lifetime and all were advanced in years when the break came, within eleven years all were gone. I feel it is a wonderful heritage that God has allowed me to have been born into this grand old family!

You need not sell your Soule on eBay. Memorabilia may be bequeathed to family members, your local or state historical society, or a genealogy center so that future generations may have a glimpse into your Soule.




Trade card, Soule Piano and Organ Inv't. Comp'y, Taunton, New Bedford, Brockford, Massachusetts. \$1.99



Soule Family Tree Project Committee 2010 Report Summary

The Board of Directors approved the creation of the Soule Family Tree Project Committee (SFTP) in April 2010. The mission of the SFTP in 2010 was to assist Soule Kindred members as they attempt to determine their lineage back to Pilgrim George Soule for inclusion in the 2011 Membership Directory. Committee members used resources readily available to conduct their research but did not provide detailed documentation.

Committee members are: Judy Hughes, Lynde Randall, Joyce Soles, Lois Sorensen, Mike Sowle, and Andy Turner (Chair). To date they have reached out to 152 members. In all, 52% responded and were helped. Andy is happy to report that as of December 31, 2010, the committee has lineages from 293 (85%) of our 345 members. Andy expects the SFTP committee to continue to add the lineages for current members (10 new members have joined effective January 1, 2011) and that the focus and leadership of the SFTP will evolve into other areas. Much has been accomplished in the first eight months of the SFTP and Andy thanks the committee members for their dedication and the members of SKIA for their cooperation. [*Editor's note: In my capacity as Soule Kindred's President, I, too, wish to thank the committee members for their success in bringing the number of completed lineages to 85%. I thank Andy, as well, for his leadership skills as chair.*]


